Siedofsky calls for unity

Pine Rivers President Lance Siedofsky has urged local XXXX League clubs to throw their weight behind struggling NSL side Brisbane United in an attempt to lift the club back into the limelight.

Siedofsky's call for unity comes after a poor season by United which has seen them slip to last on the NSL ladder.

More importantly, United have failed to capture the support of Brisbane's soccer fraternity, who have stayed away from United's home matches over the past two seasons.

Siedofsky said he was hoping to stage a XXXX League match involving his side Pine Rivers as a curtain raiser to United's final home game against Preston in April.

"I haven't spoken to United yet but I think having a XXXX League match as a curtain raiser would give the match a boost," Siedofsky said.

He said his club was willing to forfeit one of their home matches to stage such a game.

"It may well be too late in the season but if we don't do something before next it may be too late," he said.

"Many of the local clubs are too prepared to sit back and criticise United instead of getting in and helping out.

"We are all in it together so I don't see why we can't work together to lift the profile of soccer."

He said the people at Pine Rivers were 100 per cent behind him.

"Everybody agrees that playing in the NSL is the best thing for the players and the code and we will be doing everything we can to help that."

United secretary Lawrence Oudendyk welcomed Siedofsky's support.

"I wish all club Presidents were like Lance," Oudendyk said.

He said was disappointed with the attitude of some local clubs who failed to support United when it mattered most.

"We appreciate the clubs lending us their players but apart from that we haven't had much support," he said.

"They signed a piece of paper at the beginning of the whole thing and that's about it."

He said some clubs had organised trial matches and social functions on the same nights as United home matches and this had affected crowds to some extent.

"The people you see regularly at XXXX League matches aren't the people you see at our games and that is a bit of a disappointment," Oudendyk said.

"I don't know why it is but I guess people just can't identify with United as their team.

"I suppose they feel they can't support two teams, and our results this season certainly haven't helped," he said.

With three games remaining this season (one home game) United officials are looking toward next year.

Should the club finish either last or second last in 1994, it would have to show cause why it should be allowed to stay in the NSL - with most agreeing it's chances of re-entry non-existent.

United are currently on a one month break due to the World Youth Championships and will be hoping for better results on their return.

In just over 24 hours, the world's third largest travelling sports show - The World Youth Championships - will kick-off.

Fittingly, the host nation Australia, will play the first match at the Sydney Football Stadium against South American qualifiers Colombia.

Queenslanders however, will have to wait until Saturday evening before they can get a "double" piece of the action at the traditional home of Rugby League, Lang Park.

Reigning World Youth Champions Portugal, take on Germany in the first match, which is set to start at 6.15pm. Then at 8.30pm, South American side Uruguay, go head to head with U/17 World Champions Ghana.

Journalists, officials, spectators and of course the players have been converging on the recently voted world's fourth most desirable city to live in for some time now.

In scenes resembling the biblical "feeding of the five thousand", the local organising committee has been stretched to the limit preparing for the weekend start.

But they are grateful for one small mercy. Instead of fish, followers of the great game will have a smorgasbord of action to quell their football-starved stomachs.

Tuesday, March 9, sees Germany play Ghana in the early game, while Portugal takes on Uruguay in the 8.30pm match. On Thursday, March 11, Germany play Uruguay, followed by Portugal verse Ghana. The Brisbane leg of The World Youth Championships finishes on Saturday March 13, when the number one qualifier from Group B plays Group A's number two.

Cranney - "Just in time"

Brisbane United midfielder Sean Cranney admitted during the week he had "just made it in time" in his return to the Young Socceroos squad for the World Youth Championships - after spending a month on the injury list.

The talented youngster tore ligaments in his ankle in a training accident in Melbourne in February and missed the tour to Saudia Arabia.

He was rushed to Adelaide two weeks ago to train under the watchful eye of assistant Young Socceroos coach Raul Blanco.

At that time Blanco was impressed with Cranney's recovery.

"Sean is looking very well," Blanco said.

