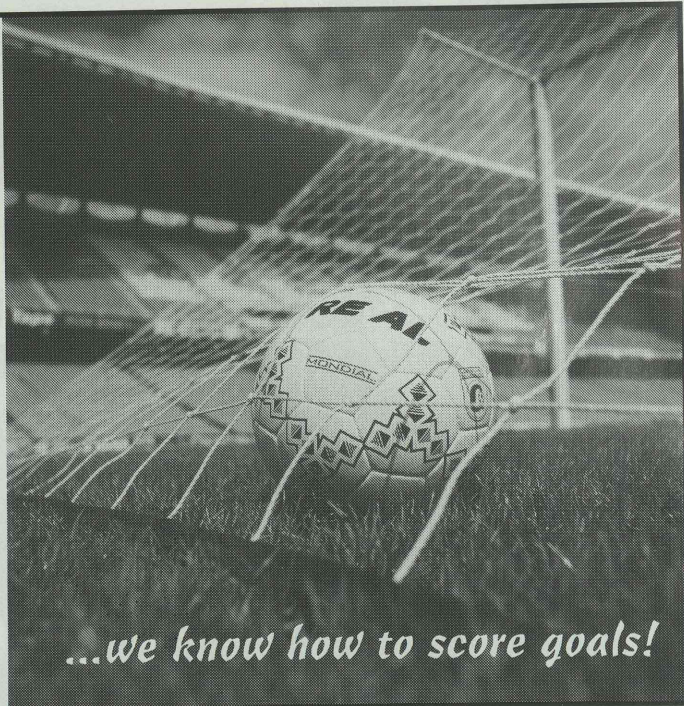

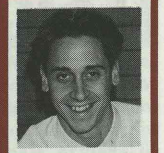

Editorial



I often wonder why soccer appears to be behind the eight ball in terms of its profile when compared to other sports in Queensland.

I think I received one of the answers last week. Three fixture matches postponed because of *what...* representative commitments? Unbelievable!

What other sport calls off matches because teams have "too many" players representing their State or Country?

Personally, I struggle to think of one and I also struggle to come to terms with the reasoning behind such a decision.

Other codes in National competitions use split rounds and the like to combat heavy representative calendars and ease the burden off some of their stronger clubs, but we postpone matches altogether.

Have you ever seen a Sheffield Shield cricket match postponed because a side has three or more players in the Australian team, or even an ARL fixture for that matter? I don't think so!

Obviously the problem was compounded by the late finalisation of the Queensland squad for Darwin, which meant matches were officially postponed just three days prior to when they were scheduled to be played.

Some people may argue the current situation is fair because it allows clubs to have their strongest team on the park for their club match.

But what about the sides they are playing against, the clubs that are forced to forfeit a home match at a time which they had originally planned for?

Will they have to catch the game up on a Wednesday night, a night which could see a sizeable decrease in crowd numbers?

Could politics be the other player here?

Politics aside, I thought it was because of things like representative commitments that clubs had squads of up to 20 players. What does this say about the depth of clubs which couldn't play last weekend because they would be missing a few players? They obviously have a lot of confidence in their fringe first team players! We might as well reduce the squad numbers at the back of **Eye On Soccer** to the bare eleven, with three substitutions.

Maybe it's time to step out of the dark ages and reconsider our position on this subject. □

Late Qld onslaught stops NT

The Territory had few answers for Queensland's second-half onslaught in the Drink Sense Cup soccer clash at Gardens Oval on Sunday.

The NT went into half-time locked at 1-1 following an enterprising 45 minutes but the Maroons fired after the break to win 3-1.

The Territory expended so much energy soaking up Queensland's early second-half barrage it lost its way in the midfield.

NT striker Andy Read said: "The midfield ran out of steam - it was a totally different game in the second half."

Sweeper Mick Athanasiou said the NT's fitness in the fast-paced clash was a problem but "we had a couple of chances - it wasn't all one-way".

Midfielders Scott Piper, Manuel Lolas and Nick Politis had some useful touches early, giving good service to Read and Francisco Lam.

Lam, after slipping inside defender Gary Brattan down the right side, cannoned a shot into the side netting from a tight angle in the 14th.

Busy midfielder Warren Allen orchestrated Queensland's first lead just on half an hour when his low cross found Clayton Koch.

Read, on the right side, created the equaliser in the 40th when he crossed to Piper.

Piper pulled out of his run but defender Danny Cox rifled a clearing header past keeper Robbie Farrow.

Politis almost brought the house down after his cracking 35m straight drive forced a top save from Farrow.

He said: "It was on target; it was going in."

But the Maroons regrouped at the break and through Craig Collins, Allen and Damien Waugh, took control.

