Profile - Brisbane United Chairman

Former Brisbane Lord Mayor Clem Jones O.A. could never be accused of not liking work. You would really have to say "work" is Clem's middle name - he just loves to get things done.

It is great to see this human dynamo at the helm of the Brisbane United project.

Clem has always had a vision for the home of soccer in Queensland and the announcement last Friday of Brisbane's entry into the NSL will no doubt be the catalyst for some exciting redevelopment at Perry Park.

Clem is a true sportsman at heart, he had a great cricket career at the University club, which spanned 30 years.

But most people would remember him as the city's Lord Mayor from 1961 to 1975.

He is remembered for restoring the financially ailing Brisbane Cricket Ground sending them packing to the dogs and rekindling the spirit of one of the world's greatest test arenas.

Clem is very much a doer - when Darwin was blown away in 1975, who did then Prime Minister Gough Whitlam send for to rebuild the city - Clem Jones. The flood disaster of Charleville last year saw Clem into action

Since his appointement first as a director and then as Chairman of Brisbane United Clem has put the shoulder to the wheel to help Brisbane Unitted gain entry into the NSL.

Five points is all that separates the top five teams after the completion of Round 10 of the

XXXX Soccer League.

With this weekend's fixtures signalling the halfway mark in the competition, so begins the speculation on who will win the premiership, make the finals and be relegated.

Despite losing last weekend, Rochedale Rovers remain on top of the table on 22 points having had seven wins from their 10 games.

Equal leaders are promotion surprise packets Brisbane Croatia, who have won the same number of games as Rochedale but are behind

on goal difference.

The league's reigning premiers Brisbane
Lions are occupying third place on 20 points,
just one in front of North Star, the pre-season

The match of the round last weekend was without doubt the North Star and Rochedale clash at a waterlogged Underwood Park.

Although North Star emerged muddy 3-2 winners, both teams put on marvellous foot-ball feast for fans and a draw probably would have been a fairer result.

Rochedale came back from a 3-0 deficit just after half time to almost snatch a draw in the action-packed final few minutes.

For North Star left back Nick Seeley scored

Lions did not score their first goal until the 81st minute, when Wayne Corbett hit from close range, with the second coming from a Frank Mengotti penalty well into injury time.

Over at Heath Park Eastern Suburbs continued their form revival by posting their second consecutive victory.

Thanks to goals from Geoff Maltby and stopper Stein Grodum Easts were able to account for the luckless Acacia Ridge who have now lost six in a row.

Coalstars, rocked by resignations and injuries to key players during the week, held Taringa Rovers to a scoreless draw at the Eric Evans Soccer Reserve.

According to reports both teams had chances to win the match, but bad finishing proved to the teams' undoing.



I am writing to express my disgust at the discrimination against women in soccer. I had this brought to my attention rather forcefully at a recent soccer game.

I am the manager of an under-15 team. Our coach and his wife both currently play soccer. The coach is a shift worker and cannot always make the games or training nights.

Last Tuesday, I raced home from work to train the boys, as did the coach's wife, however only three boys turned up to train.

This team is fresh and we had arranged some activities to help the boys get to know each other as well as improve their team skills.

On the weekend 13 boys turned up to play and I decided not to play

For the first half I left our 12 year old off (again), but, for the second half I put him on as I felt he had paid his dues and had the right to play. I pulled a fullback off and re-arranged three players.

One of the fathers complained about the boys being re-arranged, and that they didn't know what they were doing or what position they were playing. I told him that this problem was because they had not turned up for training.

He told me that while females were doing the training, the boys would not be turning up and that I must realize that these boys are not kids and they won't stand for a female training them.

I don't know about other mothers but I consider my 13-year-old to be a child and my 16-year-old, who is currently a member of the

under 16 representative team, is quite happy to have me give him extra training. (I coached his team for three years and am a qualified level 1 coach). This father has made no offer to assist with training the boys.

If this father believes that I, as a level I coach and the coach's wife as a player, are not knowledgeable enough to train juniors adequately, do other men involved in the soccer fraternity share this discriminatory belief?

We have two women involved with our team who currently play soccer for the club.

Perhaps the men don't realize that in the majority of cases it is mum who take the boys to the games and buys their gear.

All parents should realize that the coach has the final say and if he is unavailable, then the manager is in charge.

I'm sure the boys are embarrassed when their parent causes a scene as this father has at every game we have played.

At one game the referee left the field and came over to tell him to "shut up".

At last week's game he argued with the linesman who offered to let him take over, but he declined.

In conclusion, wake up Queensland soccer, and give women credit where credit is due.

As for the parents, put your hand up when coaches are being called for or let those who are prepared to help the kids do their job.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT with Bruce Stowell

In passing, so far, the emphasis has been on quality and possession

However, the most telling pass in the game is the through-ball; the pass which goes PAST opponents, the more opponents the better.

Unfortunately the attempt we see most often at our level is a big


boot downfield for the forwards to chase.

Ninety per cent of these finish up dead or in the opposing goalkeeper's hands.

It is an easy matter to get the ball into the opponents' danger area. It is even easier to get a player into the opponents' danger area. But it is extremely difficult to get both players and ball there at the same time and that is what the through pass is all about.

THROUGH BALL DRILL

This drill simulates in a very basic way, under slight pressure, a through ball situation except that the receiver player is facing the passer instead of moving up-field.

SAMFORD MATCH REPORT

Division 4: Samford 2 d Clairvaux Griffith 0.

Samford Rangers continued their unbeaten run at home with a convincing win over the recently merged Clairvaux Griffith.

After a lethargic start Samford settled down to play controlled football and hit the lead when John Henderson took on the defence only to be cut down by a visiting defender.

Craig Binnington's spot kick was clinical and the score remained to the break.

Two serious injuries saw us have to reorganise but substitutes Chris Tanzer and Craig Hughes fitted snugly into the defence to ensure Brown Park remained a graveyard for visiting teams.

Midway through the second session Gavin McLeod confirmed the three points when he rounded the keeper.

Later a Greg Morrison blast was brilliantly saved while David Williams had one cleared off the line.

With our next two matches at home Samford are well placed if good enough.

PREPARATION

Split the players into two groups then split them in half again, each half in a line facing the other as shown in the diagram. There should be a good passing distance between each half. Cones are useful in reminding players of distances.

PROCEDURE

The first player in each line passes to the first player in the line opposite then runs to the back of that line. Meanwhile the two halves of the team at right angles to them are doing the same thing.

1 On the face of it this is a simple drill, but there is need for care in the timing of the pass to avoid the ball striking a player or a ball running across from the other group. It is also good practice for the players having parted with the ball, running forward and looking around at the same time. Although in this case players are looking to avoid contact, what they are doing is also part of the skill of running onto a through ball.

2 Part of the fun of this drill is the collisions which occur and the penalties they incur. Be very alert to spot who is (or are) at fault in each

case and give them penalty runs or exercises.

3 Encourage players to talk and give information. Players tend to become absorbed in this practice and perform in silence.

VARIATIONS

1 Players can become ultra-cautious in trying to avoid mistakes and the practice can become artificially slow. If necessary, reduce the number of touches to three or even two.

2 Allow players to chip the ball as an alternative to passes along

the ground, but keep an eye on the quality.




