The appalling response to the sales of QSF's representative season ticket package has raised a number of serious questions.

Most clubs have now returned their allocated tickets, many of which were unsold.

There is no doubting these are hard times, but questions must be asked whether any effort at all was made by clubs to promote this value– for–money package.

There is a large number of people in soccer circles who have indicated they were not aware this particular offer was even available.

### Saving

Having looked at the tickets that were returned, one could easily get the impression many of those delivered to clubs had never seen the light of day.

For meagre sum of \$60, the ticket package entitled two adults and two children admission to all six of the Maroons' representative matches this season.

It represented a massive "recession busting" saving of \$91 on what it would cost an average family (two adults and two children) to attend those games.

The first two representative games have been played and would have cost the average family coming through the turnstiles \$44.

With four matches still remaining you don't have to be Einstein to see the true value which many people have passed up.

Sadly there are probably hundreds of supporters who have missed out on the offer because they didn't know about it.

Make a note in your diary to attend the next big match at Perry Park, the State-of-Origin clash between Queensland and NSW.

This match between the long-time rivals promises to be a beauty, so come along and support the Maroons.

Following on from Canterbury's successful Brisbane visit, an invitation has been extended to the Queensland team to play a return match in Christchurch later this year.

And Victoria are also keen to stage a reciprocal game against the Maroons.

The Queensland Soccer Federation has obviously re-kindled the interest in representative football.

Already Western Australia, South Australia and the Northern Territory have declared their interest in competing against the Queensland team on an annual basis.

Add to this the main New Zealand provincial teams and we will certainly have some top quality representative soccer lined up for next season's winter program.

Brisbane City recorded their first win, Rochedale Rovers and Brisbane Croatia went on a goal scoring blitz and Eastern Suburbs crashed to a third straight loss in an topsy turvy round of soccer last week.

After threatening to do so for the past few weeks City finally broke their duck last Saturday with a 3–0 victory over North Star at O'Callaghan Park.

Ironically the club sacked its coach Billy Wilkinson during the week and appointed player/captain Martin Jennison to the caretaker role.

It was a dream start to a coaching career for Jennison as his team showed plenty of commitment to roll the previously undefeated Stars.

Goals by young striker Jason Poggi and Jennison and also an own goal gave City the valuable three points.

Stars coach Billy Williamson must be concerned about his team's present form slump following a promising start to the season.

Eastern Suburbs coach Phil Thompson is also searching for answers after his team's 2-0 loss to Brisbane Lions in their Anzac Day fixture at Heath Park. Easts, who were without experienced backman Steve Perry, have fallen in a big hole in recent weeks.

Their match with Lions was an even contest for most part and Easts could feel somewhat unlucky not to have escaped with a draw.

Trailing 1-0 they had a goal disallowed before Lions scored the winner through a blatant handball which the referee and linesman failed to see.

Acacia Ridge will be wishing they had never heard of the clubs Brisbane Croatia and Rochedale Rovers. Both have handed out thrashings to the Ridge in the past two weeks. Last week it was Croatia to the tune of 5-0 and this week Rochedale with a unflattering 7-0 scoreline.

Lee Howells bagged a hat trick with John Stewart and replacement David Bearman each netting twice.

The win keeps Rochedale at the top of the premiership table on goal difference from Croatia, who enjoyed a 5–0 result over Mt Gravatt. Mt Gravatt was right in this match until the second half when Croatia piled on four goals in a matter of minutes.

### Queensland performance proves acid test for NSL

Queensland showed they could compete in the National Soccer League (NSL) last Sunday in their representative match against Victoria. The Maroons went down 3-2 in an entertaining game played at Perry Park.

With Brisbane United likely to be in a restructured NSL competition next season, this match was an important test case for both players and spectators.

For the players, many of whom would must consider themselves prospects of playing for Brisbane United, it was a chance to gauge the standard of competition.

And although the result went against us, we passed both tests with flying colours.

Even Victorian coach Tim White expressed the opinion Queensland would be competitive in the NSL with the addition of three or four quality players to the present squad.

Both teams played an open style of football throughout the match which added to the spectacle.

It was Queensland who drew first blood when speedy young Sean Cranney scored in the 13th minute.

Cranney, making his debut for the Queensland senior side, was able to slam home a ball from close range.

Victoria replied in the 23rd minute when Robert Stoicevski was able to beat the keeper.

Stoicevski, a late inclusion to the Victorian squad, stamped himself as one of the most dangerous players with his probing forays down the left flank.

Victoria scored again soon after half time when impressive striker Andrew Zinni found the back of the net.

And they increased their lead a few minutes later when Zinni's frontline partner Robert Markovac found himself open inside the box.

To their credit Queensland replied in the 64th minute when Cranney bagged his second from a header following a free kick.

ASF General Secretary, Alan Vessey, today announced the re-scheduling of the trans Tasman Cup fixture involving Austalia and New Zealand.

When making the announcement he cited the cost of obtaining support lighting necessary for the presentation of this International fixture at Perry Park.

