Round in Review

There will be more than just premiership points at stake when Brisbane Croatia and Rochedale Rovers clash in the XXXX Soccer League next weekend.

The league front runners will be playing for the President's Trophy, for the teams finishing first and second at the completion of the first round of fixtures.

Due to Ampol Cup commitments last weekend Rochedale are yet to complete their final fixture in the first round.

However they have still qualified to contest the President's Trophy on the basis they have amassed enough points to finish either on top or second behind Croatia.

Under QSF rules, the two leading teams after the first round play-off for the trophy when they meet in the second round.

Should this match end in a draw, the team first at the turnaround of the season will win the trophy and this may now depend on Rochedale's postponed game against Brisbane City which has yet to be rescheduled.

Croatia qualified when they defeated Coalstars at the Eric Evans Soccer Reserve last weekend.

State striker Kevin Meacock scored the only goal of the match in the 69th minute when he was able to flick a left foot shot past the advancing Coalstars' 'keeper Graham Ross.

Croatia's John Caric was sent off in the, at times, heated match and seven other players received yellow cards from referee Bob Eedy.

Both Caric and Frazier Cuba, one of the players cautioned by Eedy, will now miss Croatia's game this week against Taringa Rovers through suspension.

Coalstars coach John Ogden said his club was now desperate to sign a striker following the loss through injury of Peter Vogler and the resignation of Michael Babic.

"We need some front runners _ we can't defend for 90 minutes and not expect to concede when you are not sticking the ball in the back of the net," he said.

Brisbane Lions and North Star shared the premiership points when they met in the match of the round at O'Callaghan Park last Friday night

The top five clash ended in an entertaining 3-3 draw with both teams retaining their present positions on the points table – Lions in third place, one point in front of North Star.

Young striker Justin Playle, Chris Slater and Frank Mengotti scored for Lions while Jim McDonagh, who netted twice, and Dean Almond scored North Star's goals.

In the other Friday night match Eastern

Suburbs continued their solid form of late to beat Mt Gravatt 2-0 at Dittmer Park.

It was the fifth straight loss for the Hawks who are starting to slip down the premiership table.

State captain Frank Pimblett scored one of Easts' goals with the other coming from Chris Fegan.

Pimblett's goal, a cracking left foot volley from near the edge of the box, broke a six year drought for the busy midfielder.

In the only other XXXX League match played last week Acacia Ridge ended a six-game losing streak to beat Taringa Rovers 2-0 at Proud Field.

Ridge, who were without regular coach Eric Thompson, were pumped up for the match and seemed a lot hungrier than their opposition.

Taringa were hardly in the match and their disappointed Wayne Warren must be wondering where the answers lie to his team's inconsistent performances.

The Ridge's goals, both in the second half, came from Marc Flemington and Adrian Thompson.

The fixtures between Pine Rivers and Nerang and Brisbane City and Rochedale were postponed.

However all four teams played in Ampol Cup qualifying games last weekend.

The results were: Nerang 1 dr Gold Coast 1 (Nerang won 4-3 on penalties), Brisbane City 2 d Bundaberg 1, Mackay 2 dr Pine Rivers 2 (Mackay won 6-5 on penalties), Rochedale 5 d Mt Isa 3.

In the Second Division the Intermediate Cup will be played between Lutwyche and Willowburn in round 21 at the end of August.

The rules for this cup as similar for the President's Trophy outlined above.



PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

This week we continue with the "Through Ball Opposed Practice" drill.

The idea for this game was supplied by American Football.

The way in which the wide receivers fasten onto long passes in the end zone seemed a good basis for through pass practice in Soccer and of course it is a far more difficult skill to perform with the feet.



PREPARATION

Mark out a rectangular playing area into zones as shown in the diagram, with narrow end zones.

Divide the players into two teams (The teams from the previous drill maybe) and put two or three players from each team in the end zone towards which their team is playing. One ball is needed.

