Editorial

The 2000 Premier League season might be only two weeks old but there are already some surprising ladder developments.

While the table means nothing this early in the year, clubs cannot afford to fall too far behind the leaders this year as they don't have the comfort of a semi-final series.

With the team finishing first on the ladder this year being recognised as the League's best, and rightly so in many people's opinions, the first half of the season is likely to determine which clubs can start planning for 2001 by May.

The team that has surprised the most after two matches is Ipswich, which leads the league on goal difference thanks to two victories, and a for and against record of eight goals scored and only one conceded.

The addition of Richard Hilli and Jason Lucas to a Knights squad already containing experienced campaigners including captain Peter McKendrick and Peter Hinks will make the Frank Pimblett-coached side difficult to beat all season, particularly at Eric Evans Reserve.

Another surprise is the patchy form of glamour club Brisbane Lions. Much is expected of the cashed-up club with National League aspirations, particularly with new coach John Ogden bringing 10 players over with him from Taringa.

It's still early days and there's no doubt Lions have the talent, but Ogden may yet regret showing the door to several of last year's squad, particularly Darren Hillier, Roy Huth, Stephen Starr and Vedran Becirbegovic.

Starr and Becirbegovic are now part of a Brisbane City side that already looks to be the team to beat in 2000. City's 1999 grand final opponents Gold Coast are struggling at the bottom of table without a point after two matches, and while that may raise the eyebrows of several pundits, it was always going to be a tough season for last year's surprise packets.

Losing players such as 1999 QSF gold medallist Eddie Lees, Peter Dwyer, Peter Grierson, Shane Smeltz, Shane Stefanutto and Mark Bennett would hurt any club.

Knights to the fore in round 2

The Ipswich Knights charged to the top of the Premier League table on goal difference with a 5-0 thumping of Mount Gravatt at Eric Evans Reserve.

The Knights are one of only two teams with maximum points after two rounds. Joining them on six points are Brisbane City, who defeated arch-rivals Brisbane Lions 2-0 at Spencer Park on Sunday.

In fact, wins were the order of the round. with Rochedale, Wynnum and Bundaberg recording maiden season victories.

At Bundamba on Saturday evening, the Knights, through goals from Trent Griffiths and Richard Hilli went 2-0 up within 15 minutes and were never headed.

Wayne Adams added a third just before halftime. The goal-scoring feast continued after the break with Hilli, on his return home after spending two seasons at Taringa, grabbing his second and Tim Reece finding the net seconds after coming on.

Knights coach Frank Pimblett was elated with the five goals, but said he was happier about his side's defence which has only conceded one goal in two games.

Brisbane City coach Danny Wright was equally as pleased after his side put two past the much-talked about Lions' combination.

Second-half goals to Pablo Aviles and Chris Slater sealed the three points for City, who could even afford the luxury of a missed penalty from former Lions player Vedran Becirbegovic.

Wright said he told his players at half-time to ensure the game was not decided by a "toss of a coin" incident in the dying minutes.

"When we play Lions it's always going to be a battle. It was also hot and ground was a bit bumpy," he said.

"I told the boys at the break to keep battling on and play to their potential.

"We put together two well-constructed moves that led to goals and we could have scored more."

Lions coach John Ogden said there was no panic in the camp, despite having only one point after two matches.

"It's always going to be hard at the start of the season. There's no easy games," he said.

At Jack Speare Park on Saturday night, visiting Rochedale thrashed Taringa 4-0, with goalscorers including Matt Olley (two penalties) and Clayton Koch.

Rochedale coach Peter Bannon said his side was more disciplined than in the previous week's 3-1 loss to Ipswich.

"It was a good performance and a good result," he said.

The Gold Coast suffered a second successive home defeat, losing 3-1 to Wynnum on Saturday night.

Owen Filewood, Stuart Popplewell and Mark Alaru each scored for the visitors, with Rochedale acquisition Steve Fitzsimmons scoring for the Coast.

Wynnum coach Peter Tokesi said the result had made him happy after/the disappointment of drawing with Bundaberg the previous week.

"It's always hard to win down there (the Coast). We also should have won in Bundy," he said.

Gold Coast coach Ken Lindsay said his side conceded a couple of goals it shouldn't have.

"We have to improve," he said.

Bundaberg grabbed a valuable away win in Toowoomba on Sunday, defeating the Raiders 2-0 thanks to goals from Brett Kitching and Nick

Waves' coach Tony Warmsley said his side did not arrive home until 1am on Monday but claimed the long bus trip was worth it after the

"We've made a very encouraging start to the season," he said.

Raiders coach John Garside conceded his team was "pretty awful".

"We had 11 players who didn't put a foot right," he said.

PREMIER PREVIEW - Rochedale Rov v Bris City

Despite his team's perfect start to the season, Brisbane City coach Danny Wright says Rochedale will start as favourites when the two clubs meet at Underwood Park on Friday night.

Wright said the facts that Rochedale had an extra day to prepare for the match and that City played Lions in stifling heat on Sunday would advantage the home side.

"We're the underdogs, but we like that," he said

Wright was elated with City's season record of two wins from as many matches, saying the success had to do with the club being much more united than in past years.

"We have 20 or so guys in the squad who get on well with each other off and on the park. That's pretty unusual at any level.

"The players have changed their attitude from in the past and we are getting results. That makes my job easier.

