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
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#### FOREWORD

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

-Ampol Cup kick-off. Relegated Hollandia surprise with a MARCH 5 brilliant 4-0 defeat of Merton Rovers.

-Premiers Hellenic upset 4-2 by Grange-Thistle, who are without seven of their 1965 regulars, and champions Latrobe are eliminated by a second-half penalty which gives Coalstars a 1-0 win at Heath Park before a capacity crowd.

—Oxley reach semi-finals for second successive year by beating Second Division's last representative, Hollandia, 5-1, under floodlights in a play-off for first place in Group B.

-Azzurri cause upset by beating Coalstars on corners in MARCH 27 Ampol semi-final. Thistle qualify for their first ever Federation Final with a convincing 4-1 win against Oxley.

-Thistle in runaway 6-1 Ampol Final win. Oxley take third APRIL 3 prize in a goal-riot, beating Coalstars 6-4.

> -Premiership competition begins with 18 goals in four matches. Latrobe thrash Thistle 6-1, and Oxley beaten 5-0 at home by Merton Rovers. Latrobe centre forward Bob Buchanan made his club debut against his old side,



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-1962 beating Oxley 4-0. Oxley, after scoring 18 goals MAY 1 in the Ampol, have yet to score after three rounds. -Latrobe left with only unbeaten record after defeating MAY 7-8 Oxley 3-2 at McCook Park. -Hellenic beat Latrobe 3-2 in an exciting match at Lanham MAY 14-15 Park. Oxley record their first win, 2-1, over Grange -Azzurri draw 1-1 with Merton, leaving Thistle stranded MAY 21-22 at the foot of the table, with only two points from six matches. #### STATE TEAM COLLAPSES

Following the fine performances of the Queensland team in 1965, there was optimism that we could extend the Italian visitors, AS Roma, who toured Australia in 1965.

However, inexperience and tactical immaturity played a large part in the downfall of the local side against the faster, brainier visitors. Roma, who attracted the smallest crowd seen at a major soccer match in Brisbane for

many years, were untroubled to win 6-0.

For Queensland, the day brought defeat, but not disgrace. Attempting to play a 4-2-4 system strange to most of the team, Queensland strugaled valiantly throughout the ninety minutes, but it was unfortunate that these tactics left gaping holes in defence, which the Romans were able to exploit

The highlight of the match was a brilliant performance by the dashing Roma winger, Lamberto Leonardi. Apart from scoring one of Roma's six goals, his tremendous bursts of speed produced most of the few thrilling moments of an afternoon that did not quite live up to expectations.



#### TOP AWARD TO JACKSON

Brilliant Hellenic wing-half, Matt Jackson, produced some outstanding matches to clinch Queensland's top individual trophy, the Courier-Mail "Best and Fairest" Award, in 1966.

Jackson, who joined Hellenic from Grange-Thistle early in the year, had previously played mainly as an inside-forward. However, his masterly dis-

plays at half-back soon established him firmly in that position.

A Scot, the 26-year-old Jackson has been the scourge of defences with his powerful shot since his arrival in Brisbane in 1964, and his attacking powers, combined with great courage and superb physical condition, provided an irresistible combination in 1966.

#### AZZURRI

Honours won: Grand Champions, 1961; Craven "A" Cup winners, 1962; Shield winners, 1960; Wills Tournament winners, 1960.

Azzurri, who gained promotion only in 1959, climaxed a meteoric rise to the top with an equally spectacular crash in 1966. After a solid, if not outstanding run in the Ampol Cup, they had a wretched League season, and in the end, were left well and truly in last place.

Unfortunately, the club was never able to field a settled team, and relied too much on a few stalwarts. Graham Kruger, the former State goalkeeper, played only spasmodically, and the ageing veteran, Nana Dvornicich,

was called on to do wonders between the sticks at times.

In defence, John Snaith, the left-back and skipper, and half-backs Peter Clemitson and Nero Saftich, were still well up to top Division standards, but it was in the forwards that the Italians failed. Apart from the brilliant, but inconsistent Bruno Guaragna, they had little to offer in this respect, and scored only 26 goals in their 21 League outings.

It is likely that by the time of publishing these words, Clemitson will have departed, and if this is the case, Azzurri will probably have to be

content to remain in Second Division for at least another year.