"In placing the match at Perry Park, we knew there would be a need to upgrade the lighting and undertook an assessment with ABC Television. What we were not prepared for was the non availability in Brisbane of the required support lighting, which introduced a cost factor that could not be justified given ABC Television's Report confirming the equipment had to be obtained from Sydney" stated Vessey in explaining the reason for the rescheduling.

Vessey confirmed "It remains the intention of the Australian Soccer Federation to have the Quit Socceroos play in centres such as Brisbane.

We have given QSF President, Wal Dann, a commitment to place our National Team in Brisbane for a weekend match, at the first opportunity.

We recognise the need to have a higher profile for our National Team, particularly in centres that historically have little access to such matches".

The match has been re-scheduled for May 15, 7.30 pm at Hindmarsh Stadium, Adelaide.

Other centres looking to send a team to Brisbane on the long weekend in June are Cairns, Townsville, Sunshine Coast, Mackay, Rockhampton, Gladstone, Toowoomba, Ipswich, Gold Coast and Brisbane Youth.

This year looks like being one of the most exciting State Titles in a long time.

### **D.O.C. SEEKS ANSWERS**

The articles written in "Soccer 91" regarding the lack of response from Brisbane Clubs in nominating players cannot be left unanswered.

To have only 25 p.ayers from Brisbane South and ten from Brisbane North is pathetic.

In fact if it wasn't for the support from Pine Rivers and North Star on the North side I hate to think what players would have attended.

If there is a problem or a reason why clubs have simply ignored, through lack of response the opportunity of nominating players, then let a spokesperson from each club come forward and air the views of his club for future reference.

To deny players the opportunity to represent initially their zone, possibly their State and eventually their country, should not be left to the club, but to the individuals to who it concerns.

The Under-16 State Talent Identification Series was hatched, to bridge the gap between junior and senior soccer at representative level, and was designed purely for development.

All coaches were carefully selected,

for having a knowledge of the game as players and as development coaches, so the players are in very good hands.

The opportunity at the end of the series for a selected group of twenty players to travel to Europe in a playing and coaching tour with elite coaches in attendance, is one that I am sure all players would have relished the opportunity of being considered.

In the coming month another opportunity will be given to players, through the same channels, of being nominated by their clubs for selection in the State Under-17 team to attend the National Under-17 Talent Identification Series in Sydney.

The opportunity, of being selected in the National team to participate in the Youth World cup to be held in Australia in 1993 await these players.

Will we still have the same lethargic approach to this team, as for the Brisbane teams.

# JUNIORS IN THE LIMELIGHT

BRISBANE NORTH

The representative season is underway for some and completed for others.

Those who were selected into State teams have had their fortunes enhanced but some have been selected on size rather than skill. So what is the point of skill if it's not going to get you selected into the State team.

There is about to be a turnabout in that approach to the game.

Two people wrote about skills in recent times.

Walter De Ste Croix and Barry Davis have made a start on the issue of skills for younger players.

The prime example of skills development in the National League seems to be Paul Okon.

On the local scene Chris Slater shows the skills younger players should look to achieve.

The days when players should be asked to run seven and eight kilometres are hopefully at an end.

However there is always a need for players to have some physical training.

Most Australians are substantially unfit. The fast food syndrome and the television screen has developed a generation of people who need a little more than the usual physical exercise.

Football players, however, are not always in that mould and their fitness has to be tempered with the skills needed to play their game.

This year a number of proposals have been discussed to change the approach to younger players.

Some of the more radical ones are that scoring in all age groups up to under-12 not continue.

Some others are not as radical but are aimed at change not for the sake of change but to highlight skill.

A lot of coaches have a problem selecting players with skills who are smaller in stature than some of their colleagues.

Many players such as Mick Higginbottom and Steve Perry are examples of how wrong those coaches can be with their attitudes.

There is room for both types of players in any team. If selected in a proper manner the two types of players compliment each other.

The skills development of the younger players should be of paramount importance to junior associations wherever they are in this wide country of ours.

There needs to be a better competition in the upper age groups of the code of Soccer so that retention levels are higher.

The commencement of inter Association upper age group competition will assist.

The recruitment in all age groups will increase if there are better competition arrangements in the lower age groups.

This was certainly the view Walter De Ste

Croix was alluding to in some of his writings.

Experiences all around the country indicate that the earlier that players start with some skills training the better players they are likely to be in the long term.

Players who in the early 70's started on the road to skills instead of the some times high level of physical training have proven to be the better players.

They are the players who enjoy their game more and are still fit because they understand the need for fitness, rather than have fitness forced upon them.

Recently a Brisbane coach said to a player that he chose him in his team because of his skills.

That coach taught skills to his players once or twice in three years.

Why do players get tired of being run around a paddock? Ask yourself that question.

How many coaches in your Club treat players like marathon runners with an endless supply of energy?

Perhaps your Annual General Meeting will resolve to place a greater emphasis on skills and skills coaching for the sake of the sport and the future of your club.