The NT missed injured sweeper Michael Makryios but Athanasiou, Eddie Carroll, Tommy Mavros and John Tambouras defended well.

The Territory missed Tambouras' speed out wide after he was carried off with a right hamstring injury just before the hour.

NT keeper Mehmet Kahriman was at times reluctant to come off his line but did pull off a couple of great saves.

Queensland's dominance led to Frank Mengotti's sharp header for a 2-1 lead, on the hour.

Tall Maroon sweeper Damien Harris was rewarded when he headed a late third goal.

NT coach Mick Banks said: "A team of that quality doesn't enjoy going into half-time 1-1. They were clearly good enough to raise the pressure." □

Nerang have also moved in a big way from seventh spot all the way up to fourth.

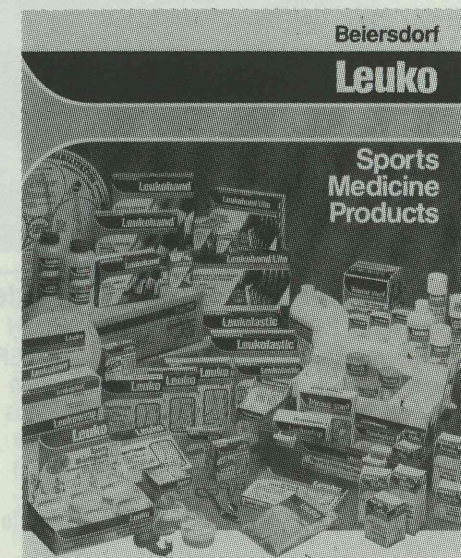
Brisbane City have dropped a position and are now second from the bottom after accumulating a massive 94 demerits, comprising 23 yellow and five red cards.

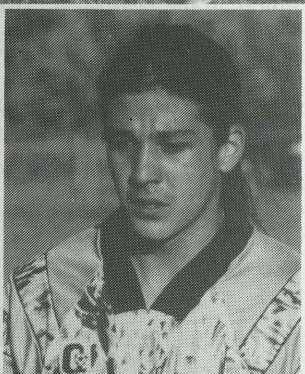
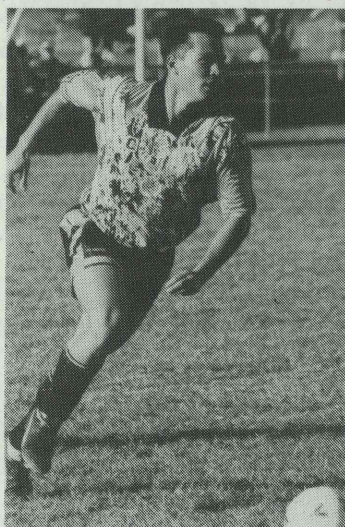

Tigers gnaw at Wolves tail

Cold and windy conditions at Heath Park on Sunday afternoon saw an Easts versus Wynnum encounter which failed to reach any great heights, but the Wolves still did just enough to secure a 1-0 victory.

It was the home side who took the initiative early however, with an early strike over the bar from Martin Jagers followed by a stinging long range effort from Gary McPhee.

But Wynnum slowly gained the ascendancy and striker Jamie Macpherson went close to opening the scoring on 15 minutes. A miss-kick from Easts keeper Robbie Harrison went straight to Macpherson who hit a powerful first-time volley but it flew straight back into the arms of the relieved Tigers custodian.

Then Wynnum's Ben Wood sliced a cross from wide on the left which had Harrison rooted to the spot as the ball sailed inches over the bar and on to the roof of the net.

Easts nearly self-destructed moments later when a back-header from Sam Porteous failed to carry to Harrison and demanded a desperate lunge from his keeper as Geoff Maltby attempted to intercept.

The Tigers caused themselves still further problems when another backpass resulted in Harrison handling outside the area. However their blushes were saved as the resultant freekick was struck straight into the wall and easily cleared.

Wynnum's Darren Hindes produced the best strike on goal of the first half moments later, with a ferocious drive from 25 yards which demanded an acrobatic save from Harrison.

Next it was Ricky McKinless to go close for the Wolves as he rose well to meet a Ben Wood cross, but his header rolled across goal and was cleared to safety.

Just before the break Easts finally created a chance to snatch the lead, when Jason Poggi raced on to a well weighted through-ball but scooped the chance over the bar as Wynnum keeper Kevin Tatton charged off his line.

After the break Poggi again came close as he ran on to a Willie Carter pass but was denied by a smothering save from Tatton. Poggi had several more chances and showed strength and skill to hold the ball up, yet was unable to produce an incisive finish to put his team into the lead.

East continued to look more threatening in the second half and Chris Fegan came desperately close with a header which bounced narrowly wide.