PROCEDURE

The team in possession in the central zone tries to thread a pass through to their receiver in the end zone.

The other team tries to intercept and set up their own play. A point is scored each time a receiver controls the ball in an end zone. Do not have too many players or there will be no way through.

NOTES

1 The central area is two separate zones and players must stay in their own zone. Therefore, at this stage, there is no direct challenge, simply the skill of trying to work an opening.

2 To ensure that the game does not develop

into a series of long thrashes at the ball in the hope that the odd one might reach the target, knock off a point every time a receiver in the end zone fails to control the ball within the zone. Include passes which are so hard they pass straight through the end zone.

3 Encourage players in the central zone to pass the ball around and probe for openings rather than have it banged backwards and forwards from zone to zone.

VARIATIONS

1 The initial phase of this practice suggests making low passes. Introduce chipping as a variation if players have not already tried it. Great delicacy is needed to avoid giving points away.


2 If players in the central zone are holding the ball too long and making too many passes before attempting a through pass, limit the

number of their passes.

3 Add an extra narrow zone at each end (see 5.3 below) and put one or two defenders in it. In the large central zone the players play normal soccer, attempting to work the ball through the added zone with its defenders to their receivers. Remember the conditions which apply to a zone game.

THROUGH PASS GAME

To really test the quality of a through pass we must now have practice in passing the ball forward for players to run into.



PREPARATION

For ease of organisation keep the zones basically as for the previous practice but introduce two empty zones, goals, and goalkeeper(s). If possible keep the same teams. **PROCEDURE**

The aim of the practice is to play a normal game of soccer in Zone C until the chance

arises to play a through pass into the shaded Zone B for a team-mate to run onto and shoot for goal.

NOTES

- 1 Only the goalkeepers are allowed in Zone A but they must not come out of it. No player is allowed into Zone B until the ball is played into it. Players are not allowed to run into Zone B with the ball.
- 2 A great deal of mobility is needed in this practice so encourage players to go and chick and try to sneak behind opponents to make runs into the shaded zone.
- 3 At first all sorts of passes will be made into Zone B but it will soon be noticed that the really effective passes will be the ones which are stroked not hammered.
- 4 This game shows players how important it is to push right onto the rearmost defenders. Encourage players to get their shots in as quickly as possible once they are into Zone B. VARIATIONS
- 1 Pair each player off with an opponent and play the game on that basis.
- 2 In the initial practice, players will only attempt to score from inside the shaded zone. Remind them that the game is about scoring also so encourage them to shoot whenever they are allowed the space.
- 3 Try playing the game without any zone restrictions but remind players frequently about the importance of playing balls PAST opponents.

CHECKLIST

- 1. Quality is the key-word. This type of pass must be measured not just hoofed forward for somebody to chase.
- 2. Use this pass either on the ground or in the air.
- 3. Always look for the opportunity to pass behind opponents.
- 4. Be prepared to pass diagonally past defenders as well as straight towards goal.
- 5. Remember It is easy to get the ball into the danger area. It is easy to get a player into the danger area. But it needs much practice to get them both in at the same time.

STATE DOC JUNIOR UPDATE

Under-16: Being the first under-16 State Talent Identification series to be staged, it gives me great pleasure to bring Soccer 91 readers up to date with this event.

It has been of great concern to me for some time now, that the gap between the National under-15 and National Youth Titles has meant a lack of opportunity in the development of players in the almost forgotten age groups of 16 and 17-year-olds at representative level.

This Talent Identification Series bridges that gap, and will present an opportunity for coaches and players to work together in an atmosphere of competition, where the development of the individual in preparation for future State and national representation is paramount.

At the conclusion of the series it is hoped that a squad of 20 players will have been selected who will then embark, later in the year, on a playing and coaching tour to Europe.

June 23 to 29 are from the Queensland Zones of South West Queensland, South East Queensland, Wide Bay, Wide Bay Secondary Schools, Central Queensland, North Queensland, Far North Queensland and the under-15 State squad.
