Round in Review

Rochedale Rovers's unplayed fixture against Brisbane City could prove crucial in the club's quest to win the 1991 premiership flag in the XXXX League.

The round 11 game was postponed so as both clubs could complete their Ampol Cup matches in Queensland country centres.

The match is yet to be rescheduled by the QSF, but could be a blessing in disguise for the club.

This follows Rochedale's loss to Brisbane Lions in their top-of-the-table match at Richlands Stadium last weekend.

Lions outclassed Rochedale to run out 3–1 winners and draw equal with them at the top of the ladder.

Both teams are equal on 31 points, with Rochedale slightly ahead on goal difference.

They have a five points buffer from third placed Pine Rivers, who Rochedale play this weekend, and are six points from North Star and Brisbane Croatia, in fourth and fifth places respectively.

This means the three premiership points on offer in the re-scheduled City match will be vital.

Rochedale never really looked like troubling Lions with their player coach John Stewart commenting after the game that "it was the first time that so many players had been down on the same day".

Lions got off to a magic start when aggressive striker Wayne Corbett blasted a shot past Rochedale 'keeper Andrew Hobbs.

Firing

They went further ahead when Justin Playle scored after Corbett had hit the crossbar with a delicate chip shot.

Lions third goal came just after half time when Playle headed in a Chris Slater cross.

Rochedale's State striker Kieran Cooper scored late in the game with a fine rifling shot.

Pine Rivers bounced back to hammer Brisbane Croatia at Wendy Allison Park, emerging 5-1 winners.

After being defeated by Coalstars the previous week, Rivers came out firing and led 4-1 at half time.

Wayne McGauley netted twice and John Schiavo, Noel Carroll and John Preston once each while Michael Ecomovic scored Croatia's lone goal.

The loss was the fourth straight for Croatia, who have slipped to fifth spot on the ladder after leading the competition in the early rounds.

Acacia Ridge lifted themselves off the bottom of the ladder with a much-needed 4-2 victory over Acacia Ridge at Proud Oval.

The match was vital with both teams battling to remain in the XXXX League.

Frank Cole, Mark Battistin, Enzo Cupo and John Figliano each scored to help city leapfrog both Ridge and Nerang.

A pacy Taringa Rovers outfit was too tough in their match against Nerang at Jack Speare Park.

Taringa ran in three goals with a pair to captain Steve Glockner and one to Carl Peterson, while Nerang's Alistair Anderson also scored.

Mt Gravatt held North Star to a 1-1 draw in their match at Dittmer Park last Friday night to remain in contention for a final five spot.

Mark Hairsine scored for the Hawks and Mark Gilroy for Stars.

The Eastern Suburbs/Coalstars match was postponed with both teams travelling out of town to play in the Ampol Cup.

Easts defeated North Queensland 5-3 on penalties after a 2-2 full time scoreline while Far North Queensland beat Coalstars 2-1.

Mt Gravatt, Taringa Rovers, Brisbane Croatia and Rochedale Rovers will now contest the semi-finals of the Ampol Cup.

As you are aware Perry Park was under water during the disastrous 1974 floods and the water got into the basement of the club premises.

I was secretary of the Queensland Soccer Federation at the time and was called from my home in the early hours of the morning by the security personnel.

It was too late to save our records which by then were floating around the basement.

When the sun did eventually return I arranged for minutes, handbooks etc. to be laid on the field itself, but it was all to no avail and it was impossible to read anything.

Recently I wrote to Jim (Gilbert) and he very kindly had an item included in his official minutes seeking information from anyone who may have items from the formation of the Federation up to the time of the flooding to contact me or the Federation.

It is my intention to fill in the missing links as I believe in the years ahead it may be needed to have a record of its switch from the Brisbane and Ipswich Soccer Association and from the Queensland Soccer Association in the 1960s.

I am very disappointed at the lack of interest shown by our older followers in this vital project.

However I must thank Les Hewitt for items I received from him – they were helpful to give me a start.

I make an earnest appeal to anyone to please assist if possible by contacting me through the Federation.

Many thanks to the Queensland soccer community who supported us in such large numbers for the Saturday night game against New Zealand touring team Otago.

The Management Committee Promotions Sub-committee worked on a number of innovative ideas for the promotion of this match and it was obvious many benefits accrued.

In the weeks lead up to the big match we had a warm feeling that the crowd response would be improved.

