

Editorial

Junior clubs and schools have been quick to thank the QSF for the free children's passes given out for the representative matches.

The good news is this process will continue for the Queensland/Auckland match at Perry Park on Sunday July 28.

All Brisbane junior clubs, junior Church league and 400 schools will receive free childrens' admission tickets to the match.

Soccer stands alone as the only major sport to maintain this approach for junior spectators.

Last weekend's rugby union match between Queensland and England saw children paying \$5 for outer tickets at Ballymore.

At other major sporting events children are asked to pay half the adult admission.

Clubs and schools are asked to circulate childrens' tickets fairly to make sure as many children as possible have the chance to see the Maroons play.

The QSF is also assessing all returned childrens' tickets and is in the process of developing a special Queensland Supporter's Club.

Members of this club will receive special offers to the Queensland team's future representative matches.

Parents will also benefit from the Supporters' Club with discounted ticket offers made available to them from time to time.

The Supporters' Club is part of the overall promotions plan to help lift soccer's image while also providing a base of support for the

Queensland team.

The final judging of the 1991 Miss Soccer Quest is now less than a month away.

The nominations from clubs keep rolling in which is great to see.

Last year's quest had 33 finalists, which was a record, but records are only meant to be broken.

So far this year 24 entries have been received, but the QSF is expecting an influx before the July 26 deadline.

The final judging will take play at the Italo-Australian Club at Newmarket on August 18.


Clubs would be wise to make their bookings now for the gala dinner dance.

Round in Review

Pine Rivers tumbled out of the five and Eastern Suburbs stamped themselves as serious finals contenders after last weekend's round of XXXX Soccer League fixtures.

Rivers, who started the week in third place, now find themselves in sixth spot following their loss to Brisbane Lions last Saturday night.

Easts, on the other hand, bolted into the five with a crushing victory over Rochedale Rovers.

Rochedale's loss surrendered the lead of the XXXX League to Lions, who moved three points clear at the head of the table.

The other two teams in the top five, Brisbane Croatia and North Star, also enjoyed wins last week.

Only three points now separates third to sixth places as the battle for finals positions begins to intensify.

Rivers' loss was their second on the trot and is of great concern for coach Bobby Hamilton, who had a top two finish in mind for his team.

A niggling injury to star striker Clayton Koch has also not helped the cause.

Koch damaged his tailbone a month ago and has been unable to shake the injury.

By contrast Easts have not been defeated in their past eight outings.

Ironically this coincides with the purchase of bullocking striker Geoff Maltby from North

Maltby has been in superb form since moving to Heath Park prompting State captain and Easts midfielder Frank Pimblett to say he had been a "bargain buy for club".

Easts still have their work cut out if they are to finish in the top five with their next two games against Brisbane Lions and Pine Rivers likely to hold the key.

But if they continue to show the form they did against Rochedale, they will give themselves every opportunity.

After weathering the early storm from Rochedale, Easts took control before running out 4-1 winners.

In the other matches played last week North Star recorded a 2-1 win over Taringa Rovers to push them into third position and put them back on track after draws to Nerang and Mt Gravatt.

Although Taringa is lying in ninth position, they are not yet clear of the relegation zone

Mt Gravatt and Coalstars shared the points when their match ended in a 1-1 draw.

The Hawks are still an outside chance of making the five, but will need to win most of their remaining games while Coalstars seem destined to finish midtable.

New XXXX League coach Zelko Bambic recorded his first win when Brisbane Croatia returned to form to beat Acacia Ridge 2–0.

Bambic replaced sacked coach Peter Bannon last week after the club lost five consecutive matches.

Nerang, fighting to avoid relegation, also drew with the struggling Brisbane City.

The match, which both teams were desperate to win, ended in a 1-1 draw.

This leaves Acacia Ridge by themselves on the bottom of the table, just one point behind Nerang and two behind City.

All three teams have tough runs home making the relegation battle an extremely interesting one.

I and a lot of other people would like to know how he can be dropped without a fair go, if he was deemed to be not good enough then he should not have been selected in the first place.


I should like to take this opportunity to congratulate the QSF on the initiative of organising so many games for the State team and give the supporters a chance to see them on a regular basis.



Fostering the code throughout the schools is an area I try to be involved in as much as I can. The demand is great both at primary and secondary institutions.

Being part of the Aussie Sports Program, designed by the Department of Sport and Recreation, can usually mean coming into contact with up to six mixed classes over a four-week period.

There are some important dates coming up on the junior soccer calendar.

The first is that some under-11 fixtures will be held at the Atlanta Field at Geebung on July 20.

The fixture games for under-11's will give representative coaches a look at prospective players for the next representative season.

If clubs have players who are not in the divisions playing at Geebung they should write to the Representative Teams Coordinator setting out the names of the players who are possible representative material.

The coaches can then go to club fixtures to have a look at them.

This also goes for players who are playing out of their age group. Although every effort is made to make sure that all players who are eligible for selection are looked at for representative team selection the odd one slips through.

Your help is needed to make sure that all players get a fair go. Some fixture games for the under-12 division will be held at North Star on July 27 and the same conditions will apply as for the under-11 age group.

Some under-13 fixtures will be held on August 11 at Mitchelton. In this case it is known that there are players who are playing in the under-15's and in lower divisions.

These players need to make themselves known so they can also be considered for representative duties.

The Pine Rivers Club had an under-14 team compete in the Kanga Cup held in Sydney in the first week in July.

The team raised more than \$8,000 to get themselves there and played against some very experienced campaigners such as representative teams from Nepean, Schofields, Parramatta Melita and the United States.
