Waves pull draw at death

Bundaberg Waves and Brisbane City fought out a contentious one all draw at Thabeban Sports Complex last Saturday night.

Both teams failed to capitalise on numerous goal-scoring opportunities in front of a largely parochial 700 strong crowd.

City opened the scoring in the seventh minute when Strikers export Chris Slater provided a perfectly weighted cross which midfielder Barry Wilkinson neatly headed past Waves goalkeeper Michael Bainbridge.

The visitors had the better of the first half with Wilkinson, Slater and midfielder Cameron Pearce making life difficult for the Bundaberg defence.

Bundaberg's only real opportunity of the first period, came in the 30th minute when Warren Allen failed to convert a "one on one" with City goalkeeper Daniel Duke.

At the other end of the field, referee Derek Crawford controversially blew his whistle to signal the half-time break just as City midfielder Dean Almond had broken free of the Waves defence and was faced with Bainbridge to beat.

The controversy continued in the second half when City defender Mark Greer was dismissed in the 52nd minute after receiving a yellow card, his second of the night, for dissent.

Not long after, Crawford also dismissed City coach Bobby Hamilton from the bench for a similar offence.

The drama seemed to provide the catalyst for the Bundaberg players to increase their efforts.

Waves dominated the second half but a combination of brilliant goalkeeping from Duke and poor finishing from the Bundaberg players kept the game on track for what appeared to be a certain City victory.

Brisbane City's new signing, former Brisbane Striker Chris Slater had a solid first start against Bundaberg Waves last Saturday night



However, in the 89th minute, with City under siege from Bundaberg, Slater thumped the ball over the fence near the halfway line in an attempt to give his side some time to regroup.

Controversially, Crawford booked Slater for time wasting and from the ensuing play, Waves defender Tony Roebuck found himself unmarked in the box and coolly shot a low drive into the left hand corner of the goal.

City coach Bobby Hamilton said he was disappointed with the result, adding he thought the sending off of Mark Greer was the turning point in the match.

"Our first three games finished 1-0 and to be honest, I think we should have won this game 1-0," he said.

"We had to rearrange the team whereby we really had no option but to play with one man up front.

"It wasn't possible to add to our 1-0 lead and even though I don't like playing that way, we just had to try and hang in there and protect our lead."

Bundaberg coach Aldo Baretta was pleased by the commitment shown by his players.

"I thought we played well and in the end, Brisbane City were lucky to get away with a draw," Baretta said.

Ogden - soccer is in the blood

John Ogden was born in Rochdale, Manchester, north of London in 1959. He came from a traditional working class background where his father was a mechanic, his mother a housewife.

As a youngster, Ogden travelled with his family to watch local first division club side Burnley play and John is the first to admit that other sports didn't stand a chance because the world game was "in my blood from the outset".

The Ogdens migrated to Australia when John was aged 11 years and he soon began what would inevitably be a 26 year association with the game in this state.

He played for Ipswich side St Helens before joining Brisbane Lions at the age of 15. When the Philips League began in 1977, Ogden was part of Lions squad and between 1977 and 1987, John played 200 national league games.

Ogden recalled that some of his more memorable moments in the game occurred during his stint with Lions.

"In the national league at that time, we got to play against a lot of overseas guest players including George Best, Alan Sunderland and Bob Latchford. It was great experience," he said.

Ogden left Lions at the end of the 1988 season and joined cross town rivals Coalstars from 1990 to 1992. It was here that Ogden got his first taste of the perils of coaching.

"When I joined Coalstars, Mark Brusasco was the coach but he resigned soon after as the team was not travelling all that well in the early part of the season... I took over for a couple of seasons, before I left to play for Taringa," he said.

"I played for four years under Juan (Cutillas) and I believe Taringa really came of age with a



League win, a Queensland Cup victory and two grand final appearances in four years."

Ogden said the transition from player to coach was a natural progression for someone who wanted to remain in contact with the game.

"I couldn't stand not being involved in the game and I so

it as an opportunity to put something back into the club," he said.

"It's certainly a challenge to make players better, work harder and be more disciplined... Some of them don't understand how hard you have to work to make it."

Like most football coaches across the world, particularly those who have played the game at a reasonable level, John has come to dismiss the frustration's of coaching.

"You just have to hope that what you do through the week will be enough to get you through the match on the weekend," he said.

