

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## Here we go again

The Brisbane Strikers open their Ericsson Cup campaign tonight against Sydney glamour side Marconi Fairfield.

Under new coach John Kosmina, the Strikers will be looking to dramatically improve on last season's poor showing.

The mid season loss of Troy Cranney to the Northern Spirit and Frank Farina to ironically tonight's opponents Marconi were big blows for the side, but the acquisition of a coach of Kosmina's stature was a boost for the club.

Add to this a couple of young new faces in the side and the return of Reece Tollenaere from a stint with the Newcastle Breakers, and the squad seems to possess good balance on paper.

Perennial defender Glenn Gwynne will lead the side tonight for the first time as the team's nominated season captain.

It is a well-deserved honour for Gwynne who has been one of the consistent performers for the Strikers in recent years.

Gwynne was also named along with fellow Strikers player Kasey Wehrman in the Socceroos squad that took part in the Nations Cup tournament in Brisbane recently.

Wehrman has come back remarkably well from a broken ankle sustained 16 months ago.

Although he still has a pronounced limp when he walks, Kasey has shown enough in trial games and representative matches to indicate that it will not be long before he is back to his best and full fitness.

As mentioned earlier, Suncorp welcomes back former favourite son Frank Farina tonight as he embarks on a new chapter in his coaching career with Marconi Fairfield.

Farina was a star player for the Sydney glamour club back in the 1980's before he made his move to European football.

And while confident of a strong showing against his former club, Farina said he had not been looking forward to the road trip north.

"With the exception of last season, Marconi has not had a good success rate in Brisbane," Faring said.

"It's something that we are aware of and will be looking to improve on.

"To be honest though, I know that most teams do not like coming to Brisbane and find the going fairly tough."

Marconi have a number of players that the Strikers will need to pay attention to in order to gain maximum points from the game.

Francis Awaritefe and Kris Trananovski are two of the game's most devastating sharp shooters, while Dominc Longo and Mark Babic are well credentialled in defence.



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### A speech by Mrs Del Townsend

The following is the speech made by the Chairman of the Clem Jones Group, Mrs Del Townsend, at the 1998 Clem Jones Gold Medal dinner

"Mr President and Mrs Dann, Mr & Mrs Cawley, Mr & Mrs Brusasco, distinguished guests all.

First let me join our President in welcoming you all on behalf of the Clem Jones Group of Companies.

This evening marks the presentation of another Clem Jones Gold Medal to another outstanding Soccer Player and once again I want to talk about the importance of Soccer in the Community.

However, before I do, I want to touch briefly on the vexatious problem of sponsorship and the relationship between sporting bodies and their sponsors.

As Chairman of the Clem Jones Group which sponsors a number of sporting and community activities, I have become very conscious of the fact that while sporting bodies talk about how hard it is to get the sponsorship dollar, in many instances they make it hard for themselves.

As sport becomes more and more important in the community, it seems that many sporting body's are becoming more and more arrogant and taking the view that sponsorship is a 'privilege' which THEY extend

True it is that sponsorship is an industry.

Sponsors gain enormously from the publicity which comes from their support of sport, and the benefits are growing, but as they do, sponsorship becomes more and more a business exercise and less and less by sentiment and love of the game.

The Federation provides great competition and the Gold Medal symbolises the service Soccer Administration gives to its players and the presentation of this Medal, as I said last year, is a tribute to the Federation and to people like Wallace Dann, Alan Vessey and Ian Brusasco.

It is also a tribute to the players. Without them there would be no sport and we would not be here tonight.

The importance of sport, therefore of Soccer, in our community, cannot be overemphasised.

Social problems are ever increasing.

Clem Jones has said so often.... the most

important thing we have to do in our society is find things for young people to do in their leisure time.

If we want them to conform to our social standards, we must provide a way of life that will make those standards worth accepting and idleness is the first step to non-acceptance.

Tonight we are all here to enjoy ourselves, but the seriousness of these problems cannot be hidden under the carpet and tonight therefore I would like to say on behalf of the Clem Jones Group, thank you to all of you who have played a part in providing the facilities and the conduct, for the playing of the great game of Soccer.

And thank you for providing the benefits which flow from it.

Congratulations to all the teams and players who have succeeded in the competition this year, but most of all, congratulations to all of you for your participation.

There is even more need today for sporting body's to recognise that if they want to get the sponsorship they 'deserve', they must give the return for the sponsorship, that the sponsor deserves.

Soccer has always had a hard sponsorship road to hoe and it not going to get any easier because Soccer is very much a parochial game.

There seems to be a great deal of insularity in the clubs and so here tonight I want to say as a sponsor, indeed I think representing Queensland's biggest Soccer sponsor, (not including of course, the contribution the Queensland Government).... thank you Ms Pensko - Dunn.

I want to say that if the sport wants to get the support it deserves as the number one sport in the world.... to get the support it deserves in Queensland.... the clubs and Federation and the Strikers must become imbued with a single combined desire to get out there in the market place.... offer something worthwhile in return for the sponsorship and the publicity which is out there in this country — the same as it is in the rest of the world.

It is up to all of you people here to do something about getting together.

Now quickly back to Soccer and this relates to what I have just said....

Soccer has an enormous number of young players in the field.

It is a major player in our society."

The duo pull the City strings and are the driving force behind creating chances for dangerous front man Chris Slater.

City qualified for the final with a solid 4-2 win over North Queensland at the weekend.






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

Then the national side turns around and loses to New Zealand at the weekend. So Australian soccer goes on waiting for that big group one win.


