Kearton will speak to members and visitors about his full-time professional training and


Kearton is currently coached by Peter Bonetti, an ex-Chelsea and English International goalkeeper. Bonetti is also the England goalkeeper coach.

Grange Thistle 1 V Eastern Suburbs 2 Half-time 1-2



KINGAROY SET TO HOST **UNDER 13 TITLES**

Kingaroy will host a State junior soccer championship for the fourth consecutive year, when the Under 13 titles get under way in the

South Burnett capital this weekend.

The week-long State Under 13 Coca-Cola Talent Identification Championships will commence on Sunday, and feature 160 players from Far North Queensland, North West Queensland, North Queensland, Southern North Queensland, Central Queensland, Wide Bay, South West Queensland, South East Queensland, Brisbane North and Brisbane South.

The host club will have three players in the South West team. They are Jonathon Wood, Matthew Tonks and Aaron Liesmann.

The Under 13 age group is strategically vital for the future of soccer, because it is at this age that players are first identified for elite coaching, before they develop bad soccer skill habits. A total of 29 games will be played, introduced with a march past at 9am Sunday and culminating in the grand final on Saturday, June 27, at 2pm.

South Burnett president, John Lang, said "everything is in place

for a smooth championship"

COMMUNITY **AWARENESS**

Contact Sports and Infections

Athletes involved in contact sports or sports which may involve body contact must be aware of the risks involved in the voluntary transfer of body fluids, especially blood. This happens if an athlete has a bleeding injury. It is possible that a small amount of blood could be transferred from one player to another.

The two important infections when considering this are AIDS and HEPATITIS B. Players may have these infections

and not be aware of them.

Unfortunately, AIDS infection cannot be prevented by immunisation; but Hepatitis B infection can be. It is strongly recommended that players, coaches, umpires/referees, trainers and first-aid personnel are immunised against Hepatitis B. It is hoped that sporting associations and Clubs will accept the responsibility of encouraging their athletes to be immunised. Dr John L McNee MBBS, FRACGP, FACEM

STAGES OF SKILL DEVELOPMENT

There are various stages that the young soccer player passes through from first learning a skill to mastering it. The length of time this takes will depend on the individual child and the quality of coaching. The important factors for the coach to remember are:

Give or show a good demonstration

Make the skills flow from simple to com-

Do not give too much information at any one stage, possibly break the skills into sections

Fatigue will affect skill learning

Children can usually only concentrate for a short time.

In general the young soccer player passes through three stages of skill learning:

Clumsy stage (early), where a large number of errors occur and the player looks and feels clumsy.

2. Refined stage (Intermediate), where the player has a basic level of skills and can start to speed up the skill and place it in a competitive situation.

3. Fluid stage (Advanced), where the player unconsciously performs a skill and can play under pressure. The player can then work on advanced "off the ball" skills or

The coach must try to assess the players current skill level and develop the appropriate practices.

DWSONALREVIEW

DIVISION 3

Division 3 is generally recognised by clubs coming down, as the hardest Division in which to win promotion. This is because games are so keenly contested by clubs ambitious for greater things, but possibly not strong enough (financially or players) to gain such promotion.

The two leaders are Souths United and Beenleigh. The style of football on display is probably a reflection of their coaches. Both are former First Division players known for their close-ball skills.

South's Paul Barry is relatively new to coaching, but has played under many good coaches. The skills shown by his players are a testament to his coaching ability and potential.

Beenleigh's Steve Dolan, 11 times capped for Queensland, has brought together a good squad. A few did cost money, but their experience is helping the ambitious "locals" to push hard for promotion.

The other three clubs in the top five at present are Annerley, Logan City Kings and Goodna. Each have tasted Division 2 football in recent years, but were not strong enough to stay. All of them are again making a concerted effort to reach the coveted top spots. Do they have the staying power?

Then we have a mid-table group. Latrobe

Valley started the year well, but are currently experiencing a flat spot. Capalaba started disastrously but are now coming good, depth might be their downfall. South Star are newly promoted and still finding their way. Redlands United, once proudly in the XXXX League, are now mid-table in Division Three.

Then there are the bottom three who are really struggling: Samford, Darra and Redcliffe. All are clubs with proud traditions, either as district clubs or with a large junior following. The distance for safety is getting wider each week, when they meet each other in coming weeks, there will be an understandable tension in the air.

DIVISION 6

Division 6 is a division where only four clubs have their first-team situated. The remainder are lower grades from, in the main, Division 2 and 3 clubs.

Of the four, only one – Loganholme – is placed well, currently being equal second and hopeful of a promotion to Division 5.

