City rampage continues

Bob Hamilton's Brisbane City outfit has stormed to the top of the XXXX League table following another big victory.

City shares the lead with Brisbane Lions, with Sunday's 4-0 win over Ipswich guiding them to the top spot on goal differences.

But despite the 4-0 victory things did not begin all that well for the home side. Danny Wright left the field after just five minutes, following a nasty clash with Pat Boyle which resulted in the former National League player needing 20 stitches to the head.

The Knights had several clear chances in the first half, mainly from breakaway situations, and were a little unlucky not to score on occasion.

But it was the home side which opened the scoring, a Damian Waugh header finding the back of the net just before the break.

City piled on the pressure early in the second stanza, but it was not until midway in the period when Slater broke through.

He hit the target again soon afterwards, rising high to head in a corner at the near post.

Damian Waugh put the icing on the cake with his second of the match in the dying stages, to give City a 4-0 win for the second week running.

Meanwhile the Gold Coast were narrow 2-1 losers to Rochedale at Underwood Park.

The visitors stunned the Rovers in the opening minute when Brett Adams beat the defence only to be pulled down in a dubious Alun Evans tackle inside the area.

Referee Gary Brownlie saw nothing wrong with the challenge, but that did not deter the Coast side, which continued to pepper the Rovers goal.

But Rochedale clawed their way back into the game and broke the deadlock in the 40th minute, when Glenn Kolpak finished the good lead up work of David Pilic and Michael Legg.

Ten minutes into the second half the home side extended its lead, when Troy Wickstein fired a perfect volley from the edge of the box. The Coast pulled one back just three minutes later through Trevor Elliott, but it was not enough.. the Rovers ending their winning run.

At Richlands, Brisbane Lions had to work hard, after Bundaberg's Stephen Mack scored in the eighth second of the match.

That was to be the visitors last joy however, goals to Anthony Brown, Marc Flemington and the youthful Frank Mengotti giving the home side a 3-1 victory.

Mount Gravatt pulled off the surprise result of the round with a 1-1 draw at Taringa.

The Rovers struck first when Clinton McDermott nailed a perfect free-kick, but the visitors did not let up and poached the equaliser midway through the second half, when Collin Bethall slammed home from close range.

In the other XXXX League match, Wynnum held off a rampant Beenleigh to take the honours 2-1 and keep the boys from down south at the southern end of the table.

Crawford blows the whistle

Queensland's number one referee for five consecutive years has swapped his whistle for a blackboard. Derek Crawford will not be running around in his familiar black and white adjudicator's strip this season. Instead you are more likely to see him bellowing out instructions to Inala's top side in the Semi-pro South competition.

Winner of the prestigious XXXX League Referee of the Year Award from 1992 through to 1996, Crawford's absence from the state's refereeing ranks is a notable one.

Crawford was the last of a dying breed of referees, who worked hard to establish a rapport with players, coaches and spectators alike. It was a rapport that went far beyond the field of play, but was still evident when he was the man in the middle. So why did he give the game away?

"There was too much politics involved with the organisation for my liking," Crawford said.

"Things were going on with the referees associations that just didn't sit well with me, so I made a conscious decision to get out."

Crawford cited *Soccer Australia Referees* underlying youth policy and a FIFA edict to totally clean the game up, as his major concerns.

"Don't get me wrong I'm all for young referees getting a go, but you just can't replace experience with youth... you need a balance," Crawford said.

"That's bringing about a drop in the standard of both refereeing and the game in general."

Crawford named several of the state's more respected referees, including Bob Eedy, Ted Kearney and Barry Power, who had been replaced on the XXXX League's number one panel by comparatively inexperienced refs.

"It used to take up to five years to get to 'Class One', but now it's taking some of these younger refs just a fraction of that time," Crawford said.

A referee who was renowned for letting the





game progress and allowing a few hard tackles, Crawford also believes FIFA's new edict to clean up the game totally, could be detrimental for the long term survival of the code.

"We don't have the same hard football as we used to have because players are too concerned about being booked," he said.

"And that's taken away a lot of the game's natural appeal. I'm not suggesting we let foul play go, but I do believe there are far too many bookings handed out for minor offences these days."

After officiating in some capacity at four International matches, Crawford admits his decision to leave the refereeing ranks was a tough one.

However he remains adamant he will not make a return to the 'whistle blowers' so long as the current trends continue.

"If I went back now I'd be a hypocrite," Crawford said. "I'd just be going back to the same old thing again.

"And besides, I'm enjoying the coaching side of the game at the moment.. although some of these refs can really test you patience," Crawford said with a laugh.

PREMIER PREVIEW - BEENLEIGH V TARINGA ROVERS

The game between Beenleigh and Taringa Rovers might prove to be the match of the round as both teams look to get some form on the board when they clash at Chris Green Park on Friday evening.

Beenleigh are yet to win a match this season which is a little surprising given the club's offseason recruiting efforts.

Brad Ditton and Danny Stowers, ironically former Taringa players and former Wollongong player Steven Forshaw have brought some real class to the Beenleigh outfit.

Coach Phil Kerr said his team would have to limit the "silly mistakes" if they were to have any chance of taking the points from Taringa.

