Editorial

The quicker the Premier League becomes a true state competition the better.

The successful additions of the Gold Coast, Bundaberg and Toowoomba in recent years has shown that risks need to be taken in order to strengthen the state of soccer in Queensland.

Brisbane City coach Danny Wright was rapt with the setup in Toowoomba when he took his charges to Gold Park last Sunday to meet the Raiders.

Wright said the country atmosphere and the support the Raiders had were great advocates for a Premier League competition involving cities and centres throughout Queensland.

It is almost certain that the Sunshine Coast will be part of the Premier League within three years. The area already has a successful Youth League team, whose players will be the backbone of a future top-level side.

The Sunshine Coast's approach of developing a youth side before beginning a Premier League campaign could be the way to go for other regional centres wanting to be part of big-time soccer again.

Looking into a crystal ball, one can only hope that in five or six years time the Premier League will not be dominated by Brisbane clubs.

An ideal competition could involve 14 clubs, including teams from the Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba, Bundaberg, Cairns, Townsville, Rockhampton, Mackay and Ipswich.

This leaves only five spots available for more traditional clubs. Actually it's probably only four, with the newly-formed Peninsula Power being a perfect Premier League candidate.

With four spots left, it either means Brisbane clubs would have to merge, and hence have a stronger team, or drop to the semi-pro ranks, which shouldn't been seen as a backwards step, but instead an economical decision.

The four Brisbane teams that should be included, based on finances, support, past successes and location are Brisbane Lions, Brisbane City, Rochedale and Wynnum.

How round five shaped up

Who can stop Brisbane City? That's the question being asked after five rounds as the boys from Spencer Park move further away from the rest, threatening to turn the premiership into a one horse race.

While there is a long way to go, City is now six points ahead of nearest rival Ipswich and 11 in front of bottom three Mount Gravatt. Bundaberg and the Gold Coast.

City beat Toowoomba 3-0 at Gold Park on Sunday. Goals came from Chris Slater - his seventh in five games - and Barry Wilkinson. plus an own goal from the Toowoomba side sealed victory for City.

Slater's form has impressed his coach Danny Wright, who also believes the former National League player is making a name for himself as a fine captain.

Wright took off a flu-stricken Slater late in the game, keen to save his striker's energy for this Sunday's top-of-the-table clash against the Ipswich Knights at Spencer Park.

The Knights warmed up for the clash in the worst possible way, losing 2-0 at home to the side that was last and without a win before the match, Taringa Rovers.

Damien Volker and Chris Donohue gave Taringa a 2-0 half-time lead, with neither side being able to find the net in the second stanza.

Taringa coach Willie Wallace was relieved to get the win, saying his team had taken time to settle down after losing several players to Lions in the off-season. Injuries have also plagued the side in the early part of the year.

Knights coach Frank Pimblett said his players were far too predictable in the first-half and lacked the enthusiasm and intensity needed to win.

"It's not good enough," he said.

Elsewhere, Lions continued their surge up the ladder with a 4-0 thrashing of Bundaberg at Thabeban Sports Complex on Saturday night.

Sasa Radulovic scored two for Lions, taking his tally to four for the year, with Raj Kumer



and Scott Robertson also getting on the scoresheet.

After a slow start, Lions are now equal third with the Wynnum Wolves on eight points. Bundaberg is one of three teams at the foot of the table on four points.

The Wolves won 4-1 against Mount Gravatt at Dittmer Park, with Mark Alaru, Duncan Easton, Anthony Roche and Ben Wood all scoring goals.

The Wynnum side keeps going about its business with a minimum of fuss and could be the surprise packet of the season.

Mount Gravatt has now conceded 14 goals in five games, the only team to have reached double figures in goals against.

At Underwood Park on Friday night, Gold Coast grabbed a valuable point against Rochedale thanks to a late equaliser from the talented Adam Poric.

Earlier Damian Harris had given the home side a 1-0 lead, but missed chances eventually came back to haunt Rochedale.

Gold Coast coach Ken Lindsay described the match as a game of two halves, while his Rochedale counterpart Peter Bannon saw it as a game of "three-quarters and a quarter".

"We could have had the game won at halftime, but by the end they could have won it." Bannon said.