"We know him very well and even though he didn't make the trip to Arabia he will still be in the squad."

Cranney said the two weeks with Blanco achieved their objective and he was happy with his level of fitness.

"I haven't really kicked the ball with the foot that much, I guess I've been protecting it," Cranney said.

"But I'm not worried about my fitness, it usually is pretty good anyway."

Cranney left for Sydney last week to join the squad and is expected to line up against Columbia in the Cup opener at the Sydney Football Stadium on Friday night (March 5).

"I'm bit nervous at the moment," he said.

"I haven't played in a long time and I don't really know how the foot will hold up, I'll just have to wait and see.

"But if training is any indication it will be okay," he said.

Australia is grouped with Columbia, Russia and Cameroon, with the Columbia match expected to be the toughest, although all matches at this level are tough.

"Columbia are a very good side," Cranney said.

"We saw them play in Columbia and they will be hard to beat.

"But I think we can do okay," he said.

Collins was magic

North Brisbane's Craig Collins put the set-backs behind him last week with a man-of-the-match performance against competition leaders Rochedale Rovers.

After breaking his foot twice last season, the former Brisbane United midfielder missed the current NSL season but showed why he was once ranked as the best youngster in the State with a dominating performance.

Playing with 10 men for most of the second half, North Brisbane went down 2-0 to a Rochedale side that struggled in the humid conditions.

Despite the loss North Brisbane coach Mauro Saftich was happy with the result.

"We had a bit of a depleted side with Vincenzino, Bender and Rackley all on the sidelines so we've shown we've got good depth," Saftich said.

"We also played half the game with 10 men, missed a penalty and created more chances than they did so it's very encouraging.

"I think we will do very well this year, I'm very confident," he said.

The match was a torrid encounter with referee Richard Miszczuk handing out a handful of cards and dishing out 45 free-kicks.

But it was the sending off of North Brisbane midfielder Craig Williams that caused most concern, ruining what would have been an action packed second half.

Williams appeared to make a copybook tackle on Rochedale's Kieran Cooper but was sent from the field after receiving his second yellow card.

The match started at a frantic pace with Rochedale dominating early before North Brisbane clawed their way back into the match.

Rod Vasquez should have given Rochedale the lead in the 11th minute after a pin-point from Russell Stewart found him unmarked on the six yard box.

With only Wayne Evans to beat Vasquez ballooned his volley over the bar.

Kieran Galloway was the second Rochedale

culprit five minutes later when he miss timed his shot after a great solo run through the North Brisbane defence.

North Brisbane also missed their chances with midfielder Kevin O'Brien heading over after latching on to a Craig Williams cross.

But it was Nigel McClure who opened Rochedale's account with an unstoppable drive in the 31st minute.

The nuggetty midfielder gave Evans no chance after Stewart Hart laid back a ball from a Frank Cole corner.

North Brisbane could have equalised right on half-time when striker Kevin Meacock was awarded a penalty after being brought down in the box.

Craig Williams, who scored two penalties the previous week, could only watch in agony as his shot hit the crossbar and sailed over the top. His misfortune continued three minutes after when he was sent-off.

North Brisbane almost equalised a minute later when defender Ben Tatasciore was denied by a brilliant reflex save from Graham Ross.

Both Collins and John Figliano could have scored for the Aces but it was Rochedale striker John Playle who put the nail in their coffin in the 80th minute.

The solid striker latched on to a cross from John Stewart and made no mistake making it 2-0.

Rochedale coach John Stewart said his side had stuck to the game and got the three points.

"It wasn't a technically good performance but it one of those days where you had to get stuck in and we did that," he said.

"Last week we had 12 chances and scored 8, this week we scored two, that's the way it goes."

LOWER DIVISIONS – PREVIEW



DIVISION 4

Despite finishing up in the lower half of the table in 1992 but with a positive goal difference, Brighton District never-the-less still struggled to stay in the Division. Many of the administrative problems they had last year, appear to now be behind them, and they can concentrate their efforts into consolidating their position, and aim for a Semi-Final placing.