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# AZZURI'S "CUP HOODOO" STRIKES AGAIN

Azzurri's Ampol Cup hoodoo struck again in 1966, when, before 3,500 fans at the Exhibition Ground, they were defeated 6-1 in the final by Grange Thistle—their fifth successive defeat in final appearances.

Thistle, despite the loss of many of their stars from previous years, including their Scottish forwards, Matt Jackson and Bob Buchanan, played convincing football in all their five matches, and finished worthy winners of their first major Federation trophy.

The early favourites were the all-British Latrobe side, but they crashed 0-1 in a sensational preliminary round match against Graham Kathage's youngsters from Coalstars. The only goal of a tense, incident-packed game came from a penalty.

Neither Thistle nor Azzurri looked likely winners in the first two preliminary rounds, however. Against lowly second Division opponents, both had their anxious moments before surviving, and Azzurri scrambled home only by the odd goal in seven against the promoted side, St. Helens.

Thistle, after a shaky start against Annerley, came back spiritedly to defeat Hellenic in their last preliminary match, and, moving with fluency and purpose, outplayed Oxley and then Azzurri in the finals.

Coalstars were probably the unluckiest team in the Cup. They made all the running in their semi-final against Azzurri, only for the Italians to snatch an extra-time "corners" victory.

The other semi-finalists, Oxley, were never in the picture for higher honours. To reach the final four they were forced to a play-off with the second Divisioners, Hollandia, and rarely looked like making an impression against either Thistle or Coalstars. Hollandia's performance was a fine one, particularly their slashing 4-0 win over Merton Rovers, which ended the latter's hopes of a good run.

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#### ACCORDING TO THE PARTY OF THE P HELLENIC

Honours won: Premiers, 1960-61-62-63-65; Champions, 1960, 1963; Ampol

Cup winners, 1960-61-62-63-64; Tristram Shield winners, 1961.

First the first time in seven years, Hellenic failed to win a trophy in 1966. They were eliminated early in the Cup, failed in the closing stages when well placed in the League, and succumbed to Latrobe in a tense Grand

The reason for their lapses is not hard to find. In Jock Taylor, Graham McMillan and Andy Tsombaras they had three of the State's top forwards, but

totally inadequate reserves played havoc with their defence. The premature retirement of wing-half Jimmy McCarthy was amply com-

pensated for by the purchase of Matt Jackson and Gordon Mackie from Grange-Thistle, but a series of injuries turned the tide against the Greeks.

At their top, Hellenic were still Queensland's best team, in the eyes of most people. Their slashing 5-0 and 5-1 wins over the powerful Merton Rovers combination within a month of one another were great performances.

Ron Ross continued to give fine service in goal, while the captain, veteran Brian Vogler, was as solid as ever at fullback.

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#### OXI FY UNITED

Honours won: Ampol Cup winners, 1959; Premiers, 1958. Apart from a few good displays by Bill Haigh, the State half-back, and winger Jim Ford, Oxley once again had a mediocre season. They started disastrously, with four successive defeats, and despite a brave attempt at recovery, feil into the doldrums again towards the end of the season.

The management showed foresight in several bold experiments with young talent, but on balance, the Dunlop Park club will not want to remember

the 1966 season for long.

Allan May, a jaunty winger with a tremendous burst of speed, was with Haigh and Ford, their only player to rise above the average. As with Merton, Oxley were never able to satisfactorily resolve their goalkeeping position.

#### LATROBE

Honours won: Premiers, 1964, 1966; Champions, 1965-1966; Second

Division winners, 1961; Australia Cup quarter-finalists, 1964.

Continuing their policy of fielding only imported players, Latrobe enjoyed great success again in 1966, completing the Premiership-Championship double for the first time. Their new arrivals, Keith Jones, Jim Strachan and Jeffery Screen, blended well with the established stars, and when Screen returned to Britain, his place at fullback was filled by Welshman Bryn Lewis. The "old guard" of Ray Richards, Syd Tucker and Matt Hosie were again the backbone of the side. Bob Buchanan, bought from Grange-Thistle, was never quite the same force at centre-forward that he had been with the Scotsmen, but nevertheless managed to slip home a few vital goals. The spectacular Horace Clark in goals was again to the fore also. Latrobe have lost several players to Sydney clubs in the off season, notably Jones, Edmunds and Strachan, and once again we may expect to see several newcomers in their ranks for 1967.

