SBS has parcelled up the television rights to virtually every major soccer match in Australia for the next six years.

Commenting on the exclusive deal, SBS chairman, Sir Nicholas Shehadie, said the network had consolidated its position as Australia's soccer network.

"I am pleased to announce that last weekend we (the SBS) signed a contract with the Australian Soccer Federation giving SBS TV exclusive broadcast rights to all Australian representative team matches, including Socceroo international matches and the National Soccer League competition over the next six years," Sir Nicholas said.

A unique and exciting feature of the deal is that the SBS, in consultation with the ASF, will be able to stage its own tournaments involving Australian representative and overseas teams.

"Naturally we would seek sponsors for these tournaments - something we are now readily able to do under our new legislation," Sir Nicholas said.

"The SBS is, after all, the soccer network and with this new agreement with the Australian Soccer Federation we are now able to offer the viewing public a comprehensive range of Australian and overseas soccer, including the Australian National Soccer League (NSL), Australian (Socceroo) international matches, the World Cup, European Cups, Italian League Soccer and the English FA Cup.

Other broadcasters, including the ABC, are now showing keen interest in the sport. As a result, we intend to offer our coverage, free of charge, outside the SBS TV service areas."

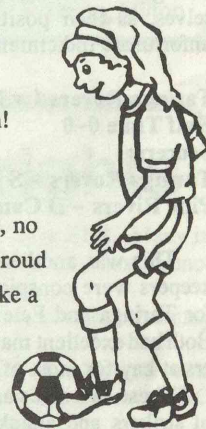

Topic: An alternative to traditional training/position specific training

Topic: Goalkeeping/Technique/Shot Stopping/Crosses/Organisation of defenders

Venue: Perry Park at 7.00pm

Any coach wishing to request a certain topic can do so with two (2) months' notice. Any coach wishing to participate and direct a session will be most welcome.

This is an on-field activity, so bring your gear along and be prepared to participate.



TEST YOUR KNOWLEDGE

Over the next few weeks, I will test your knowledge of the rules of the game.

So, before you start blasting the referee for his lack of knowledge of the rules, see how you go on these few little gems.

Q1. Is it necessary for flags to be placed at the half-way line?

Q2. If a player passes accidentally over one of the boundary lines of the field of play, is he considered to have left the field of play without the permission of the referee?

Q3. If a player in possession of the ball passes over the touch-lines or the goal line without the ball in order to beat an opponent, should the referee penalise him for leaving the field of play without permission?

Q4. Is it permissible for a goalkeeper to take a throw-in?

Q5. Is a team-mate allowed to stand in an off-side position at the taking of a penalty-kick?

Q6. If the cross-bar becomes displaced through breakage or faulty construction in a competitive match and there are no available means of repairing and replacing it, should the match be abandoned?

Q7. Should a player be permitted to take part in a game when he is wearing ordinary boots instead of football boots?

Q8. Should the Referee award a penalty kick when a defending player is ordered off the field for kicking or striking an opponent within the penalty-area?

Q9. A linesman signals that the ball has passed over the touch line, but before the referee has given the ball out of play, a defending player inside the penalty area strikes an attacking player. What action should the referee take?

Q10. If a captain of a team fails to notify the referee when he has changed his goalkeeper, is it sufficient notice if the club secretary who is acting as linesman informs him?

Q11. Should the referee award a penalty kick if a player other than the goalkeeper takes a goal-kick and the ball passes out of the penalty-area into play, but is blown back by a strong wind without any other player having touched it, and a player of the defending side other than the goalkeeper plays the ball with his hand within the penalty-area?

Q12. What action should a referee take against a player who lights a cigarette during the game?

Q13. What should the referee do if two captains agree to forego the half-time interval and one of the players insists on his right to a five-minute break?

Q14. May a game be started by a person, other than one of the players taking part in the match, kicking-off?

Q15. If the ball is kicked straight into the opponents' goal from the kick-off what decision does the referee give?

Q16. What action should the referee take if two players of the same team commit ungentlemanly or violent conduct toward each other on the field of play?

Q17. Is the ball out of play if any part of the ball overlaps either the goal line or the touch line?

Q18. If a referee is struck in the face by the ball which then enters the goal while he is temporarily incapacitated, should a goal be allowed although he has not seen it scored?

Q19. If a goalkeeper, who has changed places with one of his colleagues without notifying the referee, handles the ball inside the penalty-area what action should the referee take?

Q20. If a referee signals a goal before the ball has passed wholly over the goal line and he immediately realises his error, is the goal valid?

Q21. When extra time is played, which team kicks-off?

Q22. May a free-kick be passed backwards?

Q23. What are the decisions of the referee if the signal having been given, but before the ball is kicked, a colleague of the player taking the kick encroaches into the penalty-area and the referee notices the offence but allows the kick to be taken and the ball rebounds from the goalkeeper, cross-bar or goal-posts to the player who has encroached and this player sends the ball into goal?

Q24. Can a captain send off one of his own team for serious misconduct?

Contact Sports and Infections

Athletes involved in contact sports or sports which may involve body contact must be aware of the risks involved in the voluntary transfer of body fluids, especially blood. This happens if an athlete has a bleeding injury. It is possible that a small amount of blood could be transferred from one player to another.