PREMIER PREVIEW - Wynnum v Toowoomba Raiders

The Wynnum Wolves go into Saturday night's clash against the Toowoomba Raiders at Carmichael Park knowing victory could propel them into second place on the ladder.

If Ipswich loses to Brisbane City and the Wolves beat the Raiders, Wynnum will leapfrog the Knights and at worst be tied for second spot.

The Wolves will go into the match on a high after thrashing Mount Gravatt 4-1 at Dittmer Park last Sunday and will want to please their home fans with more goals.

The Raiders suffered a 3-0 loss to Brisbane City last Sunday, but their coach John Garside doesn't expect to meet a side as good as City again this season.

"If they (City) don't win the premiership it will be only their fault," Garside said.

"All over the park they are a good team."

Despite Wynnum's good record this season, Garside gave his side a chance of winning at Carmichael Park.

"I'm quite confident. We are improving each week," Garside said.

"We'll be very competitive. If they take us lightly we could be a problem for them."

Garside liked that the match was being played at night, saying the Raiders performed better in cooler conditions.


"They (the players) also like being able to go out after a match on a Saturday night. Playing on a Sunday means they can't really go out the night before.

"When they go out together they develop a camaraderie."

PREMIER PREVIEW - Gold Coast City v Mt Gravatt

Three Premier League points are vital to both the Gold Coast and Mount Gravatt when the two sides meet at Palm Beach on Sunday.

Both sides are currently at the foot of the ladder on four points. With Brisbane City romping away with 15 points on top of the table. the premiership hopes of both the Coast and Mount Gravatt are slipping further and further away, so victory is essential.

Gold Coast takes the better form going into the match, after grabbing a point against Rochedale at Underwood Park last Friday night.

Mount Gravatt lost 4-1 to the Wynnum Wolves last Sunday in a match were a closer result may have been expected considering the match was played at the Hawks' home ground. Dittmer Park

But Gold Coast coach Ken Lindsay won't underestimate Mt Gravatt, knowing the season has been littered with surprise results thus far.

Lindsay will again look to former National League player Adam Poric, who capped off several weeks of great from by grabbing the Coast's late equaliser against Rochedale.

PREMIER PREVIEW - Brisbane City v Ipswich Knights

It's first versus second at Spencer Park on Sunday when the undefeated Brisbane City take on a talented, vet inconsistent Ipswich Knights side.

Despite the clubs proximity in ladder positions, the gap between the pair is six points as City charge further and further away from the nine other Premier League clubs.

But City coach Danny Wright won't take anything for granted against Ipswich, despite the Knights disappointing effort in their 2-0 loss to Taringa last Sunday.

The main reason Wright will be wary of the visitors is because of their coach - the brilliant Frank Pimblett.

"I've got a lot of respect for Pimmo as a bloke and a coach. He was also a tremendous player," Wright said.

"There's no doubt he'll have his side ready with a plan to beat us."

While Pimblett will have cast a watchful eve over City, he will have been more concerned with getting his own house in order.

Inconsistency has plagued the Knights this year. They've mixed fine wins over Rochedale, Mount Gravatt and Bundaberg, with poor losses to Toowoomba and Taringa.

Pimblett said his side was flat in losing 2-0 to Taringa at Eric Evans Reserve last Sunday. A similar effort against City this weekend is certain to mean the Knights return to Ipswich with no points.

To win the Knights will have to overcome their problem of playing in the daytime.

WHO'S HOT: Citys 17-year-old Pablo Aviles has shone recently and attracted outside interest. Knights sweeper Scott Stenzel was solid last weekend.

But Taringa won't underestimate Waves, knowing form can be turned around in one match. Their victory on Sunday proved that.


Coach Willie Wallace wants his side's good form to continue against Waves and believes it can for a number of reasons.


Rochedale Rovers coach Peter Bannon hopes his side can continue its good away form. Both matches Rovers have won this season have come away from Underwood Park.

However, I do not think the swearing problem is a small issue, not by the amount of complaints received over this desk. ED.


International friendlies for SEQ

"But if they ask me to referee in the 2002 Cup I wouldn't say no!"


Queensland director of refereeing Alan Kibbler said Shield fully deserved his initial European appointment.





NORTHERN SEMIPROS AND CONS

Newcomers North Pine have continued to impress in the northern semi-pro competition following an emphatic 5-1 victory over The Gap.