As Queensland's only entry in the Australia Cup, the club was quickly eliminated by Sydney's Hakoah. Although Hakoah won 6-2, Latrobe had their

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#### COALSTARS

Honours won: Ampol Cup winners, 1965.
After their sensational successes of the previous year, Coalstars were freely tipped in most circles as championship contenders in 1966. However, a good start was followed by an abrupt decline, and in the end a defeat by wooden-spoonists Azzurri put them out of the semi-finals. Several key players, including representative half-back Stuart Dedman, were lost, and the inexperience of the replacements cost many a point throughout the season.

At 31 years of age, skipper Graham Kathage was again the mainstay of the side, but his retirement this year has left the Ipswich club, now faced with strong local competition from St. Helens, with a somewhat doubtful future. In Ross Kelly, the club has a fine young goalkeeper, and inside left

Ian Johnston has played for Australia.

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#### ST. HELENS UNITED

Honours won: Newly-formed club.

Formed as a result of an amalgamation between St. Helens and Redbank-Dinmore, this new club did extremely well to reach the semi-finals at its first attempt. St. Helens and Redbank had finished first and second respectively in the previous year's Second Division, and without any further addition to their playing strength the combination turned in some good displays.

The former Hellenic stalwarts, Brian Topfer (goal), Les McCrae (centre-half), Duncan McKenna (fullback) and Col Kitching (centre-forward) all played large parts in the season's successes. Rising young stars John McIntosh and Noel Sander provided the polish in a team composed essentially of willing workers. For most of the season Saints hovered on the brink of the relegation zone, but in a spirited recovery they reached the semi-finals in their last premiership match. After receiving a terrible 13-2 pounding from Merton Rovers, they went from strength to strength, losing only two games of the next nine.

St. Helens can be proud of the fact that they are the first promoted club since 1961 which managed to avoid dropping straight back into Second Division.

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#### MERTON ROVERS

Wonours won: Champions, 1962, 1964.

A poor start to the season wrecked whatever hopes Merton might have had for success in 1966, and in the event, their second place was a worthy achievement. A stunning 4-0 Cup defeat by Hollandia was followed by a mediocre start to the premiership, and it was not until halfway through the League programme that the Rovers began to click.

Eric Pattison, their versatile centre-forward, was once again the power behind their attack, and it was only when he found his best form that the side really found its feet. He received good support from inside-forward Treyor Catchpole, whose 15 goals were a just reward for his consistency.

In defence, Queensland cente-half Gary Catchpole was well to the fore, and Leif Petersen, returning to the side after a season's absence, proved a fine attacking wing-half. Goalkeeping problems might well have cost Merton their first Premiership.

#### GRANGE THISTLE

Honours won: Thistram Shield winners, 1950-1951-1952; Ampol Cup winners, 1966.

When Thistle lost seven of their previous year's first team in the 1965-66 off season, there were many who predicted disaster for the club in the coming season. However, a judicious blend of experience and promising juniors created a sensation with a convincing series of wins in the Ampol Cup, culminating in a 6-1 win in the final.

The bubble soon burst when the first three premiership matches were lost, and throughout the year, it was only the poor form of Azzurri which

kept Thistle's head above water.

Goalkeeper Alan Rigby continued to turn in fine performances, as he has done for years, and in youthful half-backs George Whitaker and Dave Barrick, Thistle have two readymade future stars. Only eighteen years of age, and in his first season in senior football, inside-forward Roger Clark top-scored with 17 goals.

The club has been active in signing new players, and should prove a

force in 1967.

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
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#### LAW 1. - THE FIELD OF PLAY

The field of play and appurtenances shall be as shown in the following plan:-

(1) **Dimensions.** The field of play shall be rectangular; its length being not more than 130 yards nor less than 100 yards and its breadth not more than 100 yards nor less than 50 yards. (In International matches the length shall be not more than 120 yards nor less than 110 yards and the breadth not more than 80 yards nor less than 70 yards). The length shall in all cases exceed the breadth.

(2) Marking. The field of play shall be marked with distinctive lines, not more than 5 inches in width, not by a V-shaped rut in accordance with the plan, the longer boundary lines being called the touch lines and the shorter the goal-lines. A flag or a post not less than 5ft. high and having a non-pointed top, shall be placed at each corner, a similar flag-post may be placed opposite the half-way line on each side of the field of play, not less than 1 yard outside the touchline. A half-way line shall be marked out across the field of play. The centre of the field of play shall be indicated by a suitable mark and a circle with a 10 yard radius shall be marked round it.

