State Squad best in years

Oueensland coach Juan Cutillas believes his XXXX State Squad is the best the public has seen for many years, and will be extremely competitive in the upcoming representative season.

Cutillas named a very large squad of 23 players to prepare for the XXXX State team representative program.

Included in the squad were six players from the Brisbane Strikers, and another seven from the National Soccer League, with ten XXXX League players making the grade also.

The seven players from down south are Jason Polak (South Melbourne), Manis Lamond (Sydney United), Glenn Gwynne, Andrew Brayshaw, and John Koch (Parramatta), and Steve Corica (Marconi).

Cutillas said he was awaiting confirmation from these clubs for the players' availability.

"The NSL players down south are all very established and should be in tiptop shape," he said.

"I'm not expecting all of these players to be available to play so I just hope that we are able to get three of them in the team.

"This is a very good squad and it is probably the strongest Oueensland has put up for many many years," Cutillas said.

"The squad has been picked on a combination of current form, experience, and past performance.

"I've seen a lot of the ten XXXX League players this season and they are all playing very well."

Cutillas said he was relieved to be able to select players from the Brisbane Strikers for this year's representative program.

"The Strikers' players who have been included in the squad are the younger, more

promising ones, except for Alan Hunter, whose experience and skill could not be overlooked," he said.

"The two keepers are two of the best goalkeepers in the country, while (Chris) Slater and (Sean) Cranney have both played for Queensland before and are both very keen to represent their State again."

Young midfielder/striker Chay Hews has also been rewarded with inclusion following his successful baptism of fire into the NSL.

The squad assembled for its first training session on Wednesday night in preparation for the XXXX State team's first match against Canterbury in Christchurch on May 10.

EDITORIAL

It was extremely disappointing both from an administrator's and a supporter's point of view to hear the news that Brisbane missed out on hosting one of the upcoming international matches against Ghana. An application was made to the ASF to host one of the games, based on the popularity and support Ghana was given during the 1993 World Youth Championships in Australia and the excellent crowd that was in attendance for the recent match between the Socceroos and Colombia at Suncorp Stadium. The crowd of 13,500 at the Colombia match ensured the financial result from that game was extremely pleasing from both the QSF and ASF's perspectives, and an even bigger crowd was expected for the popular Ghana. The cities that got the nod ahead of Brisbane were Perth and Adelaide, with Sydney getting their regular match. No doubt Perth will get a good crowd to their match, however the decision is a little disheartening for Queenslanders when you consider Brisbane had such a good attendance



at a mid-week international, while Sydney had only 1,500 more in attendance on a

Saturday night, and Adelaide's Hindmarsh Stadium, whilst an excellent venue, can only hold 10,000 people. Despite missing out on this match, the OSF will not lessen its resolve to make further applications for more international matches. Our state is the fastest growing state in the country, and this expanding population along with our healthy junior base in Queensland are factors the ASF can not ignore. On a positive note it was pleasing to read ASF Chairman David Hill's comments regarding more international matches for the Socceroos. Hill called for a minimum of 16 matches for the Australian team, including games against World Champions Brazil, and other prominent nations such as England and Argentina. In light of this, perhaps Queensland will secure more internationals in the near future, especially now that we have the runs on the board.

Coalstars pick up the points

Coalstars recorded their first win since the opening round of the XXXX League season, defeating Grange Thistle 4-2 at Lanham Park on Saturday night.

After having only picked up one point in their last five matches, Coalstars win has dragged them away from the bottom of the table.

They took the lead after only five minutes through Troy Hews who got on the end of a David Guest cross, leaving Grange keeper Nathan Higgins with no chance.

Their lead was short lived as Darren Bender equalised for the home side in the 16th minute, scoring from close range after capitalising on some excellent work from player-coach Danny Docherty.

Docherty had the chance to give Grange the lead after 24 minutes from the penalty spot, following a challenge from Coalstars keeper Kevin Farrar on Bender. Farrar made amends, however, saving well from Docherty's spot kick.

Grange paid for that missed chance nine minutes later when man-of-the-match Guest caught keeper Higgins off his line with a powerful drive from nearly 30 yards, which rocketed into the crossbar before finding the net.

More was to follow for the boys from Ipswich in the 44th minute, when Higgins failed to punch a poor Effie Cassar clearance, leaving Wes Park with an easy tap in header.

Not to be outdone, Grange hit back one minute later through Steve Love who rifled a shot past Farrar to make it 3-2, after the Coalstars defence had failed to clear the ball from the penalty area.

Both teams slowed down somewhat after the break, following the ferocious pace of the first half. Guest had a chance in the 63rd minute to make increase the visitors lead but was foiled by Higgins in a one-on-one situation. Coalstars continued their charge, and where only denied by the crossbar in the 71st minute after a magnificent Adam Daly free-kick.

Wayne McGauley had the chance to equalise in the 87th minute for Grange, but finished poorly with only Farrar to beat.

The home side were reduced to ten men one minute later, when defender Sean Armstrong was sent off for his second bookable offence.

Coalstars finally put Grange out of their misery in the 91st minute when Guest tapped in from six yards after good work by Hews on the left.

Coalstars coach Wayne Warren was relieved to finally record another win.

"I told them at half time that I didn't care if it was pretty or not. We needed the points," Warren said.

"There is still a lot of work to do though."

Grange spokesperson Paddy Higgins was disappointed with the home side's performance.

"They wanted to win more than we did," Higgins said.

