Former State custodian Stu Woodruffe kept the Brisbane team's hopes alive with numerous saves throughout. He also made the all-important first save in the penalty shoot-



WORLD GUP SOCCER

The match draw for the 1994 World Cup will be held in Las Vegas in December 1993, FIFA officials said last week.

Although Las Vegas is not one of the sites to host the 24-nation, 52-game tournament, it has made an extravagant bid to host the draw, when the teams will be divided into six groups.

FIFA have currently received a number of proposals both from hotels as well as convention places in the city. Whoever receives the nod to host this world-wide televised draw, it will be a highly spectacular event.

The qualifying draw, in which 136 nations were divided into groups for the preliminary rounds, was held in New York's Maddison Square Garden. The US, in another bid to show that they are fully united behind the conduct of the 1994 World Cup, are endeavouring to spread out the activities over a large number of cities.

The World Cup which will be held in June/July 1994 will be played in a vast number of centres from Boston on the East Coast to San Francisco on the West Coast, with the schedule of games to be announced by FIFA at its next executive meeting in Zurich in June.



BARGELONA

As there appears to be no live television coverage of the Australian soccer team at the Olympics, we sincerely hope they get through to the semi-finals where the prospects of a medal should almost force the Seven Network to provide coverage. For all Australia's preliminary matches, we will have to be content with news coverage and highlights on the following day.

With all of the recent publicity about Olympic team captain, Ned Zelic, and the replays on television of his stunning second goal, which soccer supporters will not tire of seeing, spare a thought for the person himself

Ned was subject to about 30 radio, print and television interviews in the short time he was in Australia, from his arrival back from Holland to his departure with the Socceroos to the Americas.

On the day the Australian soccer team arrived back in Australia from Holland, Zelic was interviewed at the inevitable airport press conference, which included TV, radio, news and sport spot interviews. He then appeared live on Channel Nine's Midday Show, held more interviews mid-afternoon, and yet again appeared live on a national evening variety show. All this was from a mature, young man who has not yet celebrated his 21st birthday.

All the national soccer teams have been wearing the "new" strip which is unique in its patterned appearance. Our successful Olympic soccer team, when travelling to Barcelona, will be decked out in a brand new strip, more widely known by its three stripes on the international scene.

All teams at the Olympic Games come under the domain of the Australian Olympic committee which has contracted an overseas company to outfit all participants in both leisure and competition gear.

The new playing strip will still be in the familiar green and gold, but the design and colour tonings will be new. Another first will be the emblazoning of players' names across the backs of their shirts. This is a first for a FIFA event. So, when we do see the Aussies on the television screen, we will recognise them whichever way they are running.





In other world news, breakaway republics in Yugoslavia and the former Soviet Union will not be allowed to field separate teams in time to qualify for the 1994 World Cup. FIFA president Joao Havelange said that only those nations granted admission by FIFA for last December's World Cup draw will be eligible to participate in the World Cup finals.

Soccer officials in all the breakaway countries have advised they will apply to field their own teams for the qualifying processes. But this latest statement from FIFA appears to have concluded the matter, for this World Cup at least.

Meanwhile Havelange and a number of other FIFA officials have travelled to South Africa to meet with its leaders. They took in a number of matches in Johannesburg and other towns. It seems quite conclusive that South Africa will be admitted back to FIFA at its annual meeting later this year.

South Africa was expelled from FIFA in 1976 for its laws that legalised apartheid, the separation of races.

The South Africans in anticipation of their re-admission have already scheduled a three-game friendly series against Cameroon in mid-July. The return of South Africa to FIFA will come too late to compete in the 1994 World Cup qualifying matches. However they fully expect to be up and running for all future tournaments.


