Would a million dollars make a difference?



THE HISTORY OF CHARLTON ATHLETIC F.C.

Charlton Athletic F.C., formed in June 1905 at a time when Woolwich Arsenal (now Arsenal) were still competing in the area, were a highly successful Club in local leagues before adopting professionalism in 1920.

A year earlier, when they were admitted to the then powerful Kent League, they played their first match at The Valley.

After spending a season (1920/21) in the Southern League, Charlton were admitted to the expanding Football League in 1921/22 and hit the headlines during the following campaign when they eliminated three First Division Clubs from the F.A. Cup before losing a quarter-final match at the Valley to the eventual winners Bolton.

Financially, however, the Club was less successful due to lack of support from what, at the time, was predominately a rugby stronghold. The management's remedy was to move house to nearby Catford during season 1923/24 but this proved a disastrous and expensive mistake and they were back at The Valley six months later.

Charlton won promotion to the Second Division in season 1928/29 but were relegated to the Third Division (South) in 1932/33. February 1932, however, had seen the control of the Club shift to the Prosperous Gliksten brothers (Albert and Stanley) and when the legendary Jimmy Seed was appointed team manager in May 1933, no one in their wildest dreams could have possibly predicted the sensational run of success that the Club was to enjoy.

Promoted from the Third to the First Division in two seasons (1934/35 and 1935/36), the little Cinderella Club from South London amazed the football aristocrats by finishing runners-up to the 1936/37 Football League Champions, Manchester City — a feat unlikely to be equalled let alone bettered.

In five vintage seasons, between 1936/37 and 1946/47, Charlton finished 2nd, 4th and 3rd respectively in the First Division and played in two F.A. Cup Finals — losing 4–1 to Derby (after extra time) in 1946 only to keep a Jimmy Seed promise by coming back the following season to lift the Trophy by beating Burnley 1–0 thanks to an extra time goal from the late Chris Duffy. To this day Charlton are the only Club from South East London to have competed in an F.A. Cup Final. In addition, by playing in two War Cup Finals against Arsenal and Chelsea, Charlton had the incredible record of having appeared at Wembley four times in the space of five years.

Although Charlton were never regarded an ambitious Club at the time, they nevertheless received tremendous support from Woolwich, its surrounding Districts and from the County of Kent. The highest "gate" at The Valley was the 75,031 which watched a Fifth Round F.A. match against Aston Villa on 12th February 1983, and in 1948/49 by aggregating 844,537 crowds for League matches alone, Charlton became only the fifteenth Club in the history of organised football in the country to finish a season with average crowds in excess of 40,000.

Relegated to the Second in 1956/57, Charlton only needed to draw their final match of the season at The Valley to guarantee them the swiftest of returns to the First Division but, instead, lost 4–3 to promoted Blackburn in front of 56,435 fans, Charlton's record Second Division "gate".

After a long spell in the Second, Charlton returned to the Third in season 1971/72 after a 36 year absence. They were back in the Second in 1975 but, again, suffered the dreaded form in season 1979/80.

Although the Club was promoted once again in 1980/81, it could not be said that this important event was greeted with any great optimism. The hardened Charlton fan knew at heart that unless policies radically changed, at best all the Club could hope for was Second Division status, and this was no certainty, while at worst they would just drift away as many other big Clubs have done.

This is why the arrival, in June 1982 of a new supremo in the shape of Chairman Mark Huyler was initially greeted with enthusiasm and very soon optimism when he managed to persuade a reluctant Barcelona to part with former European Player-of-the-year Allan Simonsen

Sadly, in retrospect, it was one massive gamble which completely misfired, plunging the Club into chaotic debt. As the soccer world knows, the Club was on the brink of extinction early in 1984 until an eleventh hour rescue act by the Sunley Group backed up by generous guarantees from Greenwich Council saved the day.

A welcome sponsorship from Woolwich Equitable Building Society was successfully negotiated and one could not fail to be impressed at the organised way the Sunley Group set about the daunting task of reviving Charlton. It was certainly a popular move with the fans when Derek Ufton, an England and former Charlton player, and Jimmy Hill were invited to join the Board.

Charlton's team building during the Summer months of 1985 cost nearly 300,000 pounds but, it could be argued, never has the money been spent more wisely. Of the seven players recruited by manager Lennie Lawrence, six were regular members of the Charlton squad which returned to the First Division after a 29 year absence at the end of the 1985/86 season.

