Almond puts City on top

Brisbane City scored their third consecutive 1-0 victory in the XXXX Premier League on the weekend as the best defence in the league got the better of top scoring team Rochedale.

Rochedale had scored four in each of its previous matches against Wynnum and Lions but were denied by some resolute City defending and missed opportunities in the match at Spencer Park.

Notable absentee from Rochedale's starting line-up was one Kieran Cooper, the league's top scorer for nine of the past ten seasons, who started the match on the bench.

Cooper's absence made room for young striker Steve Fitzsimmons in the run-on side, an opportunity he thoroughly deserved after his two goal substitute appearance against Lions last week.

Fitzsimmons impressed early with his high workrate and persistent pressure on the City defence but it was Clayton Koch who should have put the visitors in front in only the third minute.

Craig Collins worked the ball between two defenders and into the City box but Koch's lunging effort was superbly smothered by City keeper Daniel Duke.

Rochedale dominated the first half and continued to create chances with David Pilic going close with a thirty yard strike.

Fitzsimmons continued to make things difficult for the City defence but wrong choices in the attacking third by the youngster meant the opportunities created amounted to nothing.

But with five minutes before half-time City broke the deadlock against the run of play when midfielder Dean Almond headed home a far post cross, into the back of the net.

Almond has now scored all three of City's

City's midfielder Dean Almond may well ask where his striking team mates have gone, after scoring all the team's goals to date



goals in the Premier League from midfield which suggests they lack some fire-power up front.

City's strike force of Darryl Grundy and Fiore Bartilomo lacked any real potency or cohesion for the home side and coach Bobby Hamilton might yet live to regret the club releasing Lee Scriggins and Ian Hutchison during the off-season.

The second half, not surprisingly, saw Kieran Cooper emerge from the dressing rooms to replace Andy Lees and he had an immediate impact.

He created chances for Fitzsimmons and Collins before he should have equalised himself.

Cooper was put clean through by Koch but lacked his usual ruthlessness in front of goal and Duke turned the ball just wide of his post.

Grundy and Bartilomo were replaced and Tony Delange found the net for City a minute from time only to have the goal disallowed in a bizarre piece of refereeing from Bob Eedy.

Eedy failed to allow the advantage to be played following a foul on the edge of the area and called City back for the free-kick.

The kick sailed wide of the goal and Eedy was forced to leave the ground with the raucous and understandable abuse of the Spencer Park faithful still ringing in his ears.

Bannon continues addiction

After a three year sojourn with the Brisbane Strikers, Peter Bannon has returned to the Premier League this year as coach of the Beenleigh Lions. He freely admits that he is "addicted to the world game" and "couldn't not coach".

Bannon was born in Liverpool to working class parents in 1948. His father worked as a factory manager; his mother was a housewife.

He played some games for County football sides but mainly learnt his trade in local competitions which Bannon said were of similar quality to our own Premier League.

In 1976 the Bannon family migrated to Queensland after an "impulsive decision"

was made on a beach near Liverpool.

Bannon's foray into coaching was due to the urging's of well known Queensland soccer identity Brian McNicol, himself a native of Scotland, who managed to convince Bannon to try his hand at coaching the Kingsbridge under 15 side in 1978.

"They were a talented bunch of kids," Bannon said.

"In that first year, we won the league, the cup, and all the north side and south side competitions. It was quite a good start to my coaching career."

Bannon's credentials and reputation as a coach have steadily developed since those "early days".

He has coached numerous state champion Brisbane South junior representative sides, as well as Brisbane Croatia in Division Two and Premier League, and North Star in the Premier League.

But perhaps the crowning glory of his



coaching career to date, came when he was named assistant coach of the Brisbane Strikers in 1993.

"I was with the club for three years... It was a great learning experience to be involved with players of such high quality," he said.

Bannon said his mentor at the Strikers, Bruce Stowell, had been the biggest influence on his career.

"He (Bruce) improved my coaching

immensely as I did my level's one, two and three certificates under him," he said.

"I hold him in the greatest respect because he has a tremendous knowledge of the game and a great football brain.

"What I learnt under Bruce, I am trying to apply at Beenleigh."

The life of a coach can be very frustrating at times but it's not all doom and gloom according to Bannon.

"There is the other side, that is, to see players improve and know you've had some input into that improvement," he said.

"What we've all got to remember is that we're only human.

"Everyone makes mistakes and you only hope it's not in crucial parts of the park or at bad times of the match.

"At the end of the day, I get satisfaction from knowing that my input has made the difference in a game whether it be through a vital substitution or the rearranging of players."

Beenleigh take home points

Beenleigh bounced back from their home loss in Round 2 to Brisbane city, with a solid 2-0 victory against Bundaberg at Chris Green Park on Sunday.

A goal each by Troy Wickstein and Kieren Galloway in the first twenty minutes of the match sealed the three league points for the Lions.

The game was not a classic match-up characterised by end to end free flowing football but rather a "mixed bag" consisting of several highs and many lows.

Beenleigh coach Peter Bannon said: "The game was a bit of an odd one to be honest. We were our own worst enemies at times as we created a lot of opportunities but failed to capitalise on them."

"We were patchy in places but in saying that, we scored two terrific goals which were the result of some great lead up work by the lads which included six or so passes and then some great finishes.

"I'm always looking for improvement and I think we need to mainly work on ball retention and also our finishing... Also, our guys committed too many fouls in dangerous areas."

Indeed one such infringement lead to a penalty shot being awarded to Bundaberg with Beenleigh leading 1-0. However, star off season recruit Warren Allen failed to square the ledger with his shot finishing high and wide of the target.