Clairvaux on the other hand, were a team that stayed in the top two or three placings all year, and were a big show for promotion. Alas, they fell away in the last few fixtures to finish up in sixth place. You can expect to see better things from this club in 1993.

One of the progressive clubs on the Redcliffe Peninsula, Deception Bay, have a ready made base of support in their particular area. They have a nice complex, great flood-lighting, all they have to do now, is get the players to go with it.

Ipswich City on the western side of town, have seen better times in the past and, now having won promotion back to Division 4, are fully expected to realise their potential. They quite dominated in Division 5 last year, but time alone will tell whether they will retain this domination in a higher Division.

With a complex just nestled amongst the trees of the Western Highway, Kenmore Rangers, like others in the Western Suburbs, have a good junior base and the consequential following to support their seniors. Last year, both their senior teams in Division 4 and Reserve grade succeeded in sneaking in to fourth spot, will 1993 attain a higher placing?

Their close rivals out at Bellbowrie, Moggill United, again have a ready made support base from this new developmental area. However, on the playing field their senior team has struggled over the last two seasons, it is difficult to come up with any positive prediction for this club other than a mid-table placing.

For a considerable length of time in 1992 North Pine United looked doomed for relegation. Ultimately they finished up in fifth spot, a remarkable turn-around for this club in the back blocks of Dakabin. If they retain that sort of enthusiasm in 1993, they could be a big show for a Semi-Final position.

Not that many years ago, Oxley United were one of leading teams in the First Division competition in Brisbane. How times have changed. In recent years Oxley United have fluctuated between Divisions 3 and 5 quite regularly, this year being promoted once again from Division 5 to Division 4. It's difficult to predict if this once – proud club can climb back to their former glories.

With a marvellous sporting complex on the poetically named "Jinker Track", the Pine Hills Sport Club is a progressive clubs in the Pine Shire. Having only just missed out on promotion last year on goal difference, they could well take out a promotion spot this year. Or like so many clubs in the past, could their morale now be dented.

Despite a late season burst, the Premier Club on the Redcliffe Peninsula finally succumbed to relegation from Division 3. Redcliffe City have definitely seen better times in the past, its questionable whether 1993 will be the year for them to climb the ladder yet again.

A Club that sometimes suffers from a surfeit of other clubs in the foothills of Mount Nebo, Samford Rangers came a distant last in 1992, and will now have to start the hard work all over again in Division 4. Difficult to see them being anything other than a mid-table proposition.

For Virginia United, they too have suffered in the past through a lack of quality players, this year could be the year that they surprise everyone, and climb back to the position that they have held so successfully in the past.

The preview in this Division will only look at who have their first team in this Division.

Always in the shadow of their big brothers in Division 2, this would have to be the year for them to make their mark.

Brothers United have had a few traumatic years in the immediate past, both with problems in their country of origin, as well as dwindling support for their football club and community here in Brisbane. They appear to have put most of their problems behind them and are now looking forward to having a much better year both on and off the field.

The oldest club in the membership of the QSF, is going through a very lean time at Ipswich. The Dinmore Bushrats, who were founded in 1890, are more and more appearing to be swamped by their rival clubs in the Coal City.

Hopefully Dinmore can acquire the necessary numbers and quality of players to again make their name a force to be reckoned with.

Leichhardt Eagles is another Ipswich Club struggling for membership, although a large proportion of their playing staff come from the

next door Amberley Air Force Base. Like the Bushrats, have also seen the good times – and the lean times. It's fully expected that the Leichhardt Eagles will once again soar their way to a safe position in 1993.

Newly promoted from Division 6 and now experiencing the intoxicating air in Division 5, Loganholme may find that '93 could be a struggle for them, however, if last's year performance was anything to go by, a few Clubs in Division 5 could well be surprised.

