Editorial

A very special welcome to the Auckland team. Queensland last played Auckland in the Shaky Isles in 1987 and that match ended in a 1-1 draw. The last visit by Auckland to Brisbane was in 1970. Auckland defeated Queensland 3-1 on that occasion.

Auckland is the third New Zealand Province to visit Queensland Soccer Headquarters, and like the other two matches, the home side will have a tough fixture on their hands.

The Queensland soccer public have already found out how competitive New Zealand soccer teams are. We have already been witness to two nailbiting draws against Canterbury and Otago and this match will be no exception.

Smorgasbord

Winter season 1991 has been used to weld a very strong football association between Queensland and New Zealand which can only be strengthened as the years roll on. Representative football is certainly here to stay and plans are currently being formulated for season 1992. With the soccer world being so big it is like a giant smorgasbord when it comes to inviting teams to play at Perry Park.

It is also top priority to develop strong interstate competition for our senior team. Queensland's young soccer players are brought up on a diet of interstate football as they progress through their junior ranks. Over many

years interstate senior competition has been badly neglected and its development must be pursued for the betterment of Australian soccer.

This season we have rekindled Victoria's interest in playing Queensland after a drought of 8 years. South Australia are also keen to throw out the challenge to Queensland in 1992, while even the Northern Territory are eager to be involved in a high standard competition.

Football like this at a high standard is what the public wants to see. Couple this with overseas club sides visiting Queensland and we have a recipe for future development. All soccer administrators must realise that you must give the public what they want or they will go to another form of sporting entertainment to get it. Club support is to be admired but for the sake of the game we must look at the broad picture.

Round in Review

Brisbane Lions look set to win back-to-back premierships after a tight 1-0 victory over Eastern Suburbs at Lions Stadium last weekend.

The clash, billed as the match of the round, was settled twelve minutes before time when former Eastern Suburb's striker Wayne Corbett slammed the ball in from close range after East's keeper Dave Mewburn was unable to hold a Tony Duffy shot.

Lions, whose blend of youth and experience is proving successful, have been boosted by the addition of midfielders Wayne Hinton and Craig Collins, both products of Queensland State Junior sides.

Remaining undefeated since the second week in April, Lions are now six points clear of second-placed Rochedale Rovers who went down 1-0 to last-placed Acacia Ridge at Underwood Park.

Rochedale, who have lost three of their last four games, are struggling to find form and must be giving Coach John Stewart plenty of sleepless nights.

The win to Acacia Ridge however was one of guts and determination and what we will probably see a lot more of, as relegation looms closer, for teams at the bottom of the table.

In other matches third-placed North Star

were shock 2-1 losers to Brisbane City at Spencer Park.

Goals from Jason Poggi and new signing Jean Paul DeMarigny sealed the result.

Jim McDonagh replied for North Star after State Representative Shane Haddow was brought down in the penalty area.

City, who have beaten North Star twice this season, have joined Taringa on 16 points after Taringa were well beaten 4-1 by Pine Rivers.

Pine Rivers, who returned to the winner's circle after two losses in as many weeks, are now equal third with a game in hand, two points ahead of their next round opponents Eastern Suburbs.

Taringa on the other hand are now facing the real threat of relegation and coach Wayne Warren must be frantically searching himself for answers.

With matches against both Brisbane City and Acacia Ridge to come, their fate is certainly in their own hands.

Coalstars and Mount Gravatt, who played an exciting 1-1 draw last week, are now equal on the Premiership ladder with 20 points.

Coalstars, led by coach John Ogden, easily accounted for last-placed Nerang while an own goal allowed Mount Gravatt to come away with a 1-1 draw against Brisbane Croatia.

Nerang's loss to Coalstars could signal

relegation for the Gold Coast side with their remaining four games being against Croatia, Rochedale, Lions and Pine Rivers.

The draw for Croatia has kept coach Zelko Bambic's unbeaten record intact and consolidated their position in the top five.

The battle for places in the top five is hotting up with North Star, Brisbane Croatia and Pine Rivers all sitting on 29 points.

Only Lions and Rochedale seem assured of a top five finish with the other three spots still up in the air.