The win has really given North Pine a major boost, rocketing the club to outright second on the ladder with nine points and rectifying what was beginning to look like a fairly ordinary goal difference.

Last weekend's 2-2 draw with Mitchelton was as tough a match as any and certainly a good warm up for their encounter with the reigning premiers this Saturday night.

A victory this weekend will help them consolidate their position at the upper end of the table.

SOUTHERN SEMIPROS AND CONS

The battle of the competition heavyweights Easts and Olympic proved to be very much a one-sided affair, with the Tigers running out comfortable 4-0 winners.

Marc Flemington did most of the damage for Eastern Suburbs, scoring a timely double for his club.

Amazingly, the match was over by half-time, with the Tigers up 3-0 by the break, courtesy of some creative play and staunch defence.

Import player/coach Per van Hansen, who moved into the midfield for the match, heaped plenty of praise on his fellow players after the match.

Back in front of their own supporters this Saturday night, Beenleigh will be a much different proposition to the team that is currently languishing second from the bottom on the competition ladder.

Capalaba meanwhile will require a greater level of commitment if it is to register a second win of the season against reigning premiers Souths United.

Souths has had a fairly mediocre start to its title defence by its own admission, however last week the club gave a fairly strong indication that it was back, when it hammered Slacks Creek 5-1.

With the strikers in such devastating form, this weekend's match against Capalaba is shaping up to be a beauty.

Rocklea also looks to have hit some form in recent weeks, with its latest result being a comprehensive 4-1 victory over Redlands.

They will get their chance to close the gap on the competition leaders this Saturday night when they travel to neighbouring Acacia Ridge.

And despite what may look to be a one-sided affair on paper, Ridge coach Tom Pike is quietly confident of an upset.

"Rocklea will be a tough match, there's no doubt about that," Pike said.

"But I'm hoping to have a new signing cleared before the start of the match and his presence should give us a lot more substance in the middle of the park.

"We're still lacking some quality in a couple of areas and I guess I'm still on the hunt for a few more players to strengthen our stocks. But we're fit and enthusiastic and reasonably well organised so I'm confident we can pull out an upset this weekend."

In the remaining round six clash, Redlands and Slacks Creek will be fighting for three competition points, as both sides attempt to put the memories of a couple of heavy defeats well behind them.

Injuries dash Steer's hope

At just 28 years of age, Craig Steer is a player who sadly is now in the twilight of his career. Despite being a very accomplished defender, injury has cut short a promising career, and the young man realises that his playing days are somewhat numbered.

"I had to have a knee reconstruction a few years back after a bad tackle against Newmarket," Steer said.

"There wasn't really anything anyone could do about it... it was just one of those things, but unfortunately my knee has never been the same since it happened, and it probably never will be."

The injury dashed Steer's hopes of playing in the XXXX League, but worse still it prevented the young man from taking the paddock again for an entire season.

"I came back from that injury about twelve months later, but I was always in and out of action because of my knee, so it's never fully recovered," the 28 year old said.

Steer sustained the injury while playing for his old club Albany Creek, where he played all of his junior football.

It was at Albany Creek where Steer began to forge a name for himself among junior representative ranks. Then the adventurous side of the defender came out and he went overseas on a working holiday for two years.

After returning home, Steer went back to play for the Creek in the semi-pro's once more and it was soon after his arrival that he sustained the injury.

"When I finally got back on to the field after the initial injury, I was pretty enthusiastic, but the recurring problems dampened that enthusiasm a bit," Steer said.

Not surprisingly, after months of ongoing problems, Steer finally decided to give the game away.

But a phone call from new Gap coach Ashley Hempstead late last year prompted the relatively young Steer back to the game.

Hempstead, a former coach of Steer's during his days with Albany Creek, still had plans for the defender in a new look Gap outfit.

"Ashley was the main reason I decided to get involved again," Steer said. "We had a very good association at the Creek and we're both mad punters.

"He's doing a few new things at The Gap and I think he'll be able to turn things around for the club, as far as their on-field performances are concerned."

But the call-up was only half the battle for Steer, who once again sustained some reccurring problems with his knee at the beginning of the season.

"One of my staples from the original knee construction was coming out so I had to get that fixed up, and that's kept me out for the season so far," Steer said.