The others are all currently at the bottom: Woodridge Rodelu, Caboolture, and Jimboomba, who are yet to register a win. It will be a shame if clubs in the more distant geographical areas of the QSF fixture area, do

depart for the lower Divisions, as this tends to diminish the development of the code. However there are still 10 fixtures to go.

Currently placed first in this division is Acacia Ridge, a team that probably is using the club's more "experienced" players and who probably do not train regularly. Slacks Creek is equal second, which underlines the depth in this club. This is their fourth senior team, with yet another in Division 8.

Sitting comfortably in fourth position is University who have, for obvious reasons, a huge turnover of players each year.

Locked together in mid-table are Olympic United, Beenleigh and Logan City Kings. On present trends, this appears to be where they will stay.

Only just above relegation are Albany Creek and Darra. For Albany Creek this must be their "social" team, judging by results. Darra's position is comparable to that of their senior team in Division three.

Next week Division 4 and 7.

This Divisional review will not concentrate heavily on Divisions containing teams that are the third, fourth or even fifth teams within clubs.

LAW 18 EXPLAINED

In any match, throw-ins can herald as loud a chorus from the players and spectators as the claims for off-side. This law (Law 18) is similarly misunderstood.

Reasonable tolerance has to be exercised regarding the position from which a throw is taken. It pays for the referee or linesman to give clear indication where doubt might exist. A few feet either way is not significant; five yards out of place needs correction.

Always try - by hand, verbal or whistle signal - to get the thrower into the correct position before he takes it. It saves problems. In positioning him, allow for a probable run-up.

If he then starts wandering up the line with the ball, call him back to the correct position. If he uses an exaggerated run-up taking him yards up the pitch from where you have indicated, award a foul throw.

Although it is difficult to explain, everybody understands what a conventional throw-in looks like, and this is what all concerned ought

There is no need for the player to bend back double so as to deliver the ball from behind his head. If the centre-point of the ball starts from substantially behind the plane of the centre-point of the head for a short throw, that is good enough.

It is quite permissable to throw the ball almost vertically down into the field of play so long as the action started from behind the head.

Great mystique surrounds the one-handed throw. Some people get very excited about it. The Law says "both hands shall be used" but does not decree with equal force or effect. In truth a throw with one hand from "behind and over the head" cannot be performed except by a contortionist and so the advantageous effect of a throw taken with apparently unequal hand action is limited.

Disabled players should in general be given every encouragement to participate in our sport, but, unless it were a game played entirely or mainly by the disabled when concessions would be made, it would not be proper to allow a lone one-limbed player in a side to take throw-ins. Should that player have a functional artificial arm that enables a conventional throwing action to be made, he should be allowed to take throw-ins.



WORLDOUR S(0)(0)(0)(1)

For the first time in Italian soccer, a club completed the 34match first division program undefeated. AC Milan, in winning the title, had a rather unique last-match result. Down 1-2 at half-time to Foggia, they scored a staggering seven goals in the second half to win 8-2. A score such as this is truly amazing for Italian football. Meanwhile, their city rivals, Inter (Nazionale) have failed to qualify for European football for the first time since 1975

Still in Italy, top Sampdoria striker, Gianluca Vialli, is moving to Juventus for a combined transfer deal said to be around \$26 million. He will be joined there by English international David Platt, whose previous club Bari was relegated from the Italian first division. Moving the other way is Nottingham Forest's Des Walker. Sampdoria have just signed him on a two-year \$7.2 million contract.

Switzerland: The first division championship in Switzerland was won by Sion, which is the first time the club has won this honour

in its 83-year history.

England: Property millionaire, Michael Knighton, (remember him?), who made an extravagant bid to buy Manchester United three years ago, has bought Carlisle United, the club who finished the 1992 season at the bottom of Division 4.

Rob Jones, Liverpool's brilliant young fullback, was ruled out on medical grounds, from the England side for the European Championships in Sweden this month. Jones, who was bought from fourth division Crewe Alexandra, made such an impact for Liverpool that England manager Graham Taylor selected him for his full England debut against France in February.

Portugal: Former England manager Bobby Robson has signed a two-year contract to coach Sporting Lisbon. He is expected to take up duties in July. Robson was previously with PSV Eindhoven, who he took to the Dutch Championship for two successive seasons. He was inexplicably sacked for his side's failure to perform well in the European Cup.



Almost by definition a ball cannot be legally thrown by a running player, since two feet would never be on the ground. The runup is always terminated and the body's momentum is transferred to the arms and then the ball. Ensure that those throwing with a dragging toe really scrape the toe along the ground.

Arguable foot-faults are penalised with discretion. Obvious infringements must be

ruled as a foul throw.

The throw-in presents the occasional opportunity to gain retribution on an opponent by throwing the ball at the opponent with undue force, yet with a perfectly legal throwing action. Treat this either as ungentlemanly conduct or violent conduct.


