# Pine Rivers Soccer Club The Beginnings

It all started in 1967 when Jack Gurteenmade it possible for a group of Pine Rivers High School students to have a game of soccer. Then, through a mate at work, he arranged a game with Redcliffe under 14's, Pine Rivers won 5-3. Shortly after, a group of kids from Lawnton State School were knocking on Jack's door wanting him to get them a game. This he did, with a game against Zillmere (North Stars) under 12's, which they lost 16-0. The important aspect here was that soccer had started now in Pine Rivers, and the following year we fielded four teams in juniors, when they played on the oval that is now our main pitch.

The seniors started the following year in 1968. They trained and played at Gympie Road, Strathpine using the lights from the Strathpine Railway Station. They had to move when the Pine Rivers Council built its new offices, and this is when we obtained a lease on Wendy Allison Park.

The seniors didn't start off too well and lost 11–1 to Annerley, but within two years won our first promotion.

In 1980 Ian Steele was made our first Director of Coaching, and from then, the junior talent of the club was given the best possible coaching and the juniors were given every chance to prove themselves in the senior grades. When Dave Scriggins arrived, the Club continued this tradition, and was successful in getting the senior team in a hungry mood for success.

Then Bobby Hamilton came from Brisbane City, and he demanded a professionalism not seen before at Pine Rivers, and it was with this approach that Bobby was able to steer Pine Rivers to the XXXX League.

In 1979, Netball became a part of our Club and, like soccer, this sport has gone from 6 teams to over 20 within our structure.

### SEVEN TO TELECAST SOCCER

As reported in this column previously, the Seven Network will be providing saturation coverage of the Olympic Games, but little soccer. However, the good news just to hand is that soccer will now receive a higher profile on Australian television, due in part to the huge response to the Seven Network hierarchy from the game's followers and administrators.

Channel Seven Brisbane sportscaster Peter Meares has been asked to call soccer in Barcelona, and sought some in-depth background material from the QSF before heading off to Spain.

The office of the QSF was only too delighted to fax the material to Peter at short notice, in order to make him more fully acquainted with our players. It is understood that Peter, in conjunction with Craig Johnston, will be calling all soccer telecasts, something that he has not been involved in for quite a number of years. But it does appear that soccer now will be receiving a higher profile on television.

The Australian Olympic team continued its strong build-up to the Games with a convincing 4-0 win over leading German First

Division side Borussia Dortmund. This is the club that skipper Ned Zelic will join at the start of the next European season, and it gave the Aussies a good hit-out before meeting up with the rest of the Australian Olympians in Spain. In order to give all of his squad a sufficient warm-up, Eddie Thomson had also arranged for one final trial against newly promoted French First Division club, Valenciennes. 

They think that good officials are those who:

The problem coaches are those who believe and preach that:

- a. Everything is fair that is not detected by the referee
- b. Winning is more important than playing fairly
- Games are won and lost more by bad luck and biased referees than skill.
- d. It is more important to prevent the other side playing football (spoilers) than it is to have a fair game.
- e. The physical factor is the dominant one leading to skill.
- f. Players practice and use delaying tactics for re-starts.
- g. They should coach from the line (the shouters).

All should remember that a person's perceptions are highly coloured by his underlying and often obscured beliefs, motivations and attitudes, and his affiliations.

Spectators and coaches see the same incident - but give it a different value.

As far as the laws are concerned, good coaches would like to see the revision of the laws affecting:

- 1. GK kicking from hand
  - \* Defeats own objects of speeding up play
  - \* Opponent slows him down
  - \* Rolls ball to edge of penalty area
- 2. Use of yellow cards/cautions

Need to separate the technical type of foul (e.g. dissent of some kinds) from the more brutal personal fouls (e.g. kicking, especially from behind).

Often, the brutal personal fouls are not penalised as heavily as the relatively mild form of dissent.


