The Brisbane Croatia Soccer Club was founded in 1969 after some 10 Croatian boys decided to carry on the traditional kind of entertainment and Croatian manifestation in Brisbane.

The club was originally formed by two brothers, Ivan and Josip Mesic, with the assistance of Stjepan Blazenovic and the late Ivan Matic.

However the initial club could not be registered that year with the Queensland Soccer Federation.

This led to the club playing a reserve grade team at Acacia Ridge.

In 1970 Brisbane Croatia joined the QSF under the name "New Farm" and was immediately promoted to a higher rank.

During the next six years several more Croatian boys joined the club as it continued to climb through the grades.

And after six years of consecutive victories the club entered the First Division league.

The name "New Farm" was retained until 1974 when it was replaced by "Sunnyside United".

This name was given accidentally.

As the club did not have its own grounds, John Mesic the club secretary at the time, lodged an application with the QSF to change its name in order to qualify for a field from the Government at Sunnybank.

It turned out that the team was registered as "Sunnyside United" by mistake.

The club stayed in First Division until the reorganisation of the rules in the Queensland Federation.

As the club could not meet the new rule requirements they were forced to step out of the top division and into the second grade.

The club was still having a problem trying to find their own field and in 1978 brought 53 acres of land in Dunn Road Rocklea.

# Brisbane Croatia Soccer Club

This was not meant to be used only for soccer but also for the whole Croatian community in Brisbane. Work on the soccer field took place immediately.

In 1985 the management of the soccer club agreed to invite all Croatian societies and organisations to unite in a Croatian Centre where they could all enjoy the culture and sport.

A decision was made in 1986 about the construction of a new Croatian club.

As yet construction has not been completed due to a lack of money, however it is expected to be finished in the near future.

Over the past years the soccer club has tried its best to name the club "Croatia", despite QSF rules which didn't allow ethnic names.

However after much insistence the name "Brisbane Croatia" was finally accepted by the QSF in 1987. One of Croatia's finest moments is the club's President Cup which was won in 1989.

1990 has again seen Brisbane Croatia climb to new heights.

After finishing second in the Second Division, Croatia have won promotion to the XXXX League in 1991.

This should be the beginning a new era for the club, its supporters and loyal sponsors.

#### REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

with DES MILES

Before you take the football pitch for granted as a basic necessity for a game, stop and consider a few things you might not have realised, or might find useful on match—days or during training. If you take the average pitch as being 110 or 120 yards long by 70 or 80 yards wide, you are talking of somewhere between 7,700 and 9,600 square yards of pitch for the referee to keep an eye on!

If you use that same pitch as a training areadid you realise its perimeter is between 360 and 400 yards, or to run diagonally from corner to corner is between 130 and 145 yards?

Some referees show a reluctance to venture too often into the penalty area, where all sorts of incidents might take place.

On an average sized pitch, those two penalty areas make up somewhere in the region of 18 per cent of the total area, which is far too much to leave to what might be called "casual control", isn't it?

Do you fancy a training session sprint in something other than a straight line?

If so, why not take on the circumference of the centre circle, which is near enough to 63 yards. You will be aware that a pitch, so long as it is rectangular, can vary in length from 100 to 130 yards and in breadth from 50 to 100 yards.

The problem that referees never come across, unless they live in a really unusual part of the world, is a pitch of maximum possible size – heaven forbid such a monstrosity!

On the other hand, it is not unique by any means to find a pitch that is small by virtue of having been located in a restricted area of space.

Did you realised that if a pitch is only 50 yards wide – and I certainly know of one like that – then the distance between the touchline and the side line of the penalty area is a mere 3 yards on either side of the field?

Similarly, if the pitch is only 100 yards in length, then the distance between the centre point of the penalty arc and the nearest point on the centre circle is exactly 18 yards, which is a measurement we should recognise well when we think

about the penalty area.

Many a referee operates a diagonal system, but runs only from the in-field comer of the penalty area to its equivalent at the other end of the field (don't go into the area, do I hear you confess?) Such a patrol path involves between 86 and 95 yards, basing our judgement on the average pitch mentioned earlier.

Incidentally, if the referee restricts himself basically to that area in midfield between the two penalty areas, hardly venturing into them or towards the touchlines, he is in fact trying to referee a game of football by generally not venturing into something like 60% of the pitch's total area!

I think I'll stop here to let you referees digest that little lot. And if you are one of those whose reluctant to enter the penalty area or follow through to the goal-line, at least one or two of your assessors might remember a fact or two about your "percentages" regarding patrol areas!



#### **Grand Finals**

Taringa. Both teams finished on the same number of points, with identical goal difference (+2). Easts won a place in the finals by virtue of the fact that they scored 2 more goals than Taringa (even though they conceded 2 more). A fairer tie-break would surely have been to organise an Easts v

Taringa play-off (A la Balmain - Newcastle)

No coach or player goes into a game saying "ok lads, lets attack today in case we finish level on goal difference at the end of the season"!

To demonstrate the unfairness of the current tie-break system, con-

sider this hypothetical situation:

Team A scores 60 goals and concedes 40 goals (+20 goal difference). In other words, team A have scored 3 goals for every two conceded. Team B finish the season on the same number of points as team A, but score 40 goals and concede 20 (+20 goal difference) Team B has scored 4 goals for every two conceded.

Team B has the better goal average or ratio, but the current ruling

would place them below team A.

I'm aware that the majority of Soccer Federations around the world now use the "most goals scored" method of splitting level teams, but that Keith Whittam. doesn't make it right.








## PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

This week we look at the "Conditioned Passing Game"

The ultimate test of the quality of passing and receiving must be made in a "real" game situation.

The diagram below shows six-a-side but obviously you will adjust this according to space and numbers.



#### PREPARATION

Set up as large a playing area as space will allow with a halfway line marked out by the discs (for use later if necessary).

PROCEDURE

Allow the teams to play freely for a while to get the feel of the game.

If the coach steps in too soon players tend to feel cheated and lose concentration.

NOTES

1) Watch the progress of the game carefully. Have a number of key points in mind but don't attempt to look for them all at the same time.

Either plan to tackle one point at a time in depth or pick out from the run of play one important feature and tackle it in the same way.

2) Be single-minded about what is important in this game. Don't be side-tracked into spending time on other issues like poor defensive play or goal keeping mistakes.

If you think your knowledge may be called to account on this issue then explain the situation to the players

3) Having said all this, the game's number one priority must always be to score goals.

If the game shows signs of becoming a "keep-ball" situation, a timely reminder usually produces more attempts at finishing. VARIATIONS

1) As the name suggests, this is intended to be a conditioned game so when the players have settled down, reduce the number of touches allowed to three

This will increase the emphasis on passing the ball and prevent players hanging on too long.

2) Reduce the number of touches to two. This re-emphasises the importance of the first touch of the ball.

So many players need half a dozen "thinking touches" before parting with the ball.

Two-touch Soccer encourages players to think more in advance and use their first touch to set up the ball for their intended pass.

3) The playing area is already marked out in two zones. If the game is being spoilt by too many players crowding into one area, make it into a

CHECKLIST

1) Timing - Pass early to avoid being closed down. Weighting - firm and crisp so the ball reaches the target before it can be intercepted, but not too hard to control or lay off.

Accuracy - To feet or to space. Length -Vary the length, not less than ten yards. Develop accurate long passes.

2) Control the ball tight but a little in front, not stuck under the feet.

3) Remember, control can mean holding or laying off.

4) Passing is only a means to an end. Aim to make as few passes as possible before a shot is attempted. Very few goals are scored from moves involving more than 4 passes.

5) The first touch is vital. Work at it con-