"In the game last week (against Wynnum), we were made to pay for some very basic mistakes," he said.

"It was a bit of a shame as apart from a couple of lapses, I was quite pleased with the way the lads put it together, and thought we dominated the second half.

"This week's game against Taringa is going to be a tough match as they are a good, young, quick side.

"We'll need to tighten up in defence and try to limit the mistakes in areas that are going to hurt us."

Taringa coach John Ogden said he was a little disappointed with Rovers 1-1 draw with Mt Gravatt last week and would be hoping for a better effort in this match.

"I don't think we played very well at all," he said. "We certainly tried hard, but it was an average game and in the end, a draw was a fair result.

"Mt Gravatt play some good football and are a difficult team to play ... they deserved to get a point from the match."

Taringa's youth policy has again been the side's achilles heel in season '98, and while Ogden recognises the difficulties associated with coaching a young squad, he is pleased with the way the players are developing individually and as a unit.

Bundaberg Waves coach Aldo Baretta said his side would be on a mission for points when they host the Wynnum Wolves on Saturday evening.

After three rounds, Bundaberg are languishing in last place on the league ladder, playing three matches for three losses.

However, Baretta said despite last week's 3-1 loss to Brisbane Lions, he was pleased with Waves performance as there was much improvement from the previous game.

"The guys put in quite a good effort last week and I was particularly pleased with their attitude and commitment," he said.

"To be honest, I thought we had the better of the first half as our midfield dominated and we created a lot of chances.

"Unfortunately, we missed a few good opportunities and it was really only a couple of lapses in defence that cost us the match."

Baretta is confident Waves can equal the score this weekend, but is weary of a Wolves outfit that enjoyed its first win of the season last outing.


"They're a quality side as they always give us lots of headaches," Baretta said.

League giants Brisbane Lions possibly face their toughest opponents to date when they travel to Glennon Park, Nerang, to play the Gold Coast on Sunday.

Lions currently sit on top of the Premier League points table, equal with reigning champions Brisbane City.

Last week. Lions fought off a spirited Bundaberg Waves team, with a 3-1 win, but more importantly, secured the three vital competition points.

Anthony Brown, Marc Flemington and veteran Frank Mengotti all got goals for Lions. but it was midfielder Cameron Watson that once again impressed for the orange and blues.

Last week, the City players experienced their first low-point of the season when they lost 2-1 to Rochedale Rovers.


However, they were perhaps a little unlucky to lose that match as they created a lot of opportunities early in the game, but unfortunately were unable to convert.

Hamilton said he was quite interested by the match against Mt Gravatt and believed the home side would prove a difficult opponent.


"They're certainly no easy beats as their recent games against Taringa and Lions prove," he said.

PREMIER PREVIEW - Ipswich v Rochedale Rovers

A down trodden Ipswich Knights outfit is set to host a fired up Rochedale Rovers unit at Eric Evans Reserve on Sunday.

After being humiliated 4-0 by Brisbane City in Round 2, Rovers got back on track last week with a hard-fought 2-1 home victory against the Gold Coast.

And while coach Peter Bannon admits it was not one of his side's vintage performances, he believed it was a step in the right direction.

"The game was certainly an improved effort from the week before against City," he said.

"The players put into practice what we had been working on all week at training.

"I was particularly pleased with the attitude and commitment exhibited by them."

Bannon said he was expecting a tough match against the Knights, but felt the greatest opposition might come from the elements.

"It's hard enough running around the park for 90 minutes, let alone doing it in 35 degree heat." he said.

"However, that aside, I watched Ipswich play City last week and to be honest, I thought they were in the match for a long time and unlucky not to go a goal up at one stage.

"They play with a lot of passion and commitment, and you never expect to get too much for nothing up there (Ipswich) as points always have to be earned."

Ipswich coach Mike Mulvey said his side had learned a few lessons from last week, the main one being the need to concentrate for a full 90 minutes.

"We've done okay this year but we've got about six guys who played first division last season and they have to learn that they can't afford to lapse at any stage of the game," he said.

"The game against Rochedale is a crucial match for us... we need to regain confidence quickly.

"We've conceded eight goals this season and we must make sure we get something from this match."

"We've got loads of young talent at the club but we're always on the lookout for more.

"In saying that however, it would be nice to have a couple of very experienced players on the park in some of the key positions.

"I would like to pick up an experienced[centre half for instance and a striker who's also been around the traps for a while, just to help the younger lads learn some more of the subtleties of the game.

"But I guess that's every coach's desire."


"They're very much an unknown quantity and for that reason we won't be taking them lightly," the Albany Creek coach said.

Inala's commitment in grave doubt

The good players learn to accept it and actually enjoy it. Of course, it can have the reverse effect. Certain players become fired up and play better.

The art of exposing an opposition's physical weakness is something coaches spend hours ploughing over in the week before the game.

That's why I was shocked to hear this week of attempts by club's to expose a perceived lack of pace in Brisbane City sweeper Mark Bennett.

Now Benny would be the first to admit he's no General Nediym when it comes to footspeed.

At Taringa last year, players were encouraged to run at Benny. More often than not he won the battle and was more than willing to let us know about it after the game.