"You have to rely on your judgement on who to and who not to play, but at the end of the day it's up to the players to perform."

Ogden said one of his primary coaching goals was to develop a side that played attractive football.

"I believe we must try to play attractive football because we are entertainers and therefore, we must entertain," he said.

"Without spectators, the game is nothing and in order to get the spectators back to the games, we have to produce some exciting football."

Lions notch up their first win

Reigning premiers Brisbane Lions finally produced their first win of the season with a less than convincing 2-0 win over a disappointing Coalstars outfit on Sunday.

Neither side offered much in the opening twenty minutes, the only incident of note when a cross from Lions striker Greg Di Losa appeared to be handled in the area by a Coalstars defender but referee Bob Eedy allowed play to continue.

However, both teams turned the pace up a notch midway through the half and Marcello Cuba gave Lions keeper Rob Farrow a heart flutter when his 25 yard chip drifted just over the bar.

But a minute later it was the home side who troubled the scoreboard attendant when they finally broke a drought which had seen them score in only one other match this season.

Di Losa seemed to find space in the area only to be closed down before he could shoot but the rebound fell invitingly for Steve Jackson who curled a superb left foot strike into the top corner for a 1-0 lead.

The goal seemed to signal a return to somewhere near the form which took Lions to the double last season as they completely dominated their local rivals for the remainder of the half.

They might have added a second when Roy Huth fired a fifty yard diagonal ball to the far post for Cliff Tuck to head down perfectly only for Di Losa to drag his shot wide.

Tuck was again involved shortly after when he ran on to a well disguised Jackson throughball and cut it back for the unmarked Robbie Pudja (pictured). The young midfielder should have given his team a 2-0 half-time lead but inexplicably sliced wide from five yards.

In the second half Lions failed to deliver



the knockout punch which should have killed off the match but rather seemed determined to gift Coalstars an equaliser.

A free kick from Coalstars skipper Andrew King very nearly did put the visitors back on level terms when it went straight through the wall but was cleared off the line by Huth.

Lions inability to deliver the knockout punch resulted in a spate of activity from the bench with coach Miron Bleiberg bringing on strikers Jason Poggi and Kevin Meacock to try and put the match beyond Coalstars reach.

But Bleiberg need not have feared for the points against a Coalstars team who showed little if any urgency at 1-0 down.

The match fizzled out in the last 15 minutes with Coalstars unable to string more than a couple of passes together and Lions evidently content with a 1-0 result.

The home team finally added a second goal two minutes into injury time when a long clearance from Martin Matula allowed Poggi to race clear of the defence and fire a low drive past Coalstars keeper Michael Cassidy.

PREMIER PREVUE - Bundaberg v Wynnum

Wynnum will be desperate to gain their first points of the season when they meet **Bundaberg Waves at Thabeban Sports** Complex on Saturday at 7pm.

The Wolves, after strong performances against Taringa Rovers and Coalstars in Rounds 2 and 3 respectively, were soundly beaten by Beenleigh 4-1 last Sunday.

The team lead 1-0 at half-time but were swamped by a hungry Lions outfit thanks to goals from Troy Wickstein (2), Fotis Skordou and Brett Druery.

Wynnum's woes are definitely not through lack of trying. Coach George Cowie has commented that players are consistently maintaining high levels of intensity and effort during training and on the pitch.

And as for Cowie's coaching ability, his credentials are impressive and there is no doubt he has brought a wealth of experience and knowledge to the club.

However, the Wolves appear to be in need of a quality striker as the team lacks potency in the attacking third of the field.

Even though Bundaberg has struggled in its two matches away this season, players seem to grow an extra leg when playing at home in front of their parochial supporters.

The team's draw against league leaders Brisbane City last week emphasised the difficulty that Brisbane clubs face when travelling to Bundaberg. It is a long trip from Brisbane and Bundaberg are sure to savage some of the more fancied teams in the XXXX Premier League.

Bundaberg coach Aldo Baretta said he was pleased with last week's result but thought people had not yet seen his side play to its potential.

Trevor Maltby scored Wynnum's only goal last weekend and will be hoping to add to his tally



"We are competing not too badly but I think we can play better as a unit and in two to three games. I think you'll see the best from the guys,' he said.

"We just need to get a little more consistency into our game and ensure we maintain a high intensity for the full 90 minutes."


