Brisbane United directors had the opportunity to meet with the ASF commissioners last Friday to reinforce their written proposal for entry into the NSL competition.

It's really quite amazing the number of people outside the soccer fraternity who are keenly interested in this decision.

It appears that most Queenslanders have been waiting for a long time to attend football matches during summer.

Congratulations to Miron Bleiberg, who has been announced as the Brisbane United coach and to Joe Gilroy who has been appointed his assistant.

Gary Legg, Sunday Mail writer, expressed a positive word on the appointment of Blieberg.

"While he may not have been everyone's choice for the job, hopefully local coaches will get behind him - if we get in."

Round in Review

Rochedale Rovers became outright competition leaders, Eastern Suburbs returned to winning form and Brisbane City continued its revival in round nine of the XXXX Soccer League last week.

Rochedale made the arduous journey to the Gold Coast to play Nerang at Glennon Park and came away with a 2-0 victory.

The win puts them three points clear in the premiership race after Brisbane Croatia suffered a crushing defeat at the hands of North Star.

Although Nerang utilised a five-man defence for much of the match, Rochedale managed to score a goal in each half.

State representative Lee Howells grabbed the first in the 20th minute with Arthur McHugh

scoring his goal midway through the second half.

Nerang, who were promoted to the XXXX League this season, now find themselves alone on the bottom of the table.

"We just have to keep working at what we have been doing and hope that sooner or later the results start to come our way," Nerang coach Neil Burrows said.

"Like most other teams we would like to have a good midfielder and a good striker but we have not got the money to go into the transfer market."

Off the bottom of the ladder for the first time since the season began is Brisbane City who enjoyed a 2-0 victory over Coalstars at Spencer Park.

City had too much commitment and enthusiasm for Coalstars, who were without dangerous striker Peter Vogler. Vogler has been sidelined with a knee injury and could be out for up to six weeks.

Skilful midfielder Frank Cole and striker Mark Battistin provided the goals for City's second victory.

Eastern Suburbs gave their fans something to smile about when they beat a lacklustre Taringa Rovers at Jack Speare Park.

Easts, who had lost the four games prior to this match, were boosted by the return of defender Steve Perry and also the new signing of striker Geoff Maltby and ran out 3-1 winners.

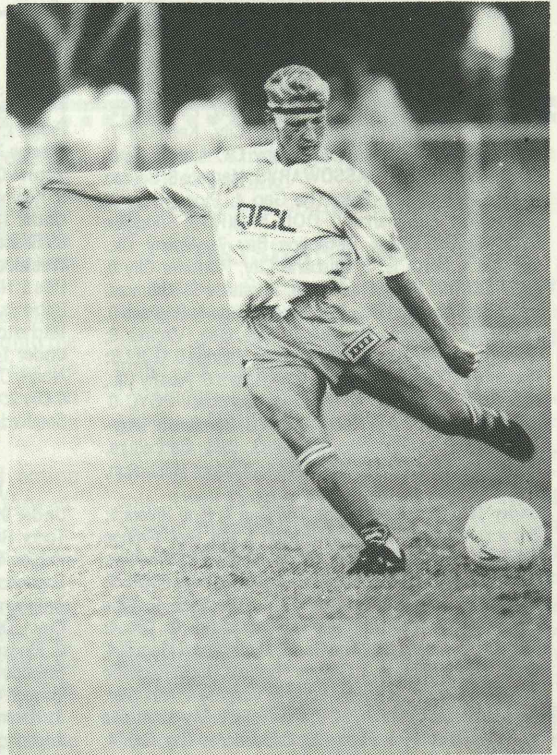
Maltby, Chris Fegan and Billy McDermott found the net for the Tigers while teenager Shane Tollenaere scored a late goal for Taringa.

The match of the round, between North Star and Brisbane Croatia at O'Callaghan Park, turned out to be a fizzer with Stars running out convincing 4-0 victors.

Jim McDonagh, dropped from the State squad last week, netted twice with Shane Haddow and Lorenzo Cucchi grabbing one each.

Pine Rivers moved into the top five with a 3-1 win over Acacia Ridge at Proud Oval.

provided the goals for Rivers while Nigel McLure replied for the Ridge.

Rivers are starting to live up to their nickname "the entertainers" and have scored nine goals in their past three matches.

Meanwhile its been all one-way traffic for Acacia Ridge since a promising opening to the season.

After a somewhat shaky start to the year Brisbane Lions have bounced back and, with their fourth win in succession against Mt Gravatt, moved into the top three.

Lions defeated Mt Gravatt 2-1 at Dittmer Park thanks to goals from Wayne Corbett and Darren Hillier. Phillip Makridakis scored for the home team.

With the State of Origin match between Queensland and NSW being played this Sunday, all XXXX League teams have been given a break from fixtures.

However six of the teams will travel out of town to play second round matches in the revamped Ampol Cup series.