"At this stage I'm another two weeks off at least but I am starting to get my fitness back at least."

Steer said that his XXXX League aspirations were now a thing of the past, although he did not harbour any disappointment about missing out on an opportunity to show his wares in the top grade.

Right now his aspirations are far simpler than that. First and foremost he would like to finish his Podiatry degree at QUT.

Secondly he would like to make it to the end of the season without any further injuries.

Beyond that, Steer is sure of one thing... that he will always be involved in soccer even if he cannot take the field and play to the capacity that he would dearly love.

Brockwell aims for top comp

To say this man has blue blood running through his veins would be an understatement. From the age of eight, Michael Brockwell has been a North Star man through and through. And even with his aspirations of returning to the XXXX League playing ranks, the 29-year-old is confident of playing his days out with the club.

"I'd like to stay at North Star and if the club keeps going in the direction that it has been going, I don't think I'll have any reason to leave," Brockwell said.

"The intention is to break back into the XXXX League ranks in the next year or so and I definitely think we're up to it.

"In all honesty, I believe we probably could've played XXXX League this year, and I think we showed that we were up to it when we were narrowly beaten in the quarter-final of the Queensland Cup last year."

Confident words coming from a man who has played senior football from the age of 14 and a good majority of that time in the XXXX League.

But the issue for North Star in the past has not been the club's playing stocks. Indeed Brockwell was a part of the North Star sides in 1992 and 1994 which took out the coveted premiership/grand final double.

Playing alongside the likes of Jim McDonagh, Shane Haddow and Fraser Cuba, Brockwell and his crew were certainly among the best outfits the XXXX League has seen in recent years.

The real problems for North Star came about through some administrative woes, which resulted in the club turning amateur in 1996.

"I was a bit shirty over that decision at the time it was made, but looking back it was the best thing and really the only option the club had," Brockwell said.

"It's no good bringing a club to breaking point just to win a premiership, and I think that's where a lot of clubs went wrong in the nineties.



"To North Star's credit, they bit the bullet in 1996, made a tough decision, but I think now when you look back, it was the best thing that could have happened for the club."

Brockwell remained with North Star in the early stages of the club's amateur status, loyalty being the major factor in his decision. However, the persistence of former coach Miron Bleiberg finally lured the speedy midfielder across to high fliers Brisbane Lions in 1998.

The year-long stint at Lions proved fruitful for Brockwell, who added another championship medal to his mantle piece.

But the call back to North Star proved too strong the following year, when Brockwell decided to return to his club of first choice.

Another premiership/grand final double followed and despite being semi-professional titles, Brockwell said he rated those victories extremely high.

"Last year was very satisfying for me because it was great to achieve what we did, with a team of primarily former North Star juniors," the Stars skipper said.

"I think our performance showed people that we would be able to mix it with the Premier clubs and be competitive in the top grade."

It's a girl thing

The numbers of young women playing the world game is about to dramatically increase thanks to the introduction of girls soccer to the primary schools inter-school sporting program.


Mixed soccer is currently being offered, with small amount of girls playing but Queensland Soccer Federation schools development director Kevin Meacock said it was important to offer girls their own program.


"The reason is simply the amount of experience that girls have had compared with the boys." Meacock said.

"It does not make sense to expect volumes of girls to suddenly, at the age of 10, be excited about playing 11-a-side soccer with and against boys who have had four or five years experience that the girls haven't had.

"In many instances girls playing in the mixed competition run around the field worrying about which position they are playing and whether they are offside, without actually touching the ball.

"The other scenario is that they choose not to play at all and never find an opportunity that





entices them to have a go."

A pilot program for girls will be held in the Inala District Primary Schools Sports Association, and will involve 16 teams from

Matches will be seven-a-side affairs, and be played on Friday afternoons over 12 weeks.

Meacock praised Brisbane Lions for their involvement in the program, saying the club's junior director of coaching John Sime understood the importance of promoting the game to primary schoolgirls. Sime has set up the Lions Soccer Academy for girls.

"Clubs that promote themselves successfully within their communities will sow the seeds that produce positive future outcomes for themselves and the game in general," Meacock said.

My old friends down at Wynnum could be the surprise packets, having produced some good form.




