Over the past two weeks we have had two ASF commissioners along with Steve visit the Sunshine State.


This augurs well for Australian soccer with the ASF men making an effort to find out how soccer is progressing in Queensland.

Nerang seem destined to return to the second division for the 1992 season

With three fixture rounds remaining the Gold Coast side faces a daunting task to stave off relega-

Nerang are scheduled to meet three teams currently in the top five including pacesetters Rochedale Rovers, Brisbane Lions and Pine Rivers in their run home.

They need to win all three of these matches to maintain any hope of surviving, Realistically it is hard to see this happening.

After gaining promotion to the top flight this year, Nerang has struggled to make an impact.

They have floundered on the bottom of the table for most of the season and look certain to take out the wooden spoon.

Unlike promotion partners Brisbane Croatia, Nerang failed to recruit players for their inaugural XXXX league campaign.

This may be a telling factor as to why they find themselves in their present situation.

It could also serve as an indication of the gap between second and first divisions.

The Eagles have been plagued

by an inability to score goals this season, highlighted by the fact that in 18 games they have registered only 14 goals, the worst record in the league.

While Nerang's future seems predetermined it is unknown at this stage which team will join them in the second division next year.

The likely contenders are Acacia Ridge, Taringa Rovers and Brisbane City.

City's victory over Taringa last weekend has increased their chances of survival, but by no means seen them shrug the threat.

Both Taringa and Acacia Ridge face tough runs home.

Taringa are due to play Easts and Coalstars, while Acacia Ridge face Pine Rivers and Easts.

The relegation issue may well be settled at Jack Speare Park on September 1 when Taringa do battle with Acacia Ridge in the teams' final round fixture.

At the other end of the ladder Brisbane Lions' 1-1 draw with Acacia Ridge has again thrown the premiership race wide open.

Lions and Rochedale Rovers are the only two teams assured of a top five spot at the moment.

Mathematically there are an-

other six teams in the race for the remaining finals spots. However, this week's round is likely to sort the pretenders from the contenders in one of the most tightly contested competitions in recent years.

With so many teams still in contention there is a lot of football still to be played before the curtain is drawn on the 1991 season.

In typical end-of-season fashion, last week's results produced some surprises. The Ridge snatched a much-needed point off Lions in their match at Proud Oval.

At Wendy Allison Park on Saturday night, Easts leapfrogged into the top five and fourth position with a 1-0 win over Pine Rivers.

At Perry Park on Sunday a rejuvenated Coalstars, boosted by the return of lanky striker Peter Vogler, demolished North Star in a 5-1 drubbing.

In other matches Rochedale were too strong for Mt Gravatt emerging 4-1 victors, Brisbane City defeated Taringa Rovers 3-1 and Brisbane Croatia beat Nerang

England International Peter Beardsley has signed with Everton for 1 million pounds (A\$2.1m).

The 30 year-old Geordie, who cost Liverpool 1.9 million pounds (A\$3.99m) four years ago from Newcastle United, completed his three-quarters-of-a-mile move from Anfield to Goodison Park despite late attempts from Manchester City and Tottenham Hotspur. Beardsley said he hoped to prove that there was "life after Anfield".

He added "I have signed a three-year, 4,000 pounds (A\$8,400) per week contract, and if I do the business with Everton, my England future will look after itself".

In his first game for his new club, Beardsley scored the last of Everton's six goals, as they crushed the champions of Northern Ireland, Glentoran 6-0 in front of a 5,000 crowd in Belfast.

The Football Association have been given the go-ahead to launch a breakaway Super League for 1992-93.

A High Court Judge, Mr Justice Rose, gave victory to the FA over the Football league after a four-day hearing, and it now appears certain that the Super (Premier) League will start in August '92 with 18 clubs.

This decision will help make the 'big clubs richer' over a shorter period of time, and will almost see the end of our Third and Fourth Divisions in the way that we see them now.

Gordon Taylor, players union boss said, "Football cannot be run for the benefit of the big clubs. Our members are united on this and players at big clubs will not go along with anything that harms those at smaller clubs".

The Football League will decide at a management committee meeting on August 12 whether to take the case to the court of appeal.

Paul Gascoigne's on-off move to Italian club Lazio was signed, sealed and finally delivered in the early hours (Queensland time) of Saturday August 3 in the posh Italian restaurant Santini's.

The Spurs and England midfield superstar put an end to months of speculation when he signed the contract that will take him to Lazio at the end of this coming season for 5.5 million pounds (A\$11.55 m).

He has "signed on" for three years, with an option for a fourth, and if all goes well, it will net him personally a staggering 2 million pounds (A4.2 million) - a deal that puts David Platt's Italian bonanza with Bari in the shade.

Lazio fans will get their first glimpse of Gazza when he flies out to the Olympic Stadium in three weeks time, and only the failure to pass a medical in May can now stop Gazza going to Lazio next summer.

Under the contract, which all parties involved have signed, Gazza could still play for Tottenham this season, but only if the Rome based Lazio are satisfied with his level of fit-

The A\$11.55 million will be paid to Spurs immediately and the money will be paid back in full if he fails that medical on May 31.

On August 23 this year, Lazio play a prestige friendly against the Spanish club Real Madrid, and plans are being made for Gazza to be paraded in front of the Italian faithful before that match.

In the now annual pre-season tournament which is held between two English and two Eu-



ropean clubs, Arsenal and Sampdoria both recorded victories at the Highbury stadium in Lon-

In previous years, this event has been held at Wembley, but the poor turnout of football fans has forced organisers to switch the four matches to a smaller stadium.

In the matches on the first day, Sampdoria hammered West Ham United 6-1 and Arsenal scored the only goal of the 90 minutes against the Greek outfit, Panathinaikos.

Sampdoria striker, Renato Buso scored 4 of his club's six against injury-hit West Ham, and David Rocastle scored early on for Arsenal in front of 19,883 against Panathinaikos.

In the final, which was played in glorious London sunshine, Arsenal and Sampdoria played some outstanding soccer in front of 18,267, but it was the Italians who took the Makita trophy for the second successive year as they won 3-2 on pens, after the match finished 1-1.

Paul Merson put the Gunners ahead after 18 minutes, but Sampdoria, who dominated the second half, equalised through Viali with 21 mins remaining. The four goal hero of Saturday, Renato Buso, was sent off midway through the match for elbowing Tony Adams in the face.





## Letters to The Editor

When the teams found out who were in the "finals" the other participating six teams – as they were not involved in playing the following games – departed.

They do not know who won and they have not been presented with ribbons or thanked for participating by the club who invited them. With this "Final" system I feel the adage "only winners play" is being reinforced and should be omitted at this age level.

Also it seems sad that the "winning" team has no recognition (which I think the final is supposed to achieve) from the other participating teams.

Perhaps only having six teams instead of 10 would work to every team's advantage, thus allowing enough time to compete against each other with the finals between two sections becoming unnecessary.

Between the two experiences of a carnival situation, the first seemed to have equal participation for every team and recognition of effort and achievement by all the teams playing.

I am hoping this suggestion can be used to improve the enjoyment for all younger players in future carnivals.