(3) The Goal-Area. At each end of the field of play two lines shall be drawn at right-angles to the goal-line, 6 yards from each goal-post. These shall extend into the field of play for a distance of 6 yards and shall be joined by a line drawn parallel with the goal-line. Each of these spaces enclosed by these lines and the goal-line shall be called a goal-area.

(4) The Penalty-Area. At each end of the field of play two lines shall be drawn at right-angles to the goal-line, 18 yards from each goal-post. These shall extend into the field of play for a distance of 18 yards and shall be joined by a line drawn parallel with the goal-line. Each of the spaces enclosed by these lines and the goal line shall be called a penaty area. A suitable mark shall be made within each penalty-area, 12 yards from mid-point of the goal-line, measured along an undrawn line at right angles thereto. These shall be the penalty-kick marks. From each penalty-kick mark an arc of a circle, having a radius of 10 yards, shall be drawn outside the penalty-area.

(5) The Corner-Area. From each corner-flag a quarter circle having a radius of Tyard, shall be drawn inside the field of play.

(6) The Goals. The goals shall be placed on the centre of each goal-line and shall consist of two upright posts equi-distance from the corner-flags and 8 yards apart (inside measurement), joined by a horizontal cross-bar the lower edge of which shall be 8ft. from the ground. The width and depth of the goal-posts and the width and depth of the cross-bars shall not exceed 5 inches.

Nets may be attached to the posts, cross-bars and ground behind the goals. They should be appropriately supported and distance from the corner-flags and 8 yards apart inside measure be so placed as to allow the goal-keeper ample room.

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#### LAW 2. - THE BALL

The ball shall be spherical; the outer casing shall be of leather and no material shall be used in its construction which might prove dangerous to the players. The circumference of the ball shall not be more than 28 inches nor less than 27 inches. The weight of the ball at the start of the game shall not be more than 16oz. nor less than 14oz.

#### LAW 3. - NUMBER OF PLAYERS

- (1) The game shall be played by two teams each consisting of not more than eleven players one of whom shall be the goal-keeper. One of the other players may change places with the goal-keeper during the match provided notice be given to the Referee before such change is made.
- (2) Substitute for players who are injured during a match under the rules of a competition, and who are unable to continue to play, will only be permitted if the approval of the National Association or International Associations concerned has been obtained.
- (3) Substitutes for injured players may be introduced in other matches subject to this arrangement being agreed upon by both teams before the start of a match.

**Punishment:** If, without notifying the Referee, a player changes to goal-keeper during the game, and then handles the ball within the penalty-area, a penalty kick shall be awarded. Any player leaving the field during the progress of the game (except through accident) without the consent of the Referee shall be deemed guilty of ungentlemanly conduct.

#### Decision of the Board, Relative to Law 3.

- A player who leaves the field during a match for any reason must not take part in another match until that in which he commenced has ended.
- The minimum number of players in a team is left to the discretion of National Associations.
- 3. The Board is of the opinion that a match should not be considered valid if there are fewer than seven players in either of the teams.
- If a team decides, during the half-time interval to replace the goalkeeper by another player, the Referee must be informed of the changes before the match is restarted.
- 5. National Associations have decided to allow substitutes in accordance with clauses 2 and 3 of LAW 3, the Board has decided the replacement of the goal-keeper at any time during the match and of one other player before the end of the first half, if they are injured and unable to take part again in the match, this fact having been confirmed by the Referee (1958).

- 6. The Board asks that, in International Matches of this character, National Associations shall, before the start of the match, exchange the names of possible substitutes of the goal-keepers. i
- If during the half-time interval, a player strikes an opponent or behaves in an ungentlemanly manner towards a Referee, he shall be debarred from taking any further part in the match and shall not be replaced.
- If a player perforce, for instance through impetus gained, passes beyond one of the boundary lines of the field of play, he shall not be considered as having left the field of play without permission of the Referee.
- 9. A player nearing an opponent close to the touch-line, who plays the ball to one side of the opponent and then runs round the other side in order to get the ball again behind his opponent, does not infringe any Law if he, perchance, should pass over the touch-line. Similarly, if a player near the goal-line, should step over the line in order to get possession of the ball inside the playing area, and then goes on to score, the goal is valid because the ball was never out of play and the player had no intention of leaving the game, his momentary going outside the field of play being done as part of a playing movement. Players are expected, as a general rule, to remain within the playing area.