JUNIOR NORTH

Someone suggested recently that the most important thing you can do after you strap your boots on is to warm up.

There is an absolute need to warm up just as much as there is a need to warm down when your match or training session is completed. There are many ideas about the method of warming up and down as there are Coaches and team Managers.

One of the soundest ideas is to consult your friendly Physiotherapist for advice on the subject.

One club in particular made the effort last year to get a Physio along to a meeting of coaches and managers to give practical demonstrations on how to warm up and do stretching exercises.

The effort that club put in has rubbed off onto a board spectrum of players.

What the Physio also showed was the ways in which it is dangerous to stretch before a game or training.

It is worthwhile to repeat some of those issues for the benefit of the several hundred players, coaches and managers who were not at the sessions conducted by the Physio.

Firstly the no, no items should be mentioned. There is perhaps three important issues to remember.

These are that you should always jog, run and lightly exercise first.

Secondly, make sure that you are warm and keep warm once you have warmed up, and

thirdly do not involve yourself in stretching exercises that are not good for you.

There are those that walk out of the dressing room before training or a match and simply throw their heels up on the nearest fence which about waist height and lean forward.

These players are running the risk of injuries by not warming up. Some run out onto the field and start to kick the ball around. They too find that they have or will have sore groin muscles caused by not warming those areas before placing strain on them.

Others have the very misguided notion that crossing your ankles and leaning forward is a stretching exercise.

If you are asked to do this exercise you should ask your coach or manager just exactly which muscles or areas you are stretching. That type of exercise should be completely outlawed. It does nothing other than place an excessive strain on your lower back muscles when you are regaining an upright position.

The second lot of exercises that should be questioned by players before you undertake them is Ballistic stretching. Some time ago this type of stretching was considered the way to go. More recent evidence shows that ballistic stretching causes muscles to more or less spasm or contract.

This of course is not the purpose of exercising and stretching.

Junior players and parents of juniors should not hesitate to question in a polite manner the need for coaches to continue with some types of stretching and warming up.

Responsible

They should also ensure that warming up and stretching is part of the training session irrespective of the age group.

Clubs must take responsible view towards stretching, warming up, and warming down.

Your local Physio will make time to come along to club coaches and managers meetings to assist in setting out a schedule of exercises to suit the needs of the age groups you have throughout the club. The second issue to be aware of is that some parents have a reluctance to ask their child's coach or manager why he insists on particular exercises or does not do them at all.

They have a fear that they will be seen as trouble makers and their child dropped from the team.

There are also parents that fit into that category eminently. That is that they have no hesitation in having all sorts of discussion behind the back of the coach and manager with any real justification.

Clubs should take steps to stamp out both types of activity. Neither effort enhances football.

Parents and all junior players should be aware that there are responsibilities to be shouldered by both themselves and their clubs in making sure that they are fit, confident and able to take the fields for games and training.

They should be aware that all have the responsibility to warm up and stretch before

any match or training and warm down after the match or training.

Lets see what you do at training next week!

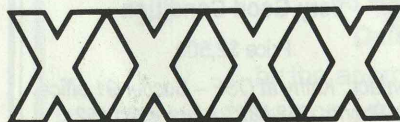
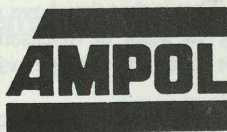

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

with Bruce Stowell

Players who can perform holding and turning skills are a blessing to any team.

This week we look at how you can improve these two skills.

There are two features involved in holding/turning.

1. The ability to carry out the skills.

2. Knowing which of the two is appropriate at any time.

So many teams fall down on the last vital pass in an attacking movement by always trying to play balls for strikers to chase.

If they learn to vary their tactics in this area of the field by playing balls to the strikers' feet for them to hold or turn, they can become far more effective.

HOLDING/TURNING DRILL:

This drill develops the skill of turning, but as the practice progresses, the choice of when to turn or when to hold and shield the ball from an opponent is introduced.

Preparation - Mark out an area as wide and long as possible with cones. Have the players in three lines.

Procedure - Start simply. The players in line A pass to line B who turn with the ball and pass to line C. Line C control the ball, pass to B who turn again with the ball and pass back to A.

Notes -

1. Players will have been given the simple instructions 'Turn with the ball and pass to the other player.'

What is most likely to happen is that players wait for the ball, turn with it on the inside of their favoured foot in a large and cumbersome circle, and then part with it. Allow each one to have a go before stepping in.

2. The secret of turning is to do it quickly and

in the minimum of space.

Get players to meet the ball and find as many different ways of turning as they can.

3. It is possible that every known variety of the skill may emerge. If so, get the really classy ones to demonstrate.

If imagination is in short supply there are three effective methods for them to try:

a. Feint as if to turn one way with the ball on the inside of the foot then, as the ball arrives move inside it and turn with the ball on the outside of the foot, going off in the opposite direction.

b. Move quickly to the ball, touch it lightly to check its pace, then glide the foot over the ball, at the same time turning to face the opponent with it.

c. As the ball arrives, draw it with the inside of the controlling foot between the legs and turn quickly. Make sure the touch is not so firm that it stops the movement of the ball but not so light that it is allowed to escape.