Fegan was again in the action 10 minutes later when he hit a swerving long range shot which left Tatton unsuspected until the last moment, the Wynnum keeper just able to push the ball around the post.

Next it was Wynnum's Tony McKinless coming from deep onto a loose ball but his shot was smothered by the diving Harrison.

The winning goal finally arrived for Wynnum with 20 minutes to go as Macpherson stumbled over the ball before rolling it to the far post for the flu-stricken Geoff Maltby to tap in. The big striker had been in the midst of a coughing fit only moments before but was perfectly placed to score one of the easiest goals he'll get this season.

Macpherson failed to add to Wynnum's total when one-on-one with Harrison and Easts' Willie Carter hit a smart shot from the edge of the box but the score keepers were not troubled further, the match finishing 1-0. □

Thistle takes on new coach

Grange Thistle have taken a new direction in the XXXX League, with Barry Dann stepping down from the coaching position and former North Queensland RDOC Mark Boyd taking the reigns.

And despite Thistle's ordinary on-field performances over the last few months, Dann's resignation was not connected to their results, according to club President Barrie Allison.

"The club is extremely happy with what Barry has done this year," Allison said.

"The real problem was that Barry was trying to combine coaching with the job of Football Manager, and his duties as the Chairman of the club's Social Committee.

"The amount of travelling he had to do from his home at Bribie Island also started to take its toll, but it was really a case of wearing a dozen hats and not being able to pay the proper attention to any particular job."

Dann conveyed the youth policy ideals of Grange Thistle's Board at the beginning of the year in *Eye On Soccer*, but despite a flying start to the season, the side has failed to set the XXXX League alight.

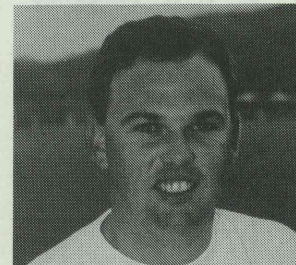
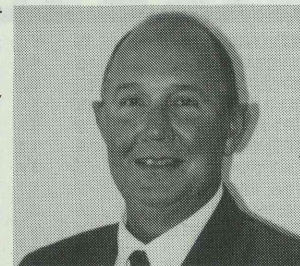
"We knew it was going to be a very difficult year, but we also knew we had to take the direction we did, in order to get the club's finances back in order and to build a young side that could take us into the future," Allison said.

"What Barry has done for the club in the last six months, would normally take two to three years to be completed.

"The results speak for themselves. He's cleaned out the team of older footballers and we only have to win one more game this year to have had a more successful season than we had last year. And he's done this with a side that has cost the club three times as less money."

Dann's replacement, Boyd, recently stood

down as North Queensland's Regional Director of Coaching, where he had success coaching the North Queensland Razorbacks.

As a youngster, Boyd showed plenty of promise, gaining selection in the Australian Schoolboys and Australian Youth squads and having a stint at the Australian Institute of Sport.

But injury took its toll and now the 30 year old is eager to continue on where Dann left off.

"I've taken the team over at a very unsettled time but the direction for the club seems to be there and I've got a crew of good, young players to work with," Boyd said.

"I don't think people are expecting miracles between now and the end of the season, so our first goal is to survive until the end of the season and pick up a few points as we go along."

Allison said Boyd was approached by Dann to take over the coaching role and if things worked out between the new coach and Thistle, he would take the side into next year.

In the meantime, Dann will happily stay on as the side's Football Manager. □

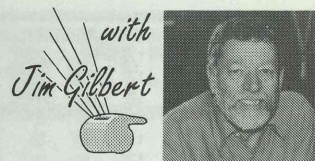

The fact that the goal was given retrospectively so long after the original incident has raised a few eyebrows, particularly among the strikers in the league.

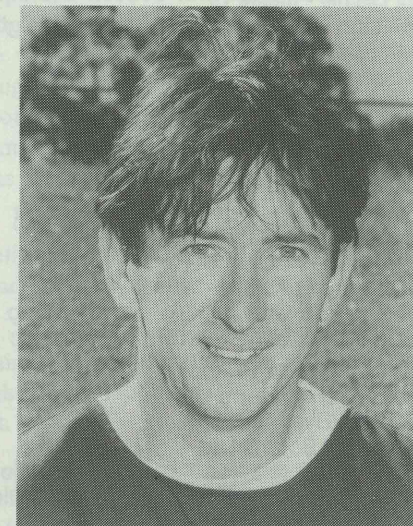

With Coops goal, the scenario was a little different because the game was on video tape. There again another controversial point is raised.

Why should he gain the advantage just because Rochedale games are filmed. Either video evidence is used for all games or none.

