NO BLUES IN MAROONS' MAGIC ORIGIN VICTORY

The left boot of volatile Queensland midfielder Nick Meredith allowed the Maroons to snatch a surprise victory in the State of Origin match against NSW at Perry Park last weekend.

Meredith unleashed two stinging shots from his favourite foot to score both goals in Queensland's 2-0 win over a powerhouse NSW team

The former Brisbane Lions player, who transferred recently to Newcastle Austral, was the hero of the Queensland team and the horde of supporters who turned out for the match.

Queensland, rank underdogs going into the match, produced a sparkling performance to keep their interstate rivals at bay.

Leading the Maroon brigade were experienced NSL players Alan Hunter, Danny Wright and Steve Jackson who flew from interstate especially for the State of Origin clash.

Hunter and Jackson led by example from the back, while Wright combined with Frank Pimblett in the midfield to win valuable ball for the Queensland forwards.

But it was the committed effort from every Queensland player which paved the way for victory.

As one player was heard to comment after the game "you can't underestimate Queensland's pride – wearing the Maroon jersey means a lot to us guys".

Stuart Woodruffe never looked troubled in goal while his backmen Frank Mengotti, Andrew Stowell, Ibro Cahut, Hunter and Jackson continually repelled the NSW attacking force of Socceroo strikers David Lowe, Greg Brown and Tony Krislovic.

Pimblett, Wright, Meredith and Chris Slater did the job in the midfield while Kieran Cooper, Sean Cranney and replacement Clayton Koch caused the NSW defence plenty of problems.

Queensland's first goal came just before half time from a free kick just outside the 18-yard box.

Pimblett tapped the ball to Meredith who slammed it through a hole in the NSW defensive wall and past diving 'keeper Tony Franken.

NSW's best chance to score in the first half was in the 33rd minute when a soft Krislovic shot inside the six-yard box was cleared off the line by Jackson.

Queensland almost increased their lead just after the break when Koch rounded replacement 'keeper Bob Catlin, only to see his shot hit the upright.

Koch hit the same post again 10 minutes later after being allowed to turn unmarked inside the penalty area.

NSW threw everything at Queensland in the final 15 minutes, but were unable to break down the defence.

Meredith sealed the match result with a powerful shot from 30m out that caught Catlin completely by surprise.



The win, which breaks a three year drought against the Blues, was also a triumph for new Queensland coach Juan Cutillas.

Cutillas, who took over the coaching job from Bruce Stowell in March, was understandably delighted with the result.



PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT with Bruce Stowell

This week we look at holding and turning.

This is physically a demanding practice as well as one which places a high premium on skill.

Holding/turning is very much a matter of quickness and sureness of control allied to confidence and courage.



PREPARATION

Divide the players into even-numbered groups with a minimum of six in each group. The size of the area is not important but should be large enough for the players to make passes of acceptable length. Give half the players in each group different coloured bibs (for later stages of the practice). Only one ball to each group.

PROCEDURE

As shown in the diagram, the formation is a rough circle of players on the outside with the two in the middle. The practice starts by having the ball played into the middle for the two players to compete for possession.

The player who wins the ball tries to keep it by holding it, shielding it, turning with it, and passing it back to players on the outside.

When players on the outside receive a pass from the player in possession they return it directly to the same player.

NOTES

1 This is an extremely tiring practice so make sure that players are not kept too long in the middle.

2 Players on the outside in a practice like this tend to think that they are only there for ornament especially those who have just come out of the middle. But they play a crucial part so encourage them to keep alert and expect the ball all the time. If they slack the vital momentum of the practice is lost.

3 Players should do several stints in the middle but look for illmatched pairs. Players who are outclassed tend to give up and spoil things for the rest so be prepared to swap pairs around.

VARIATIONS

1 Those in the middle may only pass to players wearing the same colours.

2 Those on the outside pass between themselves to select better angles and alternatives for the return pass to the player in the middle. There is no competition on the outside though as that would lead to a shapeless scramble.

ZONE GAME


PREPARATION

Mark out an area shown in the diagram (but without shaded parts). The number of players in the game should not be too large as we are looking for one against one situations with the player receiving the ball under pressure from a defender. Half the players are defenders, half attackers. Both are restricted to their own zone.

PROCEDURE

One of the goalkeepers starts the game by distributing to a teammate. The aim of the game is to get the ball into the attacking zone for a striker to receive, turn, and shoot at goal.

The strikers in the attacking zones may not pass to each other. This means that they are forced to turn in order to get in a shot or to play back into the defensive zone for a pass into the attacking zone. There are no offsides in games of this kind.



NOTES

1 Keep an eye on defenders when the ball is in their attacking zone. They tend to relax. Make sure they make themselves available for a return pass from the attacking zone.

2 The shaded areas in the diagram show good positioning by the attackers. They have left an area (shaded) into which they can move to collect the ball and which leaves them a safety margin if their initial control is a bit faulty. The attackers in the other zone are right up to the line so any failure to control the ball will see it back across the line into the defenders' zone.


3 This is a good point to introduce "going & checking". In its simplest form it means attackers move towards their opponents' goal taking opponents with them then quickly move back towards their own goal to make themselves some space in which to receive the ball. It is the sudden move away from the defender which creates the space as the defender is still going in the opposite direction. An attacker who stands still is easy to mark.

VARIATIONS

1 Numbers must not be too large or the opportunities for attackers to practice the skill will be limited. If numbers are large but space permits, mark out more areas and have games taking place simultaneously.


2. An interesting variation is to put in an extra (central) zone to give midfield players some practice. These players play with both sides taking the part of whichever side passes the ball into their zone.







