The two goals came within the space of 75 seconds, and ruined Taringa's good defensive record.


It was a result that has not clarified matters at all in the points table, only further confused it

anything else, put it down as Ungentlemanly Conduct. It covers a multitude of sins."

Such advice has been offered to many referees over the years with regard to the reasons for issuing cautions.

The term "ungentlemanly conduct" is one known to every player, manager, coach, reporter, spectator ... and referee!

But how many people have ever stopped to think about the meaning of those two words? Presumably they imply behaviour unbefitting a gentleman, and in football terms this surely must suggest that to comply with the Laws of the Game, players should behave as gentlemEn. If they did, there would be no need for this article or for this

"If you cannot classify it as outmoded terminology to grace the pages of the Laws.

The famous words have been there, it seems, far too long.

Collins' New English Dictionary states that a gentleman is a man of good breeding and refined manners. So if we have "ungentlemanly conduct" in football, one or two coaches and managers have a lot to answer for in terms of the socalled breeding. Moreover, the same dictionary tells us that "gentlemanly" means "well-behaved and courteous". Logically, its opposite means "ill-behaved and discour-

None of the major dictionaries seems to imply the sort of meaning that most referees put on the term "ungentlemanly conduct", i.e. cheating, not being prepared to accept

the spirit of the game and its laws.

Brewer's Dictionary of Phrase and Fable, describes a gentleman as a "man entitled to bear arms but not of the nobility", which is very confusing for us poor referees. We always thought it was ungentle-

manly types who would consider arming themselves, even if only with a series of tactics designed to ruffle others! Mind you, we always did accept that football was a game for the ordinary man rather

than for the nobility.

Dear old Brewer comes up with another interesting snippet when he talks of "The Old Gentleman", which means the Devil or Old Nick. We are now getting thoroughly involved with words. A secondary meaning of this particular entry is "a special card in a prepared pack used for tricks of cheating". Perhaps after all, this "card" could be the special player in a team (a prepared or coached team) who is given the specific task of cheating.

It is all becoming clearer now to the writer, who, like many of his readers no doubt, realises his gross error of all these years. He has been sending in caution reports about "ungentlemanly conduct" when he should have surely been doing one of two things: either cautioning players for "gentlemanly conduct", or cautioning for "ungentlemanly conduct", all those players who did not cheat or who did not seek to arm themselves!!!

All right, dear Football Association, we referees are not all suddenly going to do an aboutface and carry out the suggestions of the last paragraph.

We shall still put the interpretation of cheating/not accepting the spirit of the Laws of the Game on the term "ungentlemanly conduct". But perhaps, when the powersthat-be do rewrite the Laws in more up-to-date phraseology, they will consider using a more appropriate wording than "ungentlemanly conduct", which nowadays doesn't sound half as bad an offence as simple "CHEATING".



The Australian soccer team has been in Europe just over a week in preparation for their second shot at Olympic glory.

Already they have played two warm-up games, the first against German club Fortuna Dusseldorf, just 24 hours after arriving.

The jet-lagged Aussies went down 0-2, but coach Eddie Thomson was certainly not disheartened with this result, particularly when they played for 70 minutes with only 10 men after Gary Hasler was sent-off. On Saturday, a better prepared Australian team outgunned Kuwait's Olympic Squad 4-2.

This preparation is unlike that of their second Olympic opponents Mexico, who came fourth in a tournament involving three other Olympic qualifiers – Columbia, Poland and Paraquay.

The Cesar Menotti-coached Mexico are not exactly setting the world on fire in their warm-ups, but the real matches may be a very different story. Menotti is a great motivator.

Two of their better known players who have helped with this success are Brazilian National goalkeeper, Claudio Taffarel and Swedish striker Thomas Brolin, who has also performed exceedingly well for his country in the European Championships.

Scotland

The future of the Premier League in Scotland appears to be very much up in the air at present, with lots of talk of resignations by the Big 5.

This Big 5, consisting of Rangers, Celtic, Aberdeen, Hearts and Dundee United, is an on-again, off-again situation. These clubs are tired of having the "tail wagging the dog" and are intending to commence a Super League within two years. Time will tell whether this will take place.

England

Justin Fashnau has just signed a two-year contract with Third Division Torquay United as assistant manager. He has coached in North America, and has spent time recently coaching youngsters at Torquay. Fashanu toured Australia in 1979 with the Norwich City side which defeated Queensland 1-0 in Brisbane.

England

Soccer on television is BIG business with the recent \$304 million signing of the agreement between the new Premier League, BSkyB and the BBC. In addition, another new contract has just been signed between the satellite television company and the FA to cover England International matches and the FA Cup for the next five years. ITV, having missed out on the lucrative League programme, have signed

a contract with Manchester United and Leeds United to cover all their European Cup matches in the new season starting in August.

England

A revolutionary new team strip will be seen in the Premier League next year when Everton play away to teams wearing blue shirts. The Goodison Park Club is adopting as their change strip, a salmon pink shirt with navy stripes. It is said that this is to mark the club's centenary at Goodison Park. One wonders whether the supporters will recognise their own players in the colourful garb.

Europe

Success is definitely not a recipe for longevity of service, if the attitude of two recent prominent clubs is a criteria. Morten Olsen was sacked as coach of Danish club Brondby, despite winning the past two league titles. Bobby Robson also received the same treatment from PSV Eindhoven.

Oceania

The Oceania Football Confederation became the third region to open World Cup qualifying matches last month, with New Zealand's matches against Vanuatu (twice) and Fiji. Australia opens its campaign against Tahiti and the Solomons, with home matches to be played in Brisbane later this year.

Sweden

During the recent Euro '92 Championships in Sweden, a number of national teams had their squads almost entirely foreign-based. The vast majority of top-line players were playing for clubs in the bigmoney countries such as Spain and Italy. English champions Leeds United had players turning out for three different nations: McAllister (Scotland), Batty (England), Cantona (France).




