

Gesture causes uproar

Pine Rivers will lodge an official complaint to the Oueensland Soccer Federation following an incident involving linesman Gordon Nicholson after last weekends clash with Rochedale Rovers in the XXXX Soccer league.

Coach Frank Pimblett said after the match that the club would lodge the complaint after Nicholson appeared to blow a kiss to the Pine Rivers supporters.

"We cop the bad decisions and try to be professional by biting our tongues and then things like this happen." Pimblett said.

"He gestured to our women supporters and he shouldn't be allowed to get away with it.

"These officials are supposed to be figures of respect but they go and do things like this," he said.

"It seems as though they are a law unto themselves."

Nicholson refused to comment after the match.

If Rivers do lodge an official complaint, the Queensland Soccer Federation would take the matter up with the Australian Soccer Referees Association who would then act on the incident.

If the QSF is still not happy with the outcome, they could then take the matter further.

Dear Sir.

Various rules and regulations written into the constitutions of governing bodies and their affiliates, allow for the censure of players, officials and supporters. In any situation, an employee is subject to performance appraisal by the employer and if the employee is found wanting, the option is to shape up or ship out.

No employer can afford the luxury of carrying unproductive workers at the expense of loss of business or credibility.

Similarly, soccer must be conducted as a corporation, if it is to have any credibility amongst its followers - and also if Brian Kerle's plans to raise the image of soccer are to succeed.

I appreciate that no one is God and mere mortals do make mistakes and as mere mortals we must succumb and rectify.

The issue of accountability of referees must be addressed in the interest of the betterment of the code and in the hope of increasing the POSITIVE profile that soccer justly deserves.

The countdown begins

The race is on for the vital fifth place in the XXXX League final five series after a round of unsets last weekend.

Acacia Ridge (26 points) hold fifth spot at the moment after a 1-1 draw with Inala City last week but must fight off challenges from Pine Rivers (24), North Brisbane (22) and Brisbane CSC (22).

Rochedale Rovers (38), Taringa Rovers (35), North Star (34) and Brisbane Lions (29) make up the top four and all seem assured of a finals berth with Taringa, Rochedale and North Star destined for the double chance.

At the other end of the scale, Mt Gravatt (18), Easts (20) and Coalstars (21) will be fighting to avoid relegation with Easts and Coalstars still a slim chance of making the five.

EDITORIAL.....

I ventured across to the opposition last week to sample a Winfield Cup match first hand and I must admit I thoroughly enjoyed the day. John Ribot and the Broncos put on an excellent match. It was great to be part of the 55, 000 crowd and witness some of the world's best players strut their stuff. The half-time entertainment was also great with Margaret Urlich bashing out four of her hit songs. I sat back and thought, wouldn't it be great to play in front of crowds like that and win. It certainly gets the blood flowing. The crowd was surprisingly well behaved with ANZ stadium making it a family day.

The funny thing is, I left the ground truly believing that Soccer has the potential to achieve some of the goals that the Broncos have. 55,000 is certainly out of range but it must be noted that soccer clubs overseas play regularly in front of these size crowds. The thing that struck me most was that I was watching the world's best players out there on the field. Unfortunately for soccer fans in Australia, we do not have all the worlds best players at our feet. Unlike Rugby League, which is played well by only a handful of countries, soccer is played in around 170 countries and being the best is a great achievement. Rugby League, in that sense, is limited and the players will be the first to admit it. Take Allan Langer for example. As the one of the world's best players he recently signed a million dollar contract for the next five years. If you look at that along side Holland's Marco Van Basten who is worth \$30 million and receives \$A30,000 per match, there is no comparison.

If you add all this up, it means that soccer in Australia has to work hard to get its supporters. Hopefully now with Brian Kerle aboard we will be able to do that. Australia qualifying for the 1994 World Cup would also be a big help. Our next biggest problem is keeping our top line players in the country instead of exporting them overseas. The last count showed almost 50 Australians were currently contracted overseas. Those players could certainly juice up the National League in Australia.

