Round in Review

Queensland kept its unbeaten record against New Zealand sides intact with a draw against a powerful Auckland team at Perry Park last Sunday.

The Maroons' overcame crippling disruptions to come from behind and snatch a deserved 1-1 result in front of the season's biggest crowd of more than 4500.

Queensland have not lost to a New Zealand team this season having kept provincial sides Canterbury and Otago to 2-2 draws earlier this year.

The match against Auckland was a contrasting affair, the aggressive Kiwi side dominating play in the first half with Queensland coming home with a wet sail.

The Maroons' gameplan had to be abandoned early when they lost lanky defender Mark Greer with a knee injury inside the first 10 minutes. Greer is now likely to miss the remainder of the season after being diagnosed with medial ligament damage.

Auckland, rated as the toughest Kiwi team to visit the Sunshine State this season, were quick to capitalise and took the lead in the 22nd minute. Classy Auckland and All Whites striker Noel Barkley made a good run before slamming his left foot shot from

25m out

'Keeper Dave Mewburn failed to hold the ball, which popped out for Mark Elrick, whowas on hand to clean up.

Despite being a goal down at the break, Queensland never panicked and slowly clawed their way back into the match.

Their cause was helped by Juan Cutillas' tactical move to swap Ken Swan, who replaced Greer, to the midfield and push Shane Haddow to right back.

Queensland equalised in the 55th minute when a heavily marked John Brown connected with an awkward overhead shot after some good lead-up work. The shot caught Auckland 'keeper Jason Batty completely by surprise as it looped into the net.

Young Brisbane Lions' midfielder Chris Slater, playing as a striker, had a chance to win the match for the home team late in the game.

However, Batty produced a fine save to block Slater's rifling shot. The draw completed a successful debut season for new coach Cutillas.

Cutillas took over the coaching reins from long-serving custodian Bruce Stowell, who resigned at the beginning of the

year. To go with their three draws against the Kiwis, Queensland also inflicted a crushing 2-0 defeat on NSW in the annual State of Origin match in May.

The team's only loss was against Victoria in April when the Maroons went down 3-2.

Cutillas will now prepare his side for their visit to Christchurch on August 13 for a return Trans Tasman encounter with Canterbury. A proposal by the NZFA for the New Zealand Olympic side to play a match against Queensland in Brisbane is also currently being considered by the QSF.

Cutillas' promise to pick play-

ers on form and play an entertaining brand of football has paid handsome dividends for Queensland soccer.

The former national coach of the Philippines has called up more than 30 players for State duty, many of them making their senior debuts.

This has included blooding a number of promising future prospects such as John Brown, Glen Gwynne and teenagers Sean Cranney and Darren Hillier.

This philosophy was highlighted in the match against Auckland with a number of young players in the starting lineup.

Queensland Soccer" entrant they've had over the years, but we believe this year's entrant, Justine Creed, is in a class of her own. It's nice to read that you agree with us.



Many thanks to the large crowd who turned out last Sunday to watch the Queensland and Auckland representative clash.

It was our largest crowd so far this season and augurs well for Brisbane United's summer fixture schedule which will commence in the first week of October.

Last weekend, whilst soccer was on show in Brisbane, Queensland was pleased to host visits from the Deputy Chairman of the Australian Soccer Federation (ASF) John Dimtsis and fellow commissioner Dr Graham Bradley.

Both commissioners were able to have lunch with officials from

Department of Employment officials have called time on Australian keeper Mark Bosnich's stay at Manchester United.

Old Trafford boss Alex Ferguson, who was grooming the 19-year-old as a star of the future, had to deliver the news after the English first division club failed to secure a work permit.

A sportswear company is putting 10 million pound (A\$21 million) into a five year sponsor—ship deal with the big spending Leeds United.

The arrangement guarantees the Elland Road club 7 million pounds (A\$14.7 million) over 60 months and, with added bonuses for success, the figure could rise to an incredible 10 million (A\$21 million).

The sponsorship will be British soccer's biggest ever and will bring back memories of the great Leeds United sides of the 70s who were backed by the same company under the all-conquering managership of the now, late, great, Don Revie.

A soccer and rock music fan proved he was ''Name'' for a laugh this week by changing his name to honour his heroes West Ham United and the Rolling Stones.

Hammers mad Gavin Foster, 23, lives in Cowes on the Isle of Wight and travels the 180 miles round trip to watch first division West Ham play at home.

Gavin, a local newspaper reporter, said "I put the address of the ground in to remind me where I spend so much time!"

He added the East London club's anthem in his 28-word name, and now likes to be called

many affiliated bodies and in particular delegates from the Queensland Junior Soccer Council.

It was an ideal opportunity for many of our soccer administrators to meet the ASF officials and some very worthwhile discussion eventuated.

