Well done to the Socceroos for their convincing victory over Croatia in the three-match series.

In team sport, it always comes down to the depth of quality talent the selectors, or in soccer's case the coach, has to choose from.

Coach Eddie Thomson certainly has a lot of talent at his disposal for the upcoming World Cup elimination matches.

Not only have the Socceroos had an extensive work-out over the last few months, but the Olyroos squad is brimming with very exciting talent which will do Australia proud in Barcelona.

Once that Olympic mission is over, coach Thomson has to really make a decision on what players he will finally select in his World Cup lead-up matches.

On top of sifting through the Socceroos and Olyroos playing talent, he may also call on the services of players who are playing with overseas clubs.

Who would like to have Eddie Thomson's coaching job?

The Australian Soccer Federation must continue to utilise the Socceroos as the trail blazer for our sport.

The Australian Soccer Federation must seriously consider the issue of appropriate opposition for our National Teams.

The recently completed three-match visit to Australia by the Croatian Team is but an example. The tour was arranged two-fold, to provide strong opposition for the Socceroos as a prelude to their World Cup Qualifying matches later in the year, and also to cater to a large Nationalistic body of supporters in this country.

The only, and stress only, positive fact that came out of the tour was the remarkable onfield discipline shown by the Socceroos.

Contrast this with the abysmal record of the Croatian Team. Three games - three send-offs, together with a total of twelve yellow cards over the three games to the Socceroos' two cautions.

Crown disturbances, both at or near the venues - the firing of flares and fire-crackers at matches - both prohibited articles to take into grounds were negative and damaging to soccer in Australia. Even the majority of the crowd in all three venues cheered for the opposition. It was as if the Australian Team was playing in a foreign country.

One must ask - was it really worth it?



Australia's Seven Network reportedly paid out \$45 million for the broadcast rights to the Olympic Games. They will telecast 21 hours of live and delayed telecasts from Barcelona, covering all aspects of the Games. Almost all, that is. Unfortunately, no telecasts of soccer are on the schedule (except highlights) until a medal is in our sights.

The qualification of the soccer team to these Olympics has also proved to be a financial headache for the Australian Olympic Committee. Yet strangely enough, the more junior the players, the more experienced they are at International level.

Paul Okon, who just turned 20, played in last year's World Youth Cup Finals. David Seal and Steve Corica, 20 years and 19 years respectively, also starred in Portugal last year.

This will be a case of the young ones steadying the boat for the older ones. Even skipper Ned Zelic just turned 21 last week, and one could hardly refer to him as a novice.

One key member of the team, Dominic Longo, has had to come back from two knee reconstructions to take his place with the team. The first was after the World Youth Cup qualifiers in 1988, and the second a mere nine months later. On both occasions, he was sidelined for up to four months while the surgery mended properly.

He is not only lucky, but dedicated, and could be forgiven if he had decided to give the game away in the dark days after the second operation. He will saddle up again for Newcastle in the coming CCSL season and is hoping to make his niche in the full Socceroo squad after a successful campaign at the Olympics.


FRANCE