4. Much of the success of this skill lies in the quality of the initial pass so keep a close eye on the quality of service to the turning player.

Variations -

1. Make the players in line C into defenders so that the turning players can test their skill.

Limit the strength of challenges at first.

2. Introduce holding and shielding the ball. The value of this part of the twin skills is that it keeps possession whilst others move to support.

When the ball is played in get players to hold it and keep it away

from opponents' challenges for a few seconds before returning it to the server.

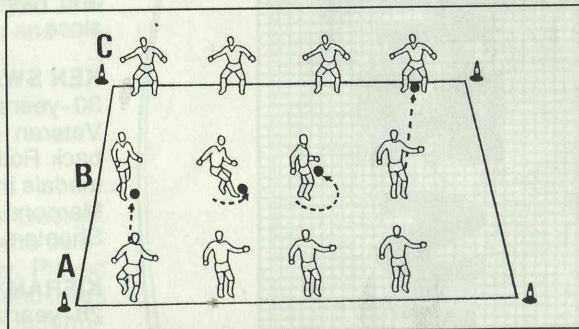
3. Bring in the option of either turning or holding. Goalkeeper(s) can float around in the danger area so that players can either turn and test them with shots or hold the ball, return it to the server and run onto a through pass to shoot.

A useful tip on turning to chase a pass: most players turn outwards. Try turning inwards. Being first to the ball is often a matter of inches. This habit may make inches of difference.

4. There is no limit to the number of touches a player needs to hold the ball. But one touch is often a surprise and therefore an effective method of escaping from a defender.

CHECKLIST:

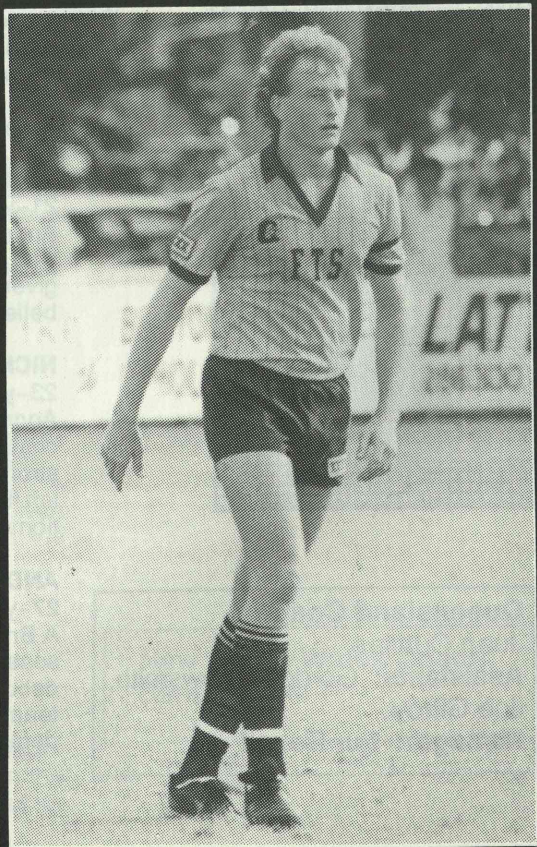
1. Decide early whether to hold or to turn.
2. Develop a range of turning skills by frequent practice.
3. Turn quickly & try to assess the space available.
4. Keep the body between the ball & opponent.
5. If holding, keep the ball as far away from the opponent as possible.
6. 'Going & checking' helps to make valuable space in which to work.

There will be certain people who will show the red card to this letter but I hope that some will thank and discuss the issue and consider the benefits.

A limited amount of good coaching from the sideline can help in the area of developing players.

This is what junior games should be all about.

Let's look at the situation from a junior club's position where the average family is to be found.

The beginning of February is usually "sign-on" for most clubs with February and March being taken up trying to organise teams, coaches, trial matches, fields and competing with the finals etc of swimming, cricket and a number of other sports.

Most parents are just beginning to recover from "back to school" expenses. Social contact, even in the best organised clubs, is not exactly top of the list. Coupled with the above, clubs have deadlines imposed by their own associations for team nominations etc.

Experience has shown that most of this work is carried out by dedicated committees high in commitment but usually short in time, resources and numbers.

Contact with players and parents is limited unlike a work or school situation. By the time the season ticket package put out by QSF was able to be bought to the attention of junior club members via newsletter, the season was only two fixtures old.

Tickets were possibly returned rather than run the risk of not selling them in the short time available.

Perhaps some "self examination" by those responsible could be part of the answer. Questions such as timing, product desirability, what happens in the real world as opposed to what we would like to happen and back-up advertising could be asked.

This of course is a personal view and not that of the club I support.