It was interesting to note in commissioner Bradley's address that he drew attention to a recent policy decision made by the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) in respect to hockey.

The ASC has advised that both the Women's and Men's Associations amalgamate by the next Olympic Games.

The decision by the powerful body adds a new dimension to administrative sports planning in this country.

The Management Committee, at its last meeting, appointed

Brisbane Lions coach John Sime to assist Jim Selby in the preparation of this year's under-17 Queensland team for the National titles.

The National titles will be held at Parklea in Sydney from October 6 to 12.

More than 20 applications have been received from a very talented field for the vacant State Director of Coaching position.

Applications have been received from America, New Zealand and every State of Australia except Tasmania.

The Management Committee is desirous of making an appointment before the end of this month.

"Gavin West Ham United Football Club The Boleyn Ground Upton Park E13 I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles Rolling Stones Mick and Keith God Bless the Old Midnight Ramblers Foster".

With only two weeks to go until the 1991/92 Barclays Football League season kicks-off, the transfer deals involving the majority of the 93 English league

clubs continue to keep the club chairmen busy with their pens.

At least 200 deals have gone through within the past 10 days, and when August 17 arrives, several new faces will be lining up against former team mates from the last campaign.

John Barnes, the Liverpool and England star, will reap 15,000 pound (A\$31,500) per game this season.Barnes' new one-year contract is the biggest given to a player in this country.

The big deal will make him more than 9,000 (A\$18,900) a week in wages, and perks and bonuses will bring in a yearly pay packet of one million pounds (A\$2.1 million).

The FA Cup kicks-off again next month and the dates to remember are listed below.

August 31 (preliminary round), September 14 (first qualifying round), September 28 (second qualifying round), October 12 (third qualifying round), October 26 (fourth qualifying round), November 16 (first round proper), December 7 (second round), January 4 (third round), January 25 (fourth round), February 15 (fifth round), March 7 (sixth round), April 4 (semi-finals), May 9 (final at Wembley).

What price Liverpool for relegation to Division 2 at the end of the coming season?

Dean Saunders, the recent 2.9 million pound (A\$6.09 million) record buy, has the dubious record of being relegated with all of the clubs he has played for.

The Welsh international, who has been with Swansea City, Brighton and Hove Albion, Oxford United and Derby County can look forward to ending that achievement with the Merseysiders.

JUNIOR SOCCER

RDOC

As part of the ASF Development Program Roo-Ball will be the new modified game of soccer. Its introduction in Australia is to standardise the numerous versions of mini-soccer.

One of the changes is that the under-10s will have another year of playing in the modified game.

Roo-Ball has been designed to give young players the maximum opportunity to participate in the game to develop their ball skills and most of all to have fun and to continue to play soccer throughout their life.

Information to clubs is being circulated to coincide with a national launch next month.

Craig Johnston will be in Brisbane for the Queensland launch on the weekend September 7-8. Roo-Ball information is available from junior associations.

BRISBANE NORTH

The Talent Identification program underway at Brisbane North was taken a step further last weekend.

All games in Division 1, 2 and 3 in the under-12 age group were played at North Star.

Only two clubs missed the day and their players will be looked at by the representative coaches at the next possible opportunity.

The next Talent Identification Day will be at

Mitchelton for the under-13 age group in Divisions 1, 2 and 3.

Please have your club make sure of the fixture time and location well in advance of the date.

One of the hardest people to find for coaching these days is a good goalkeeper coach.

One of the reasons they are hard to find is the hard time young kids give 'keepers from behind the nets during games.

Please have a little bit of sympathy for the goalkeeper. Don't give him a hard time. He might be the player to coach you next year.

The number of new coaches in Brisbane since the commencement of the season is close to 350.

The aim of having all coaches qualified by the end of the 1992 season is gaining momentum.

If your club has not participated in a Coaches Qualification Program please contact The Secretary of the Brisbane North Association at P.O. Box 1268 Stafford.

After the Annual General Meeting this year work will start for the 1992 season.

This will be a watershed year for soccer in this State. Your assistance is needed. If you have a few ideas about football why not think about putting some effort into juniors. It is worthwhile. For all those players, referees, linespeople and club officials who missed reading Law 12 on page 25 of the Referees Chart it says that a player shall be sent from the field of play if he is guilty of foul or abusive language.

The player who described a spectator in unreasonable terms at a match at Beenleigh last week needs to be advised that the man he abused is not what the player said he was.

The man and his wife, who also heard what the player said, have both spent many years helping junior players and the code.

Clubs have to take a better stand with players who are unable to grasp the English language and only talk dirty.

Brisbane South have completed field days for the under-11 and under-12 age groups.

Players selected to trial for representative team selection will be advised during September.

Three fixtures remain to complete the season fixtures calendar, and in many divisions these games are going to play a large part in determining the premiership teams.