Important as promotion was to Charlton, from a national point of view, greater interest was focused on the Club's enforced decision, in September 1985, to vacate their famous Valley arena to move in with Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park in what many experts predicted was only the first of the Football League's Ground-Sharing alliances.

Charlton fans will remember season 1986/87 with satisfaction and certainly much pride. Satisfaction that the club never looked out of place, even against the best, in the First Division and pride in the manner that they won through with great character, and no little skill, in the play-off Final against Leeds United.

There were also two other finals to savour, even although both were lost. The appearance at Wembley Stadium in the Members' Cup Final against Blackburn Rovers was particularly emotional and considering the Club's overall superiority, they had no excuses for being beaten 1–0.

Charlton's youngsters brought further pride to the Club by reaching the F.A. Youth Cup Final for the first time. Charlton paid the penalty for missed chances in the First Leg and finally lost 2-1 on aggregate to Coventry City — the Second Leg at Highfield Road, attracting a crowd of 12,142.

During the Summer of 1987, John Fryer retired as Chairman resulting in the appointments of Richard Collins as Chairman and Michael Norris as Vice-Chairman.

In 1989 Mr Roger Alwen was appointed Chairman.

On behalf of Charlton Athletic Football Club I would like to thank the Queensland Soccer Federation for giving us the opportunity to travel to Australia. For everyone in the Touring Party it will be a first visit to Australia and we are all looking forward to what we consider will be a marvellous experience and a trip of a lifetime.

Charlton is in the London Borough of Greenwich, six miles South East of the City centre and very close to the River Thames. Our Club has a playing staff of twenty-six and in addition we have twelve Youth Trainees who combine football and college. In most weeks of our Season starting in August and ending in May we will play at least three games a week. In the Season just finished our 1st Team played over fifty League and Cup Matches. I am sure after a tough Season our visit to Australia will rejuvenate those tired limbs.

The fifteen players in the Party have been the nucleus of our 1st team during the current Season and it includes some younger members who have made the squad through our youth team. A Club like ours relies heavily on trying to produce home grown players in a League where it is commonplace for transfer fees to be in excess of one million pounds.


spearhead Queensland's development in the 1990's.

23 years Midfield/Striker Merrimac (Gold Coast) A skilful and hard working player with good pace and ball skills. Most dangerous when coming forward from deep lying positions, to some could be considered a surprise selection but he has been a most consistent player with the Gold Coast

Representative team.



SHANE HADDOW (2)

20 Years Defender North Star A Queensland Youth representative in only his second season in the XXXX Soccer League after spending a year at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra in 1988. Shane was the inaugural winner of the ANZ Colt of the Year Award in 1987



DAVID HUNTER (6)

23 years Defender Brisbane Lions A tough defender making his second debut in the full State Senior squad. A former Australian Schoolboy representative with a ferocious shot, a player who loves to go forward and support in attack.



PAUL HALFORD (15)

27 years Striker/Midfield Southport (Gold Coast) Paul is a former New Zealand International who has now made Queensland his home, was the leading scorer in the Gold Coast competition last year. Will be making only second appearance in a Maroon shirt.



CHRIS SLATER (7)

20 years Midfield Brisbane Lions A well performed player for Brisbane Lions playing well in local club competition. Has been played in both midfield and as a striker. This will be his debut for the Senior side although Chris has repre-

selected and performed admirably with the Brisbane Representative side in 1989 and 1990, which enhanced his selection for the full Senior side this year.



NOEL CARROLL (10)

18 years Striker Pine Rivers United Played for Pine Rivers for all his junior and senior soccer. Fast and Strong forward he is current top scorer in the XXXX Soccer League. First Senior Representative honour and is likely to cause problems to all defenders.

IOHN HUMPHREY - DEFENDER

Born Paddington 31-1-61. Undoubtedly one of Lennie Lawrence's shrewdest buys to date, John had another outstanding season in 1988/89, finishing an "ever-present" for the second successive campaign and the constant target of big offers

from other First Division clubs.



BOB BOLDER - GOALKEEPER

Born Dover, 2-10-58. Bob's first League match this season represented his 100th in the First Division all achieved at Charlton who he joined from Sunderland for a bargain fee of Twenty Thousand Pounds in August 1986. After making hiS debut

against Rotherham late 1977, he bacame a regular and great favourite at Hillsborough until his One hundred and twenty-five thousand pound transfer to Liverpool in August 1983.