The club responded by engaging six additional staff members over and above staffing levels utilised for the New South Wales State of Origin match.

Additionally, a dining room service was provided for the first

time and many people were appreciative of this facility.

Unfortunately we were unable to adequately cope with demand for canteen and dinning room services.

As General Manager of the QSF I learnt a great deal from the experiences of last Saturday's match. I can assure you that vastly improved services will be available for the Auckland game and other big matches to follow such as "Brisbane United".

I would like to thank "spectators" for their patience and support last Saturday evening.

Auckland (NZ) team will contain seven full New Zealand Internationals and three Youth International players and a great soccer spectacular can be assured.

Queensland coach Juan Cutillas promises that the Maroons team will be all out for a good win and the match is worthy of your continued support.

At the last meeting of the Management Committee a decision was made to accept an offer for the Queensland representative team to visit Christchurch (NZ) for a match against Canterbury on August 14.

The match promotion is organized to coincide with the official "switch on" of the new flood lighting facility.

The Management Committee also received a proposal from the Technical Development Committee to consider a new format for the IEA Inter City series for 1992.

The suggestion proposed that the series be divided into two groups with representative teams coming from Brisbane North, Brisbane South, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba and Ipswich.

This would mean that the representative teams would play two games in their group with the winners of each group to meet in the final.

MAROONS MANAGE DRAW WITH LAST MINUTE GOAL

Queensland came from behind to snatch a dramatic 2-2 draw in their representative match against touring New Zealand team Otago last weekend.

A rare Frank Pimblett goal in the 89th minute allowed the homeside to salvage some pride after trailing Otago for most of the second half.

The Maroons even had a chance to win the game in the action-packed final moments when referee Peter Hulme awarded a penalty late in injury time.

Hulme pointed to the spot when unlucky Otago defender Garry Clarke handballed in box after being unable to avoid a stwely-hit Pimblett volley.

Frank Mengotti stepped up to take the penalty, but Otago 'keeper Grant Mawston made himself a hero when he correctly lunged to his right to deflect the well-struck shot.

A large crowd of over 4000 packed Perry Park under a starry Saturday night to cheer on the Maroons.

Respect

Queensland started the match in convincing fashion, controlling the flow and attacking freely.

The Otago team showed the Maroons plenty of respect playing with three centrebacks in a five-man defensive formation.

They were also not afraid to get people behind the ball when Queensland was in possession, which was to became a telling factor later in the game.

The Maroons had numerous scoring chances in the first half and but for a couple of quality saves by Mawston could have had a handy lead at the break.

Their best chance fell midway through the half when Peter Dwyer, Queensland's best forward, sent in a cross for Sean Cranney.

However his flick-on was superbly read

by Mawston who was covering the near post.

Dwyer tested Mawston close to half time with a sizzling long-range shot from 30m, but the Dunedin student was equal to the task.

Otago, perhaps surprised still to be on equal terms after being written off following their 3-2 loss to the Gold Coast Gamblers, went on the offensive in the second half.

The former New Zealand provincial cham-

pions, on their first overseas tour in the association's proud 103-year history, took Queensland completely by surprise in the 45th minute. Otago stole the ball almost from the kick-off resulting in lanky backman Dougal McGowan scoring a fine goal.

The goal silenced the crowd, but not for long as the Maroons' reply was swift.

Sweeper Frank Mengotti, pushing forward, threaded a shot through a crowded penalty area to level the scores two minutes later.

However Otago, who had grown immeasurably in confidence, began to attack and were rewarded when Chris Della Rocca left Queensland's defence floundering to score the easiest of goals.

Otago's Warren Gould tried to chip 'keeper Stuart Woodruffe who managed to get a hand

But Woodruffe only managed to tap the ball down and Della Rocca raced into the six-yard box to score.

The goal sent panic through the Queensland ranks, who were frustrated by the nononsense Otago defence.

The flair went out of their game and they

reverted to pumping long balls into a crowded penalty area where Otago's lanky central defender Clarke dominated in the air.

Pimblett's goal came from one of the few variations the Maroons executed.

Ironically the Queensland captain could not have waited for a better time to score his first goal for his State and his second goal in six years.

The large Perry Park crowd was treated to some nostalgia before the Queensland/Otago match when former NSL and State League players had an exhibition game.

The entertaining match saw some of the great names in Queensland soccer in the past two decades.

It was great to see the skill and flair of the players, who obviously enjoyed the chance to dust off their old football boots.