This is evidenced by the fact that the last four rounds will see two of the top five teams clashing every week, so the soccer will be exciting.

With no fixtures due to the Maroon's clash with Auckland it will be an ideal time for players to rest up and prepare for the run to the finals.

I am a 22 year old soccer fan from Sutherland Shire and was recently in Brisbane for 2 weeks during which time I made sure I caught at least one local match. Having been to State League games since I was 7 and a regular at NSL matches since the inception of summer soccer, I was quite certain that the standards of the XXXX League would be well below those that I was used to.

What a pleasant surprise I had then, when I attended the recent Easts v Rochedale Rovers match at Heath Park. Despite a low profile in the local papers and a few problems finding the ground by public transport I thoroughly enjoyed my afternoon.

The pleasant atmosphere, superbly stocked canteen and bar (inc. hamburgers - no NSL grounds in Sydney sell hamburgers), excellent programme and competitive football, compared favourably with some of the sub-standard conditions and life threatening situations that one encounters at NSL matches.

Simple attractions such as 2 raffles, seating and "soccer-doubles" were quite attractive. The soccer doubles were quite new to me and had me quite interested in the outcome -

my card was for a 5-1 home win (why couldn't they score one more!).

The 300 odd crowd also added to the atmosphere in no small way.

I wish the Brisbane United team every success in the upcoming NSL season, though I expect they may initially struggle, if the standard of the Easts - Rochedale game is indicative of local standards. Both sides were quite physical and often resorted to long-ball tactics, which will be easy prey for the more experienced NSL sides, who have progressed quite a bit since Brisbane's last NSL team.

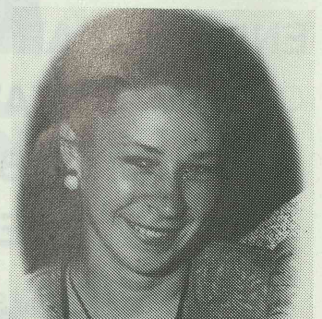

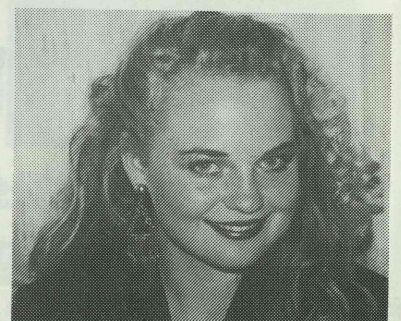

The aggregated Queensland Television Stations continue to provide good Queensland coverage for the soccer television commercial and already we have received more than \$200,000 worth of free advertising.

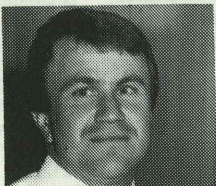

EYE ON ENGLAND

Platt Hits the Jackpot in his Bari Deal

England star David Platt has completed his transfer to Italian Club Bari for a British record fee of 5.5 million pounds (A\$11.55 million). Following seven hours

of talks spread over two days, Aston Villa chairman, Doug Ellis, agreed a 5.5 million fee for Platt to join Bari on a three-year contract believed to be worth 4 million pounds (A\$8.24 million) to the player.

Villa will also receive 50 per cent of any subsequent transfer fee above 5.5 million pounds if Platt decides to move on.

He will become an instant millionaire, a far cry from when he was given a free transfer by the now Villa boss, Ron Atkinson. Our national team manager, Graham Taylor said "He has assured David Platt that his move to the Italian League would not affect his England chances", and the outspoken Doug Ellis added "Bari have secured one of the best players in the world".

The fee equals the amount AC Milan paid for Dutch International, Ruud Gullit, and is only bettered by the 8 million pounds (A\$16.48 million) Roberto Baggio cost when he moved from Fiorentina to Juventus before last summers World Cup Finals.

Previous British players who have been tempted by the lure of the 'lire' have included Ian Rush, Liam Brady and Trevor Francis, and those three all returned 'home'

after spending a short term in Italy.

