





At the recent Australian Women's Youth Championship in Hobart, Queensland shared the championship honours with New South Wales, after the final was abandoned because of bad weather.

After a training camp at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra early next year, the squad of 21 players will be trimmed to 16 to tour Europe and contest the Dana Cup in Denmark in July.

CONNIE GETS COACHING JOB

Former Queensland women's soccer captain Connie Byrnes has been appointed to a coaching role with the Queensland Academy of Sport.

The highly experienced Byrnes will act as an assistant to QAS headsoccercoach Jim Selby, concentrating on developing elite young female players.

QAS Director, Wilma Shakespear, and Queensland Soccer Federation President, Wallace Dann, confirmed the appointment this week.

Byrne is a veteran of eight

Australian Women's Championships, and also captained New South Wales and Northern NSW.

She led Australia in its first international women's tournament in Taipei in 1978.

Byrne's part-time appointment is for one year initially, effective from October

Her impressive coaching credentials include an Australian Soccer Federation Level 2 coaching certificate, an Australian Coaching Council Level 2 qualification and an ASF Level 0 Instructor Coach certificate.

Queensland captain Frank Pimblett was the toast of Brisbane last Monday night when he was named the 1992 Queensland Soccer Federation Gold Medal winner.

Pimblett, who won the award in 1990 with a record 36 points, was a narrow winner with 18 points, one ahead of Lutwyche's David James.

Grange Thistle's Paul Fagan, Coalstars' Brent

Read, Brisbane Croatia's Kevin Meacock and Easts' Steve Perry finished equal third on 15 points.

Pimblett's award was that much more special, considering he missed the start of the season due to Brisbane United commitments, and then was sidelined for several games with an ankle injury.

Pimblett came from behind to poll eight votes in the last four fixtures and take out the medal.

It is the first time a player from Pine Rivers has won the award, although Pimblett transfered from Eastern Suburbs during the season.

The 35-year-old midfielder paid a special tribute to Brisbane United coach Miron Bleiberg.

"Miron added an extra dimension to my game last summer and I would like to thank him for that," Pimblett said.

"I also thoroughly enjoyed my time at Pine Rivers so maybe that also had something to do with it.

"But I can tell you, I'm as surprised as you are."

Pimblett must now rate among the very best players to play the game in Queensland.

Socceroo captain Paul Wade was special guest speaker at the medal dinner and was given a great welcome.

Wade, who played against Tahiti at Perry Park the day before, said he was thrilled at the enthusiasm of Queensland's young soccer fans, who surrounded the Australians as they left the field.

"I think it was great how the Socceroos were mobbed by all those kids and I would urge all local players to put something back into the game after their playing careers finish," Wade said.

"If we can get one more kid interested in the game of soccer then it's fantastic.

"Who knows, maybe it could be another Ned Zelic."

The Queensland media awards were also presented.

Rochedale striker Kieran Cooper was named Player of the Year as well as Leading Goal Scorer, while North Star's Peter Bannon picked up the Coach of the Year award after his side won the XXXX Soccer League premiership.

Taringa midfielder Andrew Brayshaw, who helped his side to their best ever performance in the league, was the Rookie of the Year.

Derek Crawford was selected as Referee of the Year, in another hotly contested battle.

WHAT WE OWE THE GAME!

"What do they want, blood?" is a thought that all of us have had on occasions, especially as we trudge wearily towards the dressing room, amid criticism, after a trying game.

Well, yes, some of them really do want blood. Not necessarily our own, but quite happily that of an opponent or two. These people will probably be the first to cry and complain to you if they themselves shed even a spot of the vital red stuff! You see, what they want is not a sporting encounter to dispute fairly the footballing prowess of two teams, but a confrontation in which all the odds — and the referee's partiality — are stacked in their own favour.

So what are the players of both sides — and they are the ones who really matter, not one-eyed spectators — entitled to in a game, as far as we referees are concerned?

I believe we owe to each and every player in each and every game a refereeing performance that has the following qualities:

- * A punctual arrival and kick-off.
- * A smart appearance and a dignified bearing.
- * Total concentration and commitment throughout.
- * A refusal to be swayed, against our wishes, in our decisions.
- * Courage and honesty.
- * A thorough knowledge, not only of the Laws of the Game, but of the ways in which humans react to our own attitudes, manner and method of discipline.
- * A willingness to use a sense of humour and enjoyment to attain and retain match control.
- * A demonstration of our own composure under pressure.
- * An awareness that we represent at all times refereeing, other colleagues, the Soccer Federation and proper discipline.

If we can referee with all this in mind, then we shall encounter fewer problems; we shall help to maintain dignity in football; we shall keep the respect that refereeing, in general, basically has at present.

Refereeing

with Des Miles

We shall not, of course, succeed alone or immediately. We must recruit every referee to the Referees' Association, and we must do our very best to attend all meetings. Only in that way can we ever hope to foster the right attitudes among all refereeing colleagues.

The players are entitled to all the qualities I have mentioned, for we are paid a fee (no matter how small or large it may be) to give of our best at all times. If we offer, what I suggest, what's the betting that players will soon actually stop asking for what they see as their main entitlement — protection?

LEARN to anticipate and you may be able to nip situations in the bud. Try to read the game and also the minds and moods of the players. There will be critical flashpoints during games which need you to react to, and to be seen to react to, decisively.

Divisional Review

DIVISION 2

It is no co-incidence that these two teams also meet this weekend in the grand final. For the other semi-final placings, Goodna soundly defeated Capalaba to take out third place, while Logan City Kings had a not quite so convincing win against Latrobe Valley, to take out fourth place.

The relegation derby down at the Penin-

sula, went in favour of the visitors, Darra, when they defeated Redcliffe City 3-1 to push City down into Division 4.

This has been a most entertaining Division 3 season. It is to be hoped that the competition will remain equally appetising next year.