TOMMY CATON - DEFENDER

Born Liverpool 6-10-62. Few players have made their First Division debut at the age of 16 and even fewer (if any) have been an "ever present" at such a young age in their first ever season - Tommy achieved both these remarkable statistics for Man-

chester City in Season 1979/80; making his debut against Crystal Palace at Maine Road on August 18, 1979. Along with Steve Mackenzie, Caton was a member of the City team which lost to Tottenham Hotspur in the 1981 F.A. Cup Final.



ANDY JONES - FORWARD

Born Wrexham 9-1-63. Last season will rank as the most disappointing Andy has experienced since he joined Port Vale from Rhyl in 1985. Niggling injuries and a loss of form plagued Jones through-out the campaign until the closing stages when,

after being recalled from an on-loan spell with Port Vale, he recaptured the form which prompted Charlton to part with Three hundred thousand pounds, when they signed him from Vale in September 1987.



CARL LEABURN - FORWARD

Born Lewisham 30-3-69. Last season was another year of learning for Carl in the hardest testing ground in the world - the First Division - and undoubtedly the best is yet to come from this promising young "Striker". Leaburn came through

the apprentice ranks at Charlton and played in the 1987 F.A. Youth Cup Final against Coventry City.



PAUL WILLIAMS - FORWARD

Born Stratford (East London) 16-8-65. Paul worked in accountancy and had numerous trials with various League Clubs, almost resigning himself to not making the grade, until Charlton transformed his career three seasons ago. His success, apart


from finishing top Charlton scorer with 17 goals in 38 outings, was recognised by England Under-21's when he was called up for the prestigious close-season Toulon Tournament.



SCOTT MINTO - DEFENDER

Born Wirral (Cheshire) 6-8-71. Signed as a full professional in January 1989, Scott made his senior debut, along with Jason Lee, in a Simod Cup match against Sunderland on November 8, 1988 and his First Division debut against Q.P.R. a month

later. Minto is one of six of the 1987 Youth Cup First team who have advanced to full professional status with Charlton. League and Cup career (end 1988/89): 2(+2) matches, no goals.





PAUL MORTIMER - MIDFIELDER Born London 8-5-68. Paul was working in a Fleet Street (London) book shop in 1987, having served his apprenticeship with Fulham, when he was invited for a trial at Charlton - originally as a full back. Since then, Charlton have developed him

into a Midfielder of exciting possibilities.



ANDY PEAKE - MIDFIELDER

Born Market Harborough 1-11-61. A grafting and skilful Midfielder, Andy was signed from Grimsby Town in September 1986 (Fee 75,000 pounds) and before this campaign opened was only five short of completing a century of appearances for Charlton.

"Capped" by England at Youth and Under-21 levels, Andy made his debut for Leicester City, his first club, against Oldham Áthletic on New Year's Day 1979.



DARREN PITCHER - DEFENDER

Born London 12-10-69. A product of the School of Excellence, Darren originally signed as a Trainee in July 1980 and made his senior debut (his only appearance to date) in a Littlewoods Cup match at Northampton on September 27, 1988. Late last

season he joined Galway United on a month's loan.



MIKE SALMON - GOALKEEPER

Born Leyland (in Lancashire) 14-6-64 signed from Wrexham for 100,000 pounds on July 5, 1989, Mike had one League match for Blackburn Rovers in season 1981/82, and an on-loan period with Chester, before moving in a free transfer to Stock-

port County two seasons later.



GORDON WATSON - FORWARD

Born Sidcup 20-3-71. Still to make his senior debut at the start of this campaign, Gordon hit an aggregate of 48 goals for Charlton's reserve and Youth teams last season and was named substitute against

Oldham Athletic in an F.A. Cup Tie in January 1989. Signed as a contract player in March 1989, Gordon was a member of the Charlton team beaten by Coventry City in the 1987 F.A. Youth Cup Final.



JOE MCLAUGHLIN - DEFENDER

Born Greenock 2-6-60. Less than a month after selling Peter Shirtliff to Sheffield Wednesday, Lennie Lawrence was in the transfer market again, this time as a buyer, when he paid Chelsea a club record 600,000 pounds on August 15th 1989 for McLaughlin who linked up with his former colleague Colin Pates

to renew a formidable partnership forged at Stamford Bridge.