Pigeons 'Drop' In

Oldham Athletic, the first division's 'new boys' for the '91 - '92 season, have had their new grass pitch sabotaged by Pigeons. Bare

patches have appeared all over Boundary Park because the birds are having a feast and appear totally fearless. Even a high-tech "scarecrow", and a succession of fire-crackers attached to a rope, has failed to deter them. Oldham secretary Terry Cale says "The pigeons sit and wait for the fire-crackers to go off and then dive in again. We are at a loss what to do!" He added "Several of our players are keen to start a Pigeon racing club!"

Australian Sold for \$63,000

Second division Swindon Town have paid first division London club Chelsea 30,000 (A\$63,000) for the Scottish born Australian David Mitchell. The player had previously had a spell with the Dutch club side, Feyenoord.

Some dizzy results last weekend when only one of the top five in division two won their match, rocketing OLYMPIC UNITED from sixth to third spot on the ladder.

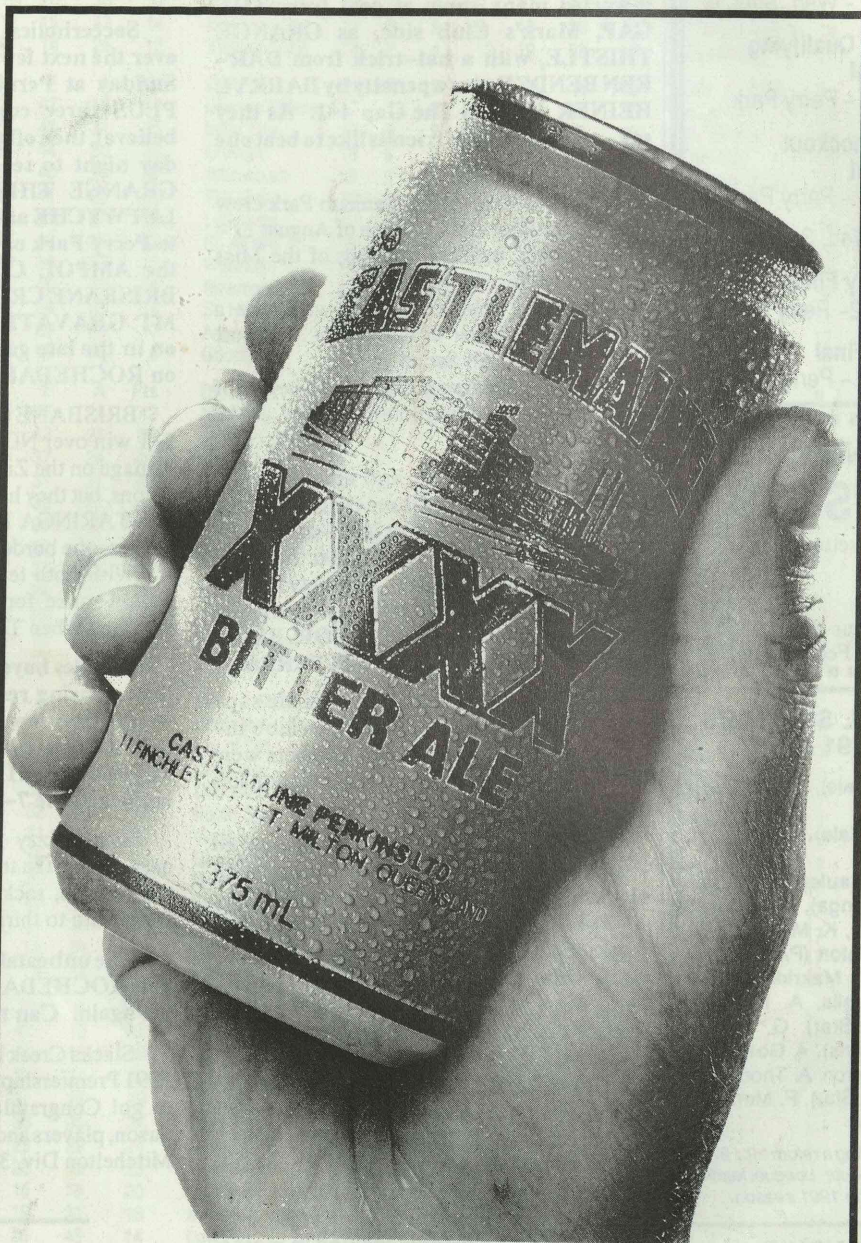