Dear Sir,

I am writing this letter in reply to Mr John Browett's Letter to the Editor in Soccer 91 (vol. 2, No 10). It leaves no uncertainty in my mind that coaches do not know the laws of the game of soccer football and have no intentions in learning them.

This year I gave a law book to a top coach who annoyed the hell out of me with his comments about the referee's decisions and his

coaching from the sidelines.

He again approached me some weeks latter and thanked me for the knowledge he had absorbed from the law book and it is now a pleasure to attend games his team are playing. There is certainly a change in this man's man management.

I would like to point out a few facts to you and other coaches.

1 Law 5 of the referee's chart clearly states in international board decisions section 12; the referee shall not allow any person to enter the field until play has stopped, and only then, if he has given him a signal to do so, nor shall he allow coaching from the boundary line.

Law books can be purchased from either senior or junior divisions of the referee's body and I would suggest that you and other coaches who wish to reach a higher standard in coaching purchase one.

2 My idea of a good coach is a person who has a good knowledge of man management. This is a must.

3 Somebody who can get his message across to his players at coaching and training nights and then sit on the bench and watch and enjoy some of the rewards of his hard work.

4 Record all the faults that may occur in the time his team plays and use this for further coaching.

5 Give his team credit from the sideline for a good pass or shot at

goal, but not abuse when something goes wrong.

6 All players from the time they start playing must be taught how to trap, head and kick a ball with both feet and run with the ball at their feet. 80 per cent of players around at present can not do any of these things

Who is to blame, not the referee, but bad coaching from people who only wish to win at all costs by shouting abuse at their own

players, the referee or linesmen from the sideline.

Soccer has certainly deteriorated in Queensland at present and this must have come from bad coaching, not refereeing.

Player Profile All coaches should have to do the same as referees – be a member of a coaching organisation and attend yearly seminars and monthly meetings.

This is the only way soccer will improve because some coaches

think they are law unto themselves.

I am sure 50 per cent of referees turn a blind eye to some of the ridiculous comments that they call out to their players and I have been asked many times, when I was refereeing, by players to please stop the coach coaching from the sideline because it is upsetting them.

My parting words to you are do a better job of coaching so that you will not have to be chipped by the referee for coaching from the

sideline.

It will certainly improve the standard of refereeing because we will be refereeing a better standard of players and we will once again get more people to follow the game because of the better standard of football.



Refereeing with Des Miles



George Courtney speaks at North Middlesex

The hall was jammed with members and guests for the recent visit of George Courtney, fresh from a game across in Portugal at Sport-

ing Lisbon.

The President's introduction highlighted just how busy the top referees in this country are, for aside from European appointments George had a Barclay's League game at QPR the afternoon after addressing North Middlesex and then was back in the capital three days later for Peter Shilton's testimonial at White Hart Lane. With all these impressive duties there may have been some thought that he had left his roots behind, but these were quickly dispelled when, in his opening remarks, Courtney emphasised he was still a referee who enjoys operating at the local park level of the game. As he said, "It keeps my feet firmly on the ground".

Throughout the evening he discussed points

that are very much current.

The first of these was the presence of television cameras and the possible effects on the game via the media's ever increasing technical improvements.

Whilst some referees feel the constantly present spotlight is intrusive George said "I don't mind this because I am of the television generation, I've grown up with TV as a refe-

Yet he did feel that occasionally, like all images, it can give the wrong impression and is becoming an influence on soccer because it could determine what people think.

Like news and other sporting events, television can only focus on one action amongst literally hundreds of others in the same scenario, by editing and mixing images it is possible to link two unconnected events, to make scenes appear a great deal closer together and therefore related when this might not be the case at all.

"Don't, please, always believe what you see." As with refereeing itself the individual should always draw their own conclusions and

not be directed by others.

"I establish control by talking to players as the game is going on – not when the game is static; not when the ball is out of play."

George had a positive message for those just starting out as officials – "there is far more pressure on referees than ever before."

In coping with this he outlined his prematch routine. He said he always preferred to instruct his linesmen out on the park as opposed to in the dressing room.

He felt it offered them a chance to relax in the fresh air but also to gain an insight as to the smell of the crowd, the mood and expecta-

That considered a referee must always officiate the game as they see it in any one moment.

The main struggle for any referee is to gain the respect and recognition of the players but once you have these, once you are seen as an official of a certain calibre you must not fall into the trap of complacency.

The job is a lot easier with that respect, but

it is a two way deal.

You must always work hard and remember there is a great deal at stake for the players at all levels of the game. A referee owes it to those players to give his best every time.

If you stick to your decisions, keep your

feet on the ground and operate a democracy with your linesmen then problems will be eliminated, or if not, greatly reduced.

One hundred per cent preparation offers a 95 per cent certain chance of getting through 90 minutes without a problem.

Much of the most important work, therefore has to be carried out before the game even

starts.

George summed up this theory by saying, "The art is to get people on to your side."

On the question of fitness George explained that he trained at least twice every week with professional athletes and coaches who could assess his relative needs and coach accordingly.

For those not directly involved with league refereeing he explained that there is not structured training in the league system, everything is a result of the individuals personal disci-

pline and commitment.

Instead of a single fitness test, George suggested that there ought to be regular tests, at least every two months, "to cope with the demands of a game that is changing rapidly."

"The game in the football league is a least thirty per cent quicker than it was eight years ago. The only way to keep pace with these changes is to be fit and for that you must train regularly."

"The wonderful thing about operating at all levels of refereeing is the number of friends you make. The most important element of refereeing for me since I started in 1962 is the element of friendship. We have a unique family.

In conclusion he outlined his main ambition, "Id love to referee the European Cup Final...because we've all got to have ambition.