Regional coaching heads boost Queensland soccer

Queensland soccer has been very fortunate to secure the services of some of the best soccer professionals in the country to work as Regional Directors of Coaching (RDOC's). These men enjoy a high profile within provincial areas and are not simply junior coaches. They are involved in the game at the highest level, developing people to coach State sides, and shaping future national representatives. Over the coming months *Eye On Soccer* will be taking a closer look at these men, giving an insight into their roles and responsibilities, and seeing exactly how much they are doing for the game.

At just 29, North Queensland's RDOC Mark Boyd, is the youngest of the State's Regional Directors of Coaching, but has had a wealth of experience both on and off the playing field.

A colourful representative career in his younger days, including the Australian Schoolboys and Australian Youth Squads, and a stint with the Australian Institute of Sport, set Boyd up for a short senior football

career, with Brisbane teams, Pine Rivers, Brisbane City, North Star, Mt Gravatt, and The Gap.

Boyd took the North Queensland RDOC position at the beginning of 1993 at a stage when the position had been vacant for more than 12 months.

"The previous RDOC Andrew Bettell had done a great job up here, but after he left to take up the RDOC spot on the Gold Coast, the organisation of soccer was lost and interest was waning," Boyd said.

"We are now just starting to get back on track again and are reaping the rewards of the hard work put in during the last couple of years.

"Without a Regional Director of Coaching in place, the attitudes of the people begin to drop, and the lack of organisation and professionalism goes down through the levels to the younger people, so the game really suffers." Boyd's role up in Townsville

basically encompasses the development of coaches and players, including educational work in the form of Level 1 and 2 coaching courses.

rd "We set up coaching courses k Boyd for clubs and development programs for the junior associations," Boyd said.

"It's really a hands on job responsible for full development through all levels of the game, and we're starting to see a genuine improvement in the standard of players up here.

"We've made a big impact in the area in the last couple of years.

"All of the coaches in our Premier League are Level 3, the Townsville Soccer Academy has been formed, where younger players from the local clubs are brought in for added coaching, and the QSF TAPS (Talented Athletes Program Soccer) program is in place as part of the Federation's development of elite athletes.

"With all of these things going on, competitive representative sides can be picked from the region and players have a grounding whereby they can enter State teams." >

FROM THE SIDELINE

The QAS girls took out the 21st Annual Watson Shield last weekend after defeating Eastern Suburbs 1-0 in the tournament. The girls knocked off Brisbane City, Queensland University, and Slacks Creek to make the final, with Easts beating Mt Gravatt, the Gold Coast, and winning on penalties after being held to a scoreless draw by North Star to reach the last game. In the Consolation Cup final Margate defeated Sunshine Coast Youth 1-0.

It was more like a game of tennis out at Richlands during the XXXX Reserves match between Lions and North Star. Midway through the first half Lions led 4-0, before the visitors pulled it back to 4-2 at half-time. Magic words at the break inspired North Star to score four goals in a row to take a 6-4 lead, with Lions springing back into action straight afterwards, scoring another two to make it 6-6 at full time. The final score: 0-4, 2-4, 6-4, 6-6.

Participation levels have gone up by 27 per cent in the North Queensland area in the last twelve months and soccer is still the most popular junior sport by far, however the region's talent identification scheme has not been as successful as first hoped.

"Restricted numbers makes it difficult to play a high standard continuously, but we're looking at changing attitudes by exposing kids to a higher level of competition," Boyd said.

"We are developing good players, but we need a regular senior competition that younger players can aspire to so they don't have to leave the region to continue playing good competitive soccer.

"The advent of the North Queensland Razorbacks' senior team is a good starting point for these youngsters, but regular games against competitive teams are needed. The Division 5 match between Bayside United and Olympic saw one of the more freakish goals of the season, scored by Olympic's Perry Zamagia. The striker knocked a half volley from half way with a powerful strike, to find the net. XXXX League referee Ted Kearney was on hand and said it was one of the best goals he had ever seen.

Be on the lookout for Japanese club Yokohama Marinos, who will be out in Australia for a two week training camp very soon. The club is sponsored by huge motor company Nissan, and will be using Perry Park exclusively for two daily training sessions for the durationof their stay.

"Letters to the Editor" has not yet made an appearance this season, surely some of you have points of view you would like published, or even some constructive criticism is welcome.

"Currently we are investigating the possibility of getting into one of the Asian competitions."

DIVISION 9A



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The Oueensland squad was named this week and its good to see many current National League players, particularly those from interstate, in the team.

In the past, coach Juan Cutillas has had to work with teams predominantly made up of players from the local competition, and whilst they've given their all, full-strength interstate teams have often been too classy.

It seems the upcoming tour of New Zealand where the side will try to wrestle the Sir Robert Muldoon Trophy from Auckland has provided an attractive alternative for the players.

Those who went on the last tour speak of it in reverent terms, even though the side failed in their attempt to grapple the trophy from Auckland.

Players such as Steve Corica and Jason Polak are full internationals and to see them in maroon jerseys is vital for the growth of interstate soccer.

Their return to the state side would go a long way to ensuring the side gains the elusive trophy from their New Zealand counterparts.

With the National League season over for Brisbane's entrant in the elite competition, the side will now look to strengthen their position

before next season starts.

After training with the side infrequently last pre-season, and numerous attempts by the Strikers to gain his signature, Brown has decided coaching is his number one priority and has hung up his boots.

After a fairly successful year, including guiding the QAS side to the semifinals, Brown looks likely to have a long and successful coaching career in front of him.

Speaking of the Strikers, their increasing profile in the state and burgeoning crowd numbers begs the question as to how long the side will continue to play their home games at Perry Park.

With a capacity of under ten thousand, the Strikers continued success may lead to the club seeking more expansive facilities in future years.

Recent modifications at Perry Park have improved the ground for soccer in recent years, but little has been done to increase the ground's capacity.
