City eyeing Championship

Brisbane City continued their relentless march towards the Premiership on the weekend, taking maximum points in the match against the Bundaberg Waves.

Nil-all at the break, City went on a goal spree in the second half with Damian Waugh, Warren Cooley and captain Chris Slater all making it onto the scorer's sheet.

The win places City on 38 points, eight clear of closest rival Taringa Rovers and coach Bobby Hamilton believes the reigning champions have turned the corner after enduring indifferent form.

"When it was nil-all at half time, I got the lads into the room and we spoke about a few things that weren't coming together," he said.

"We didn't panic, didn't change our game plan and never lost our shape in the second period which was very pleasing to me.

"Once Damian Waugh got his goal, which was of a very high standard, I thought that we were in control of the match."

Over the next month, City play the Gold Coast, Lions, Wynnum, Taringa and Rochedale.

The old adage that "it ain't over 'til it's over" is very true, but if City can secure good points from those games, opposing teams will find them difficult to catch in the premiership race.

Rochedale Rovers scored the other big win of the weekend, defeating Mt Gravatt 4-1 at Underwood Park.

Steve Fitzsimmons, Esala Masi, Clayton Koch and Matt Olley scored for Rovers, while

Nathan Carloss netted Mt Gravatt's only goal.

Rochedale coach Peter Bannon said he was pleased with the result, although reports from the match have indicated that the final score was perhaps a little flattering to the home side.

But a win is a win, and after experiencing a slight form slump earlier in the season, Rochedale appear to be back on track and threatening for a finals spot.

Up at Eric Evans Reserve, Ipswich defeated Beenleigh 2-0. One-nil at half time thanks to a Peter Vogler goal, Peter McKendrick secured the three points for the Knights.

Ipswich coach Mike Mulvey said while the match might not have proved the greatest spectacle, he was pleased with the final result.

"We did enough to win on the day... conditions were not great, but we created some chances and put two away," he said.

Wynnum caused the upset of the round, beating Brisbane Lions 2-0 at Carmichael Park on Monday. Matt Campion and Ben Wood scored for the Wolves, who leap-frogged Bundaberg on the table.

In the final match of the round, Taringa outlasted the Gold Coast to win 2-1.

Martin Matula scored for Taringa, but the Coast's Steven Steffannuto equalised to ensure the teams went into half-time locked at 1-1.

And just when the game looked certain to end in a draw, Des Hughes sealed the match for Rovers when he converted a free-kick.

This week's match against Lions starts a tough month for the lads from Jack Speare Park.


In the next four rounds, Taringa face Wynnum at home, Rochedale away, City at home and the Knights at Eric Evans Reserve.

PREMIER PREVIEW - Bundaberg v Ipswich Knights

The Bundaberg Waves are in desperate need of league points when they host the Ipswich Knights at Thabeban Sports Complex on Saturday evening.

League leaders Brisbane City soundly beat Waves 3-0 last weekend and with 12 rounds remaining, Bundaberg must start winning if they are to be any chance of making the finals.

Coach Aldo Baretta said on current form. he believes City and Taringa would continue taking points from most teams in the competition, leaving two finals spots open.

However, Baretta said crucial injuries to key players had savaged the club's playing stocks and forced a re-think of team tactics.

"Against Lions a few weeks ago, we proved when we beat them 3-1 that we could match it with the top teams," he said.

"It makes it very tough however, when so many of your top-line players are sitting on the sidelines.'

Waves bad luck continued last weekend when Altan Ramadan joined fellow New Zealand import Jimmy Cudd on the injured list after sustaining cartilage damage in his knee.

Tony Roebuck and Craig Hawkins are still sidelined with ankle injuries and it is unknown if Paul Fagan will come back from a serious knee complaint.

Baretta said it had been extremely frustrating not being able to play the club's best eleven at one time.

"With so many people injured, we have been forced to look only one game ahead," Baretta said.

"That does not mean that we're going to lay down against the Knights and dwell on our misfortune.

"We will definitely be giving the game our best shot and looking for three points at home."

Ipswich's confidence will be up after a 2-0 win against Beenleigh last weekend.

The win has kept the Knights in touch with the league's "big guns", just three points in arrears of 4th placed Rochedale.

PREMIER PREVIEW - BEENLEIGH V MT GRAVATT

Beenleigh will be looking to make a move off the bottom of the table when they host Mt Gravatt at Chris Green Park on Saturday.

"We've got ten players out at the moment through injury and suspension and last week, we struggled to put two teams out on the field.


"However, we've managed to produce some sound performances in recent weeks against the likes of Taringa, Lions and Ipswich, with the game against City, our only poor performance.

PREMIER PREVIEW - WYNNUM DIST V ROCHEDALE ROVERS

Rochedale Rovers travel west this weekend for a predicably tough match against the Wynnum Wolves at Carmichael Park.

"City seems to have got the jump on everyone so it's important that we try to keep in touch and the best way we can do that is by getting a win and securing the three points."

PREMIER PREVIEW - Gold COAST V BRISDANE CITY

The Gold Coast have the odds stacked firmly against them when they host league leaders Brisbane City this weekend.

"We had a chat during the week and we're aware that over the next five weeks, we've got three matches away," he said.


"We believe that if we can get through those games and gain some points, we'll be difficult to catch in the race for the title.

The notion that our referees are a protected species is certainly a myth, try asking the referees themselves and they will assent to my comments in fact quite a number would question why our standards are so high.

It is disappointing that authors of your magazine do not research the material before going to print. In this day and age I would have thought "fair play" would have been required. Again I must state that this is the first time in my association as Secretary (1978) that I have put pen to paper in response to an attack on my members

In closing I would ask that anyone reading your great paper and want to find out about maintaining their involvement in the game might consider becoming a "BLACK AND WHITE" by writing or phoning me. We would certainly welcome anyone who is interested.

New signing boosts Thistle

The signing of dynamic wide midfielder Sergio Pinto has boosted Grange Thistle hopes of staying off the bottom of the ladder for the remainder of the season.

Despite Pinto's arrival to the club however, Grange could not topple the struggling Mitchelton side last Sunday.

After leading the game 1-0, Thistle's Aaron Aldridge was sent fom the field five minutes into the second half. And Higgins believes the send-off cost his side dearly.

"It was extremely disappointing. The boys went into defensive mode after that and you just can't do that for 35 to 40 minutes of a game," the Thistle coach said.



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

World Cup takes toll on sbane Semi-Pro ranks


The world's premier sporting event has begun, with the 32 top soccer nations battling for World Cup supremecy.

New attitude prevails at Redlands

Speaking of coaches, Frank Farina's decision to leave the Brisbane Strikers and set up shop at Marconi has thrown the cat amongst the pigeons.



Both are former national league players, have good coaching records and a working knowledge of the local competition.


Whether they'll have the cattle to work with to get the results is another question.
