Well done Mt Gravatt on winning the 1991 Ampol Cup. Mt Gravatt defeated Rochedale Rovers 3-0 at Perry Park last Sunday to win the coveted cup for the first time.

Their name will now be etched alongside the long list of clubs to have won the trophy.

In last week's editorial we listed the winners of the Ampol Cup (from 1975 to 1990) which appear on the current trophy.

But we were incorrect in stating the Cup began in 1975. It in fact has a history dating back to 1959, although the original trophy has since gone missing.

The unpublished list of winners from 1959 to 1974 is listed as follows: Oxley United (1959), Hellenic (1960–1964), Coalstars (1965), Grange Thistle (1966), St Helens (1967), Hollandia (1968), Azzurri (1969), Hollandia (1970), Azzurri (1971), Merton East (1972), Lions (1973) and Brisbane City (1974).

GAME PLAN NETS HAWKS AMPOL CUP

Mt Gravatt salvaged something from an indifferent season by winning the prestigious Ampol Cup last weekend.

The Hawks, destined to finish mid-table in the 1991 premiership race, defeated Rochedale Rovers in the final at Perry Park last Sunday.

Mt Gravatt started the match as underdogs, but ran out 3-0winners after holding a 1-0 halftime lead.

They hustled and bustled Rochedale with a carefully formulated game plan by coach Dick Mitchell.

Tactic

Mitchell's plan involved using midfielder Paul Worroll as a spare man in defence and breaking Rochedale down by not allowing them time on the ball.

The tactics worked as Rochedale were not able to play their normal free-flowing style.

"We usually spring from the midfield," Rochedale player/coach John Stewart said.

"We talked about playing the ball wide in this match and spent too much time getting it wide, possibly because they didn't allow us to."

Mt Gravatt surprised the premiership hopefuls and league front runners by scoring the first goal of the final, played before a vocal Perry Park crowd.

The goal came from a Martin Kirsopp corner kick which floated over the heads of the de-

fence.

Cameron Bell was able to recover the ball and cross it back for Jarrod Austin to thump with a header that eluded a diving Andrew Hobbs.

Hobbs had plenty of work to do with speedy striker John Brown continually causing havoc with the Rochedale defence.

Rochedale had a chance to level the scores right on half time, but were denied by a miracle save from State 'keeper Stuart Woodruffe.

Woodruffe anticipated brilliantly to parry a powerfully hit Kieran Cooper header off a pinpoint Lee Howells cross.

Both coaches agreed after the match that Woodruffe's save had been the turning point of the game.


With Rochedale pushing forward in the second half, Mt Gravatt also had plenty of opportunities to score.

The Hawk's second goal however came from a bad defensive mistake by Rochedale captain Noel Greenhalgh, whose back pass eluded Hobbs to find the net.

Mt Gravatt secured the result three minutes later when Andy Armitage struck a well-placed and curling shot past Hobbs after a through ball from Brown had put him into space.

The loss ended Rochedale's chances to win the triple crowns of President's Cup, Ampol Cup and Premiership this season.

They will now concentrate on trying to win the premiership with only two rounds of the regular

season remaining before the semifinals.

In the only XXXX League fixture to be played during the week, Eastern Suburbs defeated Coalstars 2–0 last Friday night.

In the first game to be played under lights at Heath Park, the Tigers scored two first half goals to leapfrog into outright third position.

Despite the scoreline, Coalstars were always competitive, but lacked players to finish their opportunities in front of goal.

The Ipswich team almost certainly missed star striker Peter

Vogler, who has suffered a reoccurence of his knee injury, and is now unlikely to play in the team's remaining games.

Easts' first goal came from the boot of young striker Richard Nicol who connected with a blistering shot at the edge of the box.

Their second was scored by Billy McDermott, who stole a bad back pass to score five minutes before the break.

Easts have not suffered a loss in their last 11 games, something which they will be determined to keep intact when they play Acacia Ridge this Saturday night.

The Queensland team also returned from their one-match tour of New Zealand during the week with their record against Kiwi teams intact.

The Maroons played a 1-1 draw with Canterbury to match other results against Kiwi sides this season.

The match was to celebrate the re-opening of Canterbury's home ground English Park.

It gave Queensland coach Juan Cutillas a chance to put a different team on the park and he was suitably impressed with the result.

Cutillas played Ibro Cahut at sweeper and Taringa Rovers youngster Glen Gwynne as a stopper in the match.

"Both players handled their jobs magnificantly and did everything I asked," Cutillas said.

The Queensland and Canterbury rematch completed a busy 1991 representative campaing.

The Football League started the 1991– 92 season in disarray after the resignation of all 22 First Division clubs 24 hours before the kick–off.

The Football Association backed Premier League is due to start in 12 months time, and the League's management structure is now virtually leaderless by the mass resignation.

The rest of the league are looking for a way to appeal against a High Court ruling allowing the FA to press ahead with the Premier League, and they have called a general meeting for September 10 to test the validity of the FA's claim.

This story will be the major talking point throughout the coming season, and it will no doubt change from week to week, but whatever happens to the future of domestic soccer in England, this coming season will see dramatic changes at the heart of the sport's governing body.

