## Editorial

Does the relegation system within soccer solve anything, or does it create absolute confusion in the minds of supporters and the media.

Years of hard work building up club identities goes down the drain every year with the rise and fall of soccer clubs.

We have reached that stage of the season when panic buying and selling of players becomes a matter of survival for some clubs.

Clubs in the bottom half of the table are facing some tough decisions with 10 shopping days left before the June transfer deadline.

It all sounds like Christmas, however for the two clubs who find themselves at the bottom of the table come season's end, there will be no joy.

#### Restructuring

It will be interesting to watch the developments of the next few weeks as these events unfold.

Maybe it's time we looked at restructuring Queensland Soccer with an eye to catering for the future.

Soccer must realise its cannot remain stagnant and rest upon its laurels.

We must act quickly to develop plans to ensure the code's future by realigning itself with the expansion of Brisbane's mushrooming population.

A Queensland University study has projected the region from Sunnybank across to Acacia Ridge and through to Beaudesert will contain a population of 1.5 million people within 10 years.

This is only one region in the Brisbane and there is sure to be a similar growth in other areas of the city.

Soccer must be prepared for these developments and have clubs in positions to capitalise on this expected boom.

This then leads us to the question of whether the current senior clubs are positioned to meet the demand of our growing society.

Perhaps it's time clubs buried their traditions and made the future of soccer in Queensland their number one priority.

Clubs should look at amalgamation as a means of developing a solid base of support.

At present we are in a situation where there is a gross excess of clubs within close proximately of each other cutting each other's throats.

Surely it is common sense that if clubs pooled their resources – in terms of players, supporters and sponsorship dollars – instead of fighting each other, then soccer would be the winner.

## Round in Review

Former high-flying NSL glamour team Brisbane City is staring relegation in the face.

Although the season is far from over City are waging a desperate battle to stave off a drop to the second division.

They are languishing on the bottom of the premiership table in dramatic form reversal since their thrilling grand final victory less than 12 months ago.

They suffered a humiliating 6-0 defeat at the hands of Pine Rivers last weekend to plummet further into despair.

Each loss has brought relegation speeding closer and hardened supporters must have grave concerns for the future of the club.

The club has failed to bounce back after a mass exodus of players at the start of the season.

The new side has shown they possess the potential, but must find form soon if they are to get out of the relegation jail.

Just as City have faded from the spotlight, Rochedale Rovers has stamped itself as the new force in Brisbane soccer.

Rochedale claimed its first XXXX League trophy last weekend when they defeated Brisbane Croatia 1–0 to clinch the President's Cup.

They now have their sights set on capturing the premiership in the premier league.

Ironically Rochedale's team includes four former City first-team regulars, Kieran Cooper, Paddy Dillon, Lee Howells and Stuart Greer.

Rovers won the President's Cup in front of one of the season's biggest crowds at Underwood Park.

The President's Cup is played between the two leading teams after the first round of fixtures, an honour Rochedale shared with Croatia.

In other matches played last week Taringa Rovers have made making the five a difficult proposition after crashing to Mt Gravatt 3–0 at Jack Speare Park.

Rovers, who knocked off league front runners Croatia the week before, could not lift themselves for a similar performance against the Hawks.

Mt Gravatt continued their winning ways from last week when they defeated Acacia Ridge to end a long losing streak.

Nerang improved their chances of remaining in the XXXX League with a morale-boosting 1-0 win over Acacia Ridge.

It was only the second victory of the season for the Gold Coast club, promoted to the top league this season.

Coach Neil Burrows said he hoped the win would be the turning point of the season for his team.

Coalstars surprised Brisbane Lions by holding them to a 1-1 draw at Richlands Stadium.

The coalminers have been hit hard with injuries and suspensions in recent weeks forcing coach John Ogden to field a youthful and inexperienced team.

They put up a credible performance to hold last season's premiers to a draw.

Although his team remains in third position, Lions coach John Sime must be disappointed his team could not capitalise ona weakened Coalstars outfit.

Eastern Suburbs and North Star travelled to Nambour to play their XXXX Soccer League match as part of a concerted effort by the QSF to promote the game.

The match was played at the Nambour Showgrounds and signalled the opening of the the town's annual show.

A large crowd attended the match which ended in a 1-1 draw.

Easts scored in the first 10 minutes through the boot of Geoff Maltby, but North Star were able to equalise late in the game via Jim McDonagh to share the premiership points.

## PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

with Bruce Stowell

## DRIBBLING/RUNNING WITH THE BALL

There are two distinct types of dribbling/ running with the ball:

When the players has space in front to run at an opponent with the ball or space behind to

Tight situations where a player has little room in which to manoeuvre and has to jink and weave to squeeze through.