If for one think the goal should be Cooper's. But to wait for such a length of time before reaching a decision was an unfortunate situation.



The problem should have been clarified as soon as it was discovered. To wait such a length of time sets a dangerous precedent.

On a different tact, I was most interested to read an article in the *Courier Mail* last week that indicated the eagerly anticipated streamlined league for next year is far from a certainty.

The tone of the article seemed to indicate the league is still considering the changes. It would be a disgrace if it didn't go ahead.

It was disappointing to read such a declaration. By making that sort of statement, he casts a shroud on every player in the league.

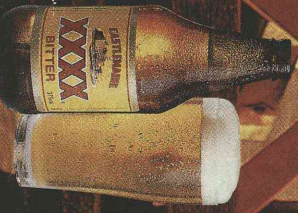
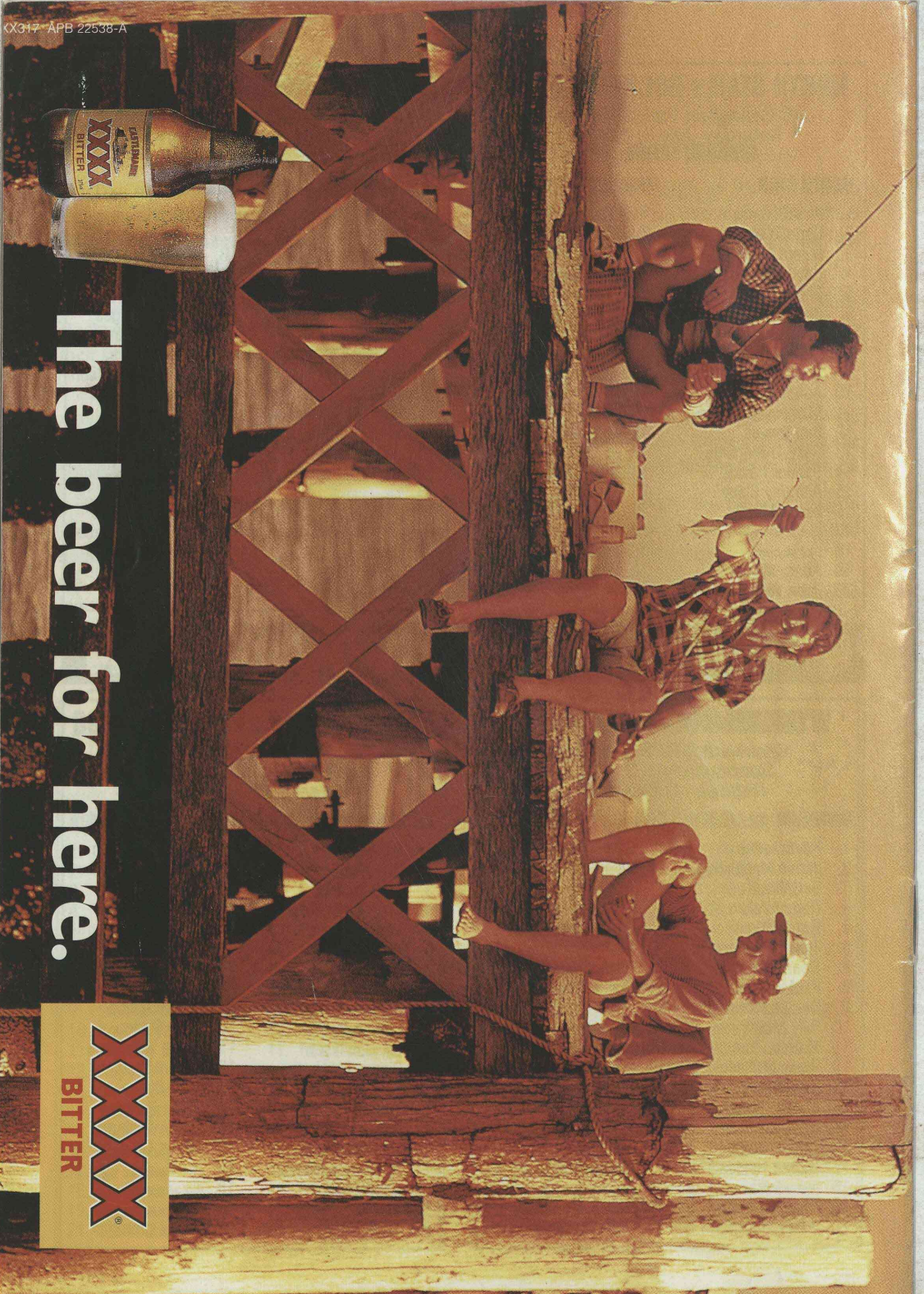