Bannon said Bundaberg were tough opposition as the players fought for the 90 minutes.

"They're going to upset some sides this season and there's no doubt they'll improve as the season goes on. However, I'd imagine the constant travelling might be a problem as it can't be much fun," he said.

Bundaberg coach Aldo Baretta said he hoped the fortnightly trip to Brisbane would

become less of an issue as the season progressed.

"Hopefully we will adapt to it... We currently leave around 6am on match day and arrive around an hour before the youth game kicks off. This should provide time for players to loosen up and be ready for the main match," he said.

Baretta said he was very disappointed with the team's loss.

"I believe we probably should have won and I think a number of players are playing on reputation alone and not contributing enough," he said.

"We conceded two goals in the opening twenty minutes though we stuck to our tasks after that and battled reasonably well but it was always going to be tough.

"The fact that we tightened up and made a few chances after conceding the early goals was pleasing."

Baretta said the team had some improving to do if they were going to match Brisbane City on the weekend.

"Obviously conceding early goals is a problem. We need to focus on this," he said.

PREMIER PREVUE - Bundaberg v Bris City

There's sure to be a "must win at all costs" attitude at Thabeban Sports Complex on Saturday when Bundaberg Waves host Brisbane City at 7pm.

In the three Rounds played in the Premier League, Bundaberg has looked suspect away against Taringa and Beenleigh and accomplished at home against Coalstars.

It's difficult to gauge the effect a four to five hour bus trip has on a player but if early season form is to be used as the yardstick, it would appear teams are struggling with the journey. Bundaberg coach Aldo Baretta agrees to some degree.

"I hope the fortnightly trip down will become less of a problem as the season progresses," he said.

"We currently leave around 6am on match day and arrive around an hour before the youth game kicks off. This should provide time for players to loosen up and be ready for the main match.

"I think away results like the one at Beenleigh may come back to haunt us later in the year so it is vital we take maximum points at home."

Baretta said his side did not have any injury concerns for the match against the City although he expected to make a couple changes to the starting line-up.

"Obviously we're expecting stern opposition from the league leaders but we've planned a few surprises for them," he said.

By contrast, Brisbane City has had a dream start to the season accounting for Beenleigh, reigning premiers Brisbane Lions and competition favourites Rochedale Rovers.

City possess the best defence in the league

but appear to lack potency up front with all three of the team's Premier League goals coming from the boot of midfielder Dean Almond.

Perhaps the inclusion of a recognised striker in the form of the Brisbane Strikers Chris Slater, who was hurriedly signed earlier this week, will inject the firepower the team currently lacks.

PREMIER PREVUE - Wynnum v Beenleigh

Cowie said he had been impressed by the early form of opponents Beenleigh.


"They've done a good job but we'll approach this game with the same mental attitude as we would any other," he said.

PREMIER PREVUE - Bris Lions v Coalstars

Reigning premiers Brisbane Lions will want to add to their solitary league point on Sunday when they meet Coalstars at Lions Stadium at 2.45pm.

Lions finally broke their Premier League drought last week when they battled out a hard fought nil all draw against Taringa Rovers. Lions coach Miron Bleiberg was pleased and disappointed about the match result.

"Under normal circumstances I'd prefer the three points but I consider them a top team so it was not that bad... It was an even game and we had more chances, four to five, to one or two of theirs," he said.

"If we have 10 to 13 points at the end of Round 1, I will be happy. The top teams should have around 16 points."

Bleiberg said his midfield and attack were areas of concern that needed to be addressed.

"In our first game, our defence was good but our attack was lacking. In our second game, which was four-three, our defence was shocking but we scored three goals."

And on Lions chances of beating Coalstars, Bleiberg said: "We are better than them even though we lost one nil in pre season; this game has more pressure than last week as we must get the three points... There is no excuses."

Coalstars coach Paul Barry said: "We had a good result in pre season but gee it's going to be tough."

"They are quick and we need to negate them out wide. We need to shut down these players such as Di Losa and Meacock as they can cause a lot of trouble and we have to stop that."

Barry conceded the Stars had to work on releasing the ball quicker instead of holding onto it.

Lions Roy Huth will be instrumental in the Coalstars encounter this weekend



He also added he was very pleased with his team's performance of last week.

"The boys showed courage to come back from one goal down," he said.

"They didn't drop their heads, instead they played with a bit of desperation and played better," he concluded.

An elimination game between the QAS and NSW would decide who faced South Australia in the grand final.

After normal playing time the score remained unchanged at nil all, with the result decided by a penalty shoot out. Two important saves by Belinda Kitching ensured a 4-2 victory to the Queenslanders, who advanced to the final.

The victory against South Australia enabled the QAS side, most of whom are 21 or younger, an opportunity to stake a claim for the Australian national squad, who will tour the United States later this year.

Queensland's goals said: "This competition has been an eye opener, to see the improving standards from state to state, is very positive. It's provided a platform for young players to aspire to."

Dunne, who recently returned to the national squad after a lengthy injury spell was impressed with the young up and coming players.

"Most of our current National players didn't stand out as they normally would in club games. I think that's because the standard of play was so high, but it also highlighted youngsters like Amy Wilson and our own Alicia Ferguson as players of the future," Dunne said.

With the prospect of representing Australia at the Sydney 2000 Olympics, AWSA Chief Executive Officer Warren Fischer is hopeful that with continued corporate and government support, the league will be expanded next season to provide twice as many games.

This would produce the highest level of domestic competition, which can only benefit our young Queensland girls in their quest for Olympic glory.