Players with this ability are an asset to any team and should be encouraged instead of being destroyed by shouts of 'greedy'. They are match-winners if they can turn it on in the area where it counts most - near the opponents' goal.

Although this is a drill, there is incidental opposition in the shape of other players who are moving around in the same space and need to be avoided.

#### **PREPARATION**

Mark out a large area. Each player in the practice should have a ball. This of course

brings us back to the old problem, but it is essential to get together as many balls as possible. If your team is still short of the target of one ball per player, then in this practice leave some of the players out to start with and keep swapping them for players on the inside. The practice is physically demanding and an occasional rest may be welcome.

#### **PROCEDURE**

The idea is for players to move around the area with the ball at their feet, looking for space, avoiding collisions.

#### NOTES

1 Collisions will occur though you need not mention the fact until there have been a few. This will almost certainly be due to the fact that most players run with their eyes down looking at the ball. Encourage them to look up as they play and their whole game will benefit.

2 Players have a natural tendency to run with the ball on the inside of both feet. If the ball is removed for a while, it can be seen that this is a most unnatural way to run as the feet are splayed outwards. Resume with the ball but

> encourage players to experiment with the outer surfaces of both feet as well.

In this practice players are usually so intent on controlling the ball that the speed of movements tends to slow down to just above walking pace. Get them to change pace as often as possible-from almost a standstill to a quick burst into open spaces for varying distances.

Players tend always to move forwards. Get them to change direction as well as pace, using dif-

#### ferent surfaces of the foot. **VARIATIONS**

Once the players have had time to digest all these ideas, set them sequences of movements to follow which bring in all the points regarding different surfaces of the feet, change of pace, change of direction.

2 Split the players into groups of three. They move around in file, the first player setting the pace and direction. The second player has the ball and follows on. The third player trails the other two. On the whistle, Number one goes to the back, Number two steps up to lead the line and Number three takes possession of the ball. This is a useful alternative if there is a genuine shortage of balls.

Finish with competition. All players in the area have a ball and must keep possession of their own whilst at the same time looking for the chance to kick someone else's out of the area. Players who are dispossessed must leave the playing area immediately. The winner is the last player left in possession of a ball.

#### CHECKLIST

- Develop the ability to move the ball with both feet.
- Develop the ability to use all the different surfaces of both feet.
- Develop the ability to change direction quickly to get out of tight corners.
- In a one against one situation, attack opponents with the ball to get into the space behind.
- 5 Make sure that when you have got past opponents, you have the speed to get away
- Keep your head up to assess all options. Next week Part 2 of Dribbling/Running with the ball.

## Refereeing with Des Miles

LONDON - Why are soccer referees treated like fairground ducks, there to be shot at by every Tom, Dick and Harry?

The man in black has always been the butt of spectators' jibes, but today he is being squeezed between the devil of dissenting players and the downright betrayal of support he had traditionally enjoyed from officialdom.

Ever since the 1990 World Cup, he has not been allowed to be his own man. Instead, he is being ordered to carry out a purge against the malice and the cheating of players distorting the spirit of a great game.

Any rational observer will back the essence of a directive from FIFA, the international ruler, declaring that time is up for cynical destroyers.

Some of us even incurred FIFA's wrath for deploring its overbearing rejection of a similar crackdown in England eight years ago.

But let that pass, which is more than unscrupulous defenders do any forward going for the goal.

To push, pull or hack down an opponent

has become condoned; worse, it has acquired the sobriquet "professional

Nothing is more inappropriate. But it grew in the culture of the '80's, and of course there is pain, confusion and outcry when suddenly a generation taught to cheat finds itself staring

red cards in the face. It is the pain of exorcism. Players are paying for what a leading Paris heart specialist, Guy Abitbol, first described as accepting

the deliberate foul as "just another technical

The good doctor's perception was dismissed elsewhere as Utopian meddling with a man's game.

Instead of the concept of giving and taking the knocks of a collision sport, the so-called professional foul symbolized the ruin of ideals without which there is no sport.

The wheel has turned its fullest circle in England, where the first crackdown was aborted. England, winner of FIFA's 1990 fair play awards for team and individual, has been shocked by 136 red cards in half a league

This far exceeds any season except that of 1982-3, the time when English referees tried to eradicate the cynical foul.

Ironically, English soccer is having such a

boom in popularity that, for the first time since the national team won the 1966 World Cup, the sport appears likely to attract 20 million spectators during a season.

This surge is inspired by the euphoria inspired by the national team's having reached the semifinals in Italy, and no doubt by the fact that the lid seems finally to have been put on hooliganism.














Dear Sir.