Rochedale increase lead

Rochedale Rovers increased their lead in the XXXX Soccer League with a last gasp 1–0 win over Pine Rivers in an incident-marred match at Perry Park last weekend.

Pine Rivers coach Frank Pimblett was left to rue the loss after two refereeing mistakes cost his side the match.

Ironically, the Strathpine-based club played some of their best football this season yet came away with nothing after they were denied what looked a certain penalty in the 80th minute.

They also had just cause to question the legality of Rochedale's winner after at least two of their players appeared to be offside with some later admitting they were.

Slowly regaining their form of earlier in the season, Rochedale started the match strongly with midfielder Frank Cole causing Rivers problems down the right flank and Keiran Cooper and Justin Playle rooming strongly up front.

Mengotti inspires win

Brisbane Lions midfielder Frank Mengotti returned to form with a bang last week, leading his side to an easy 3-1 win over Brisbane CSC.

With only four points separating the sides prior to the match, it was always going to be a struggle but Mengotti and fellow midfielder Wayne Hinton ran the show from start to finish.

CSC, who started the match without a regular striker due to injuries and suspensions, were left to rue some missed chances in the opening minutes after Lions started poorly.

Midfielder Fred Kruys kicked Lions back into finals mode in the 15th minute after latching onto a great ball from Hinton.

With the goal in his sights, the Dutchman skilfully evaded one tackle before reeling off a dipping shot that scraped over the bar.

Soon after it was CSC's turn to come close with a Frazer Cuba shot flashing wide.

Sime offers silent support

When relegation-threatened Eastern Suburbs run out onto the field against Mt Gravatt on Saturday night, they will receive support from an unexpected corner.

In 1989, current Brisbane Lions coach John Sime was the first man to lead the Tigers to a Grand Final win since 1972 and he would dearly love to see them avoid relegation this season.

The 42-year-old Scotsman has firmly established himself as one of the State's leading coaches, with the Premiership-Grand Final double with Lions in 1991 a major highlight.

Sime boasts an impressive career in the game with stints at Scottish clubs Dundee and Dundee United and English clubs Sheffield Wednesday and Everton.

He moved to Australia in 1983 and linked up with Lions where he played a handful of matches before moving into the coaching scene.

He took up the position at Easts in 1984 where he stayed until the Grand Final win in 1989.

After that he moved to Lions where he coached their reserve side for a year before moving into the top job.

During his time in Australia he has seen many quality players come and go but one player will stick firmly in his memory for a long time to come.

"Steve Perry is probably the player that stands out more then anybody else," Sime said.

"Not only is he a quality player, he is a quality person as well and that is rare.

"His organisational skills are unbelievable and he just seems top have the edge over all the others," he said.

"Steve could play until he is 50."

And what about a highlight?

"The Grand final win against Lions in 1989 was for me the best moment," Sime said.

"It was against all the odds and it was something special."

Sime confirmed that this would be his last season at the Richlands' based club but added he would still be involved in the game.

"I'll definitely be leaving Lions at the end of the season and I could probably see myself



Sime – may move to the administration side. looking into the administration side of things," he said.

Another bright spot in the Sime success story is the achievements of his children Darren and Jilly.

Jilly is keen netballer who has made several representative sides while Darren is currently on a scholarship on the Australian Institute of Sport.

The talented youngster is a current member of the Australian Under 17 side which heads to Japan in August for the World Championships. "Darren's probably a better player than I was," Sime said.

"I haven't seen him play for about nine months and unfortunately I won't get to go to Japan.

"Maybe if they made the final I might make the trip," he said.

"Obviously as a Father I'm very proud of both my children's achievements."

And while things are looking good all round, he is solely concentrating on getting Lions into the Grand Final.

"It's all on the day and we have as good a chance as all the others," Sime said.

"Any one of the top four teams could win it." Eye on Soccer wishes John all the best. If he does give up coaching this year, the game will lose one of its real characters