LENNIE LAWRENCE - MANAGER

Born Brighton.

Charlton have had many fine managers during their 66 year history, but only two, the legendary Jimmy Seed and

Lennie Lawrence, bought major success to the Club.

In 1936, Seed steered Charlton to the First Division and to Wembley on four occasions. Fifty years on, in 1986, Lawrence was at the helm when Charlton returned to the First Division after a 29 year absence and a year later had the honour of leading his side out at Wembley in the Full Members' Cup Final.

These days there is a real family feel about the club with former Charlton players, Mike Flanagan (Chief Coach) and Colin Powell (groundsman) part of the backroom team. Of the future - who would dare predict! The feeling is, as long as the enormously popular Mr Lawrence is part of the Charlton scene, the Club is in safe hands. With such a small playing staff, the task for Lennie Lawrence is not easy but, there again, nothing has ever been easy at Charlton, especially since 1984 when the Club were literally only minutes from extinction.



QUEENSLAND TEAM HISTORY

The Queensland Soccer Federation is most fortunate in being able to arrange the tour of its State by English First Division Side Charlton Athletic, as the last European team to play here was in 1980 when A.C. Milan played in brisbane to a creditable 2-2 draw.

The previous year Norwich City toured and defeated Queensland 1-0 in front of a capacity crowd at Perry Park. Queensland used to be the host for a number of European club sides up to the mid 70's, but after that time visits from teams from overseas tended to become less frequent. 1990 does however see the Centenary of the Interstate Series between Queensland and New South Wales, with the inaugural match being played in Sydney in 1890 when Queensland defeated New South Wales quite convincingly 3 - 1.

It is to be hoped that the Queensland v Charlton Athletic match will be but the first of a number of full Senior

CARL LEABURN - FORWARD

Born Lewisham 30-3-69. Last season was another year of learning for Carl in the hardest testing ground in the world - the First Division - and undoubtedly the best is yet to come from this promising young "Striker". Leaburn came through

the apprentice ranks at Charlton and played in the 1987 F.A. Youth Cup Final against Coventry City.

PAUL WILLIAMS - FORWARD


Born Stratford (East London) 16-8-65. Paul worked in accountancy and had numerous trials with various League Clubs, almost resigning himself to not making the grade, until Charlton transformed


his career three seasons ago. His success, apart from finishing top Charlton scorer with 17 goals in 38 outings, was recognised by England Under-21's when he was called up for the prestigious close-season Toulon Tournament.

SCOTT MINTO - DEFENDER

Born Wirral (Cheshire) 6-8-71. Signed as a full professional in January 1989, Scott made his senior debut, along with Jason Lee, in a Simod Cup match against Sunderland on November 8, 1988 and his First Division debut against Q.P.R. a month




his apprenticeship with Fulham, when he was invited for a trial at Charlton - originally as a full back. Since then, Charlton have developed him

into a Midfielder of exciting possibilities.



Born London 12-10-69. A product of the School of Excellence, Darren originally signed as a Trainee in July 1980 and made his senior debut (his only appearance to date) in a Littlewoods Cup match at Northampton on September 27, 1988. Late last season he joined Galway United on a month's loan.



Born Leyland (in Lancashire) 14-6-64 signed from Wrexham for 100,000 pounds on July 5, 1989, Mike had one League match for Blackburn Rovers in season 1981/82, and an on-loan period with Chester, before moving in a free transfer to Stock-

port County two seasons later.

GORDON WATSON - FORWARD

Born Sidcup 20-3-71. Still to make his senior debut at the start of this campaign, Gordon hit an aggregate of 48 goals for Charlton's reserve and Youth teams last season and was named substitute against Oldham Athletic in an F.A. Cup Tie in January

1989. Signed as a contract player in March 1989, Gordon was a member of the Charlton team beaten by Coventry City in the 1987 F.A. Youth Cup Final.

JOE MCLAUGHLIN - DEFENDER

Born Greenock 2-6-60. Less than a month after selling Peter Shirtliff to Sheffield Wednesday, Lennie Lawrence was in the transfer market again, this time as a buyer, when he paid Chelsea a club record 600,000 pounds on August 15th 1989 for

McLaughlin who linked up with his former colleague Colin Pates to renew a formidable partnership forged at Stamford Bridge.