The two important infections when considering this are AIDS and HEPATITIS B. Players may have these infections and not be aware of them.

Unfortunately, AIDS infection cannot be prevented by immunisation; but Hepatitis B infection can be. It is strongly recommended that players, coaches, umpires/referees, trainers and first-aid personnel are immunised against Hepatitis B. It is hoped that sporting associations and Clubs will accept the responsibility of encouraging their athletes to be immunised.

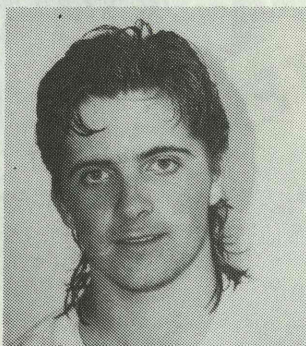

Drought breaks

THE Kingsridge Ladies Soccer side is set to break a 12-year drought this weekend when it battles for the South Queensland Women's Soccer Association fourth division championship at Geebung.

The team has not won a grand final since 1981, and has not been premiers since 1987.

It has already clinched the 1992 premiership, finishing on top of the ladder with an impressive 12 wins for the season and just two losses.

A bus load of Woodridge and Kingston supporters will travel to Geebung at the weekend to watch the final.

Creek defeat heavy Slacks Creek soccer suffered its heaviest defeat in 13 games when it was downed 3-1 by Nerang at Usher Park on Sunday.

The scoreline did not reflect the nature of the game as Creek missed a number of chances in the first half that should have given a commanding lead going into the break.

Chances fell to John Flynn and Simpson before the break and while Creek keeper Aston Bell was a virtual spectator, Creek found itself down 1-nil at the break.

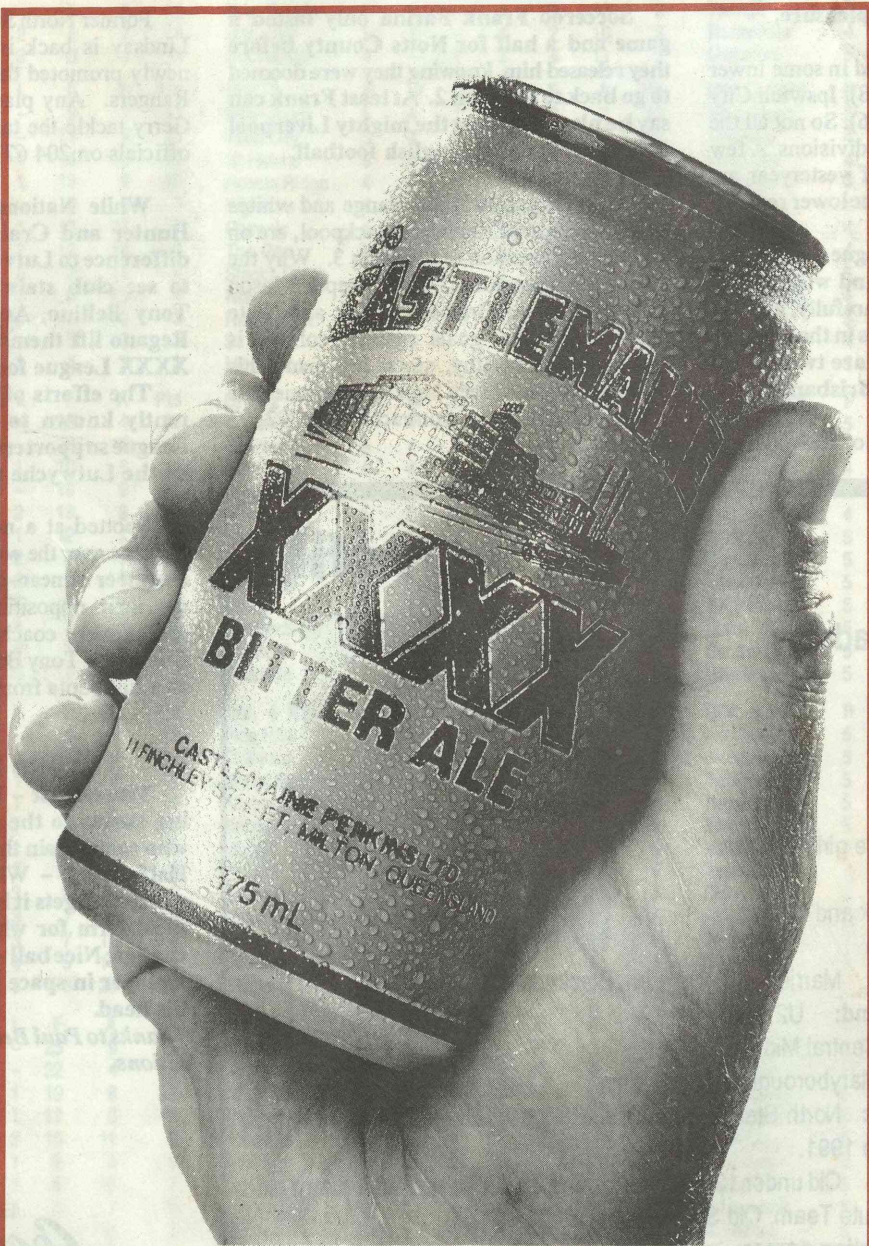