"Previously the guys had been going through the motions week in and week out. They just did what they had to do to win.


"The Strikers have shown this year there's the opportunity to play at the next level and my players have the ability to step up."

Gold Coast coach Ken Lindsay, while admitting the trip and venue were tough, said his side had no other choice but to perform.

"We've been disgraceful. We have to improve," he said.

"We've got to take a good attitude into the match. We have to be positive.

"Our new players are still struggling to make their mark."

Bundaberg coach Tony Warmsley wants to make the Thabeban Sports Complex as daunting as possible for visiting teams.

"It's a long time since we've been beaten here and we want that trend to continue," he said.

They might have to learn quickly against a rampant Knights side that includes Richard Hilli, who returned to Ipswich this season after two years at Taringa.



PREMIER PREVIEW - Bris Lions v Wynnum Wolves

After a disappointing start to the season, Brisbane Lions need to defeat Wynnum on Sunday at Richlands to maintain a respectable distance behind the Premier League's leading pack.

The rich club has only one point from two games, but will still go in as favourites against a Wolves side in third place with four points.

Lions coach John Ogden said the Wolves were always difficult opponents.

"They'll be determined to come here for a good result," he said.

But Ogden has faith that his players can make amends for the 2-0 defeat Lions suffered at Spencer Park last Sunday.

"We haven't hit any kind of form yet. We are a bit below what I expected but I believe the players will improve as the season goes on."

Wolves coach Peter Tokesi said Lions would be hard to beat at home.

"They've got some good players in their squad," he said.

But Tokesi was confident the Wolves could build on their 3-1 win over the Gold Coast last Saturday night.

"We wanted six points from our first two games, but at least we've picked up four."

"It's a lot better than last year when we lost our first four games."







How they finished in round 1

Brisbane City opened the 2000 Premier League season in style, travelling to Palm Beach to thrash the Gold Coast 4-1 in a replay of last year's grand final.

A Chris Slater double, a goal from Nathan Carloss and a Cliff Tuck penalty ensured City would take the three points back to Newmarket. A Colin Bethall goal saved some face for the home side.

Gold Coast coach Ken Lindsay said his side was "well beaten".

"We gave away a couple of silly goals," he said.

In the round's only other match that produced a victory, Ipswich surprised many pundits by defeating 1999 premiers Rochedale 3-1 at Underwood Park.

While the Knights played solidly enough to win, they could thank Rovers goalkeeper Graham Ross for a helping hand.

Ross should take part of the blame for each of the Knights goals. The first was a curling Wayne Adams free-kick from 25 yards out that he failed to get a glove on.

Steven Hughes scored the visitors second when Ross failed to come for a through ball.

Just as Rochedale appeared to be coming back into the match after Paul Grugan reduced the deficit to one goal, Ross grabbed nothing but air coming for a corner, leaving Peter Hinks with a free header.

Despite the loss, Rochedale coach Peter Bannon said his side performed "reasonably".

"We played a fair bit better than Ipswich. I counted that we had 26 to 27 chances as compared with their six," he said.

All of the round's other matches were drawn, with Brisbane Lions and Taringa finishing 1-all at Richlands, Mount Gravatt drawing 1-all with Toowoomba at Dittmer Park after Hawks' player Calvin Gnech missed a penalty, and Bundaberg sharing the spoils at home with Wynnum after a 2-all encounter.

Wynnum's Brendan Travers-Jones netted a double, with Peter Bock and Rodney Cooper replying for the Waves.

New signing Craig Collins scored for Taringa at Richlands, with Sasa Radulovic scoring for the home side.

Nimble striker Brendan Seipel grabbed Mt Gravatt's only goal, with Toowoomba's Colin Hackwood getting on the scoresheet for the visitors.

Semi Pros & Cons - North

North Pine has been the big surprise in the northern semi-pro competition, after the first two rounds of what is shaping to be a very exciting season.

In Friday night's other match, Grange Thistle and Newmarket will do battle in a real local derby encounter that always provides plenty of niggle.

Traditionally these matches have had plenty of feeling as the neighbouring clubs attempt to prove their supremacy, and supporters can expect nothing less this week. Grange will be particularly desperate, having failed to register any points thus far.

Newmarket will be out to consolidate what has been a fairly solid start to the season, with a win and a draw to the club's name so far.

Overall round three should provide a bucket load of entertaining matches for the paying public.

Semi Pros & Cons - South

The newest addition to the Semi Pro South competition, Eastern Suburbs, has expressed its intention to be that league's number one side after just two rounds.

The Tigers finished fourth last year in the northern division, after dropping several crucial matches in the latter part of the season.

However according to spokesman Lex Donsky, the club is looking froward to the fresh challenge of a new competition.

"Originally we were against the move to the southern competition, but after considering the options we saw a number of advantages," Donsky said.

"There will obviously be more local derbies and a lot less travel for our supporters, which is a very good thing for the club.

"Already we've played one match away from home and the increase in our own support was fantastic."

That improvement will not have to be as major as what Beenleigh will need however, if they are to upset the highly talented, yet so far winless, Rocklea United on Sunday afternoon.

The Lions first round victory over Redlands became more or less irrelevant after last weekend's humiliating loss to Acacia Ridge.

For Rocklea however, this weekend's match represents a genuine chance to take advantage of a team that is down.