The 10 games in the Barclays First division attracted a total attendance of 285,016 fans on the opening Saturday of the 1991/92 season.

But it was the 5090 who attended Barnet's game at Underhill Park, Hertfordshire, who were rewarded with the scoring of 11 goals.

In a carnival atmosphere to celebrate Barnet's

long awaited league debut, it was the newcomers who were the clowns as Crewe Alexandra highlighted the different pace of league soccer in comparison to the non-league equivalent.

How often does a soccer club score four goals at home on the occasion of it's league christening, and still loose?

Well, that is the record that will stay with Barnet, as Crewe ran out 7-4 winners.

In the top flight, it took an 89th minute equaliser from Arsenal's Paul Merson to stop the blushes of the champions as they were held to a 1-1 draw at home by London rivals Queens Park Rangers.

The G-force partnership of Gary Lineker and Gordon Durie blended together well as Tottenham Hotspur came from behind to beat Southampton 3-2 at The Dell.

This match provided Saint's striker Alan Shearer with the honour of scoring the first league goal of the new campaign, as he found the back of the net after only 2 mins and 34 seconds.

Notts County had an unhappy return to first division soccer at Old Trafford, goals either side of the interval by Mark Hughes and Bryan Robson gave Manchester United the 3 points.

Oldham Athletic, unruffled by having to face over 6 million pounds (A\$12.6m) worth of new talent at Anfield, took an unexpected eighth minute lead, but second-half strikes by Ray Houghton and John Barnes saved the day for Graeme Souness' boys.

In the "grudge" match of the day at Hillsborough, they mocked, jeered and called him Judas, but big Ron Atkinson masterminded a magnificent threegoal winning comeback as his Aston Villa put up an incredible

fight against his former club, Sheffield Wednesday. It took an 85th minute goal from Ron's newest acquisition, Steve Staunton (from Liverpool), to give the midlanders the victory, which on their first-half display – they did not deserve. Wednesday stormed into a 2-0 lead after 36 minutes, and then seemed to go asleep as Villa prepared to give Atkinson the last laugh.

The best of the rest saw Chelsea and Wimbledon share four goals at Stamford Bridge, likewise did Norwich and Sheffield United at Carrow Rd, but West Ham United and Luton Town played out a goaless draw in East London.

Last season's beaten FA Cup finalists, Nottingham Forest, came from behind a Stuart Pearce own-goal to take the points aginst Everton. Howard Wilkinson's Leeds United had their opening day fixture against Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park postponed 48 hours before the start, as the South London outfit did not have the ground up to safety regulations, after a delay in recent building work.

Up in Scotland, Celtic, Aberdeen and Hearts continue with their 100 per cent records as they recorded wins against Falkirik 4-1, Dunfermline 3-0 and Rangers 1-0 respectively.

88,158 went along to the six B&Q Premier League matches north of the border, as the crowds flock back after the summer break.

All interested soccer supporters, parents and players should voice their disgust at this cost cutting exercise, and let the ABC, politicians and bureaucrats know this decision is wrong.






Watch out goalkeepers - new FIFA rule means hands off New rules, to be adopted next season, will

see radical changes for the role of goalkeepers.

Decision No (17).

The International FA Board is of the opinion that a goalkeeper, in the circumstances described in Law XII-5(1), will be considered to be in control of the ball when he takes possession of the



ball by touching it with any part of his hands or arms.

Possession of the ball would include the goalkeeper intentionally parrying the ball, but would not include the circumstances where, in the opinion of the referee, the ball rebounds accidentally from the goalkeeper, for example after he has made a save.

Reason:

The International FA Board decided that the expression "takes control of the ball" as used in Law XII - 5(a) should be more clearly defined.

The effect on the field of play of the above definition of this phrase is that if a goalkeeper, from the moment he takes control of the ball with his hand(s) or arm(s), without it in the meantime having been touched or played by another player of his own team outside of the penalty area, or by a player of the opposing team either inside or outside the penalty area, he shall be penalised by the award of an indirect free-kick to the opposing team.

It has always been accepted practice that a goalkeeper may bounce the ball on the ground and hold it again before kicking it and this remains the same.

In other cases, once he has taken control of the ball as defined in Decision (17), unless he retains continuous control of the ball, it must be considered that the goalkeeper has released the ball into play and the above conditions apply.

N.B.

Referees must ensure that Law XII-5(a) is implemented rigidly. The four step restriction must be rigorously enforced and the appropriate punishment imposed on any violations.

This also applies if a goalkeeper indulges in

timewasting tactics. In the latter case too an indirect free-kick shall be awarded to the opposing team.

Goalkeepers are advised to avoid parrying the ball and are encouraged to catch the ball cleanly and then release it quickly to avoid timewasting.

The Souths Wallaroos club have always been strong supporters of the women's game and I reported last week that they had secured their fifth consecutive NQSF Premiership.

The club has achieved a unique double this year as their representatives have also won the inaugural TJSA under-16 girls competition.

Many of the under-16 girls are in their early teens and so there will be a continuing supply of new talent to the senior clubs, providing they show the same initiative as Souths and actively demonstrate their interest.