Southside Eagles finally succumbed to relegation, after bitterly fighting against it for the past couple of seasons. Not 15 years ago this Club succeeded in taking out the Premiership/ Championship Double in the First Division, now they are struggling to stay afloat in Division 5. Can pride bring them back up to their previous position?

With a ground situated in an area densely populated by flats and units, the young support for Toowong Soccer Club, appears to have all but vanished. There has been a large influx of new administrators, players and supporters into the club, its difficult to predict anything for this club, so early in the season.

Western Suburbs have had their problems both on and off the field in the past, but the new administration is determined to sweep away all the problems they encountered in the past, and will do their talking on the playing field.

The club will now suffer for a second match because Williams had no right to appeal referee Richard Miszczuk's decision. A send-off is an automatic one match suspension, a player can only appeal if the QSF disciplinary committee extend his sentence beyond that.

Stewart also brought to light a valid point about referee's inspections. Miszczuk approached both coaches before the match and told them he was being inspected. Judging by the amount of

free-kicks, it affected his performance. The Rochedale Rovers coach has had his run-ins with referees over the years, but was quick to praise Miszczuk after the game. He believed the effort by Miszczuk was totally out of character.

Miszczuk is an experienced referee, but in any field if you are aware your supervisors or selectors are watching, it tends to make for some nervous moments.

It will be interesting to see if Miszczuk appears again in the First Division in the near future.

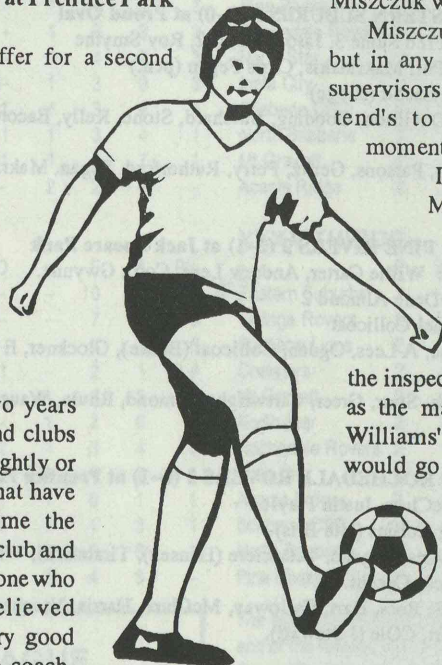

"Rale is a very good friend of mine but on the field we are opponents," Cutillas said.

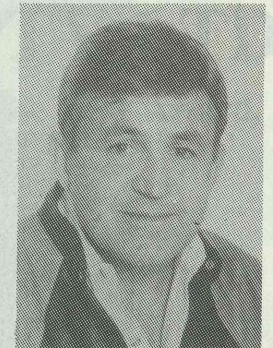
"We know each others coaching style very well so it will be an interesting challenge."

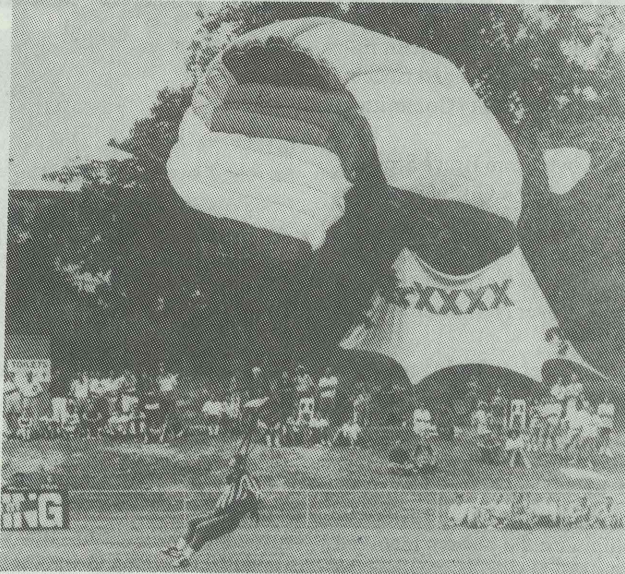