#### LAW 4. - PLAYERS' EQUIPMENT

(a) Bars shall be made of leather or rubber and shall be transverse and flat, not less than half an inch in width and shall extend the total width of the boots and be rounded at the corners.

- (b) Studs shall be made of leather, rubber, aluminium, plastic or similar material and shall be rounded in plan and not less than half an inclin diameter. Where studs are tapered, the minimum diameter of any section of the stud must not be less than half an inch. Where metal seating for the screw type is used, the seating must be embedded in the sole of the boot and any attachment screw shall be part of the stud. Other than the metal seating for the screw type of stud, no metal plates even though covered with leather or rubber shall be worn, neither studs which are threaded to allow them to be screwed on to a base screw that is fixed by nails or otherwise to the soles of boots, nor studs with any form of protruding edge rim, or relief marking or ornament shall be allowed.
- (c) Combined bars and studs may be worn, provided the whole conforms to the general requirements of this law. Neither bars nor studs on the soles or heels shall project more than three-quarters of an inch. If nails are used they shall be driven in flush with the surface.
- (N.B.—The usual equipment of a player consists of a jersey or shirt, short trousers, stockings and boots. A goal-keeper should wear colours which distinguish him from the other players).

Punishment: For any infringement of this Law, the player at fault shall be sent off the field of play temporarily. He shall not return without first reporting to the Referee, who shall satisfy himself that the player's equipment is in order; the player shall only re-enter the game at a moment when the ball has ceased to be in play.

#### LAW 5. - REFEREES

A Referee shall be appointed to officiate in each game. He shall:-

(a) Enforce the Laws and decide any disputed point. His decision on points of fact connected with the play shall be final so far as the result of the game is concerned. His jurisdiction begins from the time he signals the kick-off, and his power of penalising shall extend to offences committed when play has been temporarily suspended or when the ball is out of play. He shall, however, refrain from penalising in cases where he is satisfied that by doing so he would be giving an advantage to the offending team.

(b) Keep a record of the game; act as timekeeper and allow the full or agreed time, adding thereto all time lost through accident or other cause.

(c) Have discretionary power to stop the game for any infringement of the Laws and to suspend or terminate the game whenever, by reason of the elements, interference by spectators, or other cause, he deems such stoppage necessary. In such a case he shall report the matter to the

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National or Affiliated Association under whose juisdiction the game was played, within two days (Sundays not included). Reports will be deemed to be made when received in the ordinary course of post.

- (d) Have discretionary power, from time he enters the field of play, to caution any player guilty of misconduct or ungentlemanly behaviour and, if he persists, to suspend him from further participation in the game. In such cases the Referee shall send the name of the offender to the National or Affiliated Association concerned, within two days after the occurrence (Sundays not included). Reports will be deemed to be made when received in the ordinary course of post.
- (e) Allow no person other than the players and linesmen to enter the field without his permission.
- (f) Stop the game if, in his opinion, a player has been seriously injured; hove the player removed as soon as possible from the field of play, and immediately resume the game. If a player is slightly injured, the game shall not be stopped until the ball has ceased to be in play. A player who is able to get to the touch or goal-line for attention of any kind, shall not be treated on the field of play.
- (g) Have discretionary power to suspend from further participation in the game, without previous caution, a player guilty of violent conduct.
  - (h) Signal for recommencement of the game after all stoppages.

#### LAW 6. - LINESMEN

Two linesmen shall be appointed, whose duty (subject to the decision of the Referee) shall be to indicate when the ball is out of play and which side is entitled to the corner-kick, goal-kick or throw in. They shall also assist the Referee to control the game in accordance with the Laws. In the event of undue interference or improper conduct by a linesman, the Referee shall dispense with his services and arrange for a substitute to be appointed. (The matter shall be reported by the Referee to the National or Affiliated Association having jurisdiction over the offending linesman). The linesman should be equipped with flags by the Club on whose ground the match is played.

#### LAW 7. - DURATION OF THE GAME

The duration of the game shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes, unless otherwise mutually agreed upon, subject to the following: (a) Allowance shall be made in either period for all time lost through accident or other cause, the amount of which shall be a matter for the discretion of the Referee; (b) Time shall be extended to permit of a penalty-kick being taken at or after the expiration of the normal period in either half.

At half-time the interval shall not exceed five minutes except by consent of the Referee

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(a) At the beginning of the game, choice of ends and the kick-off shall be decided by the toss of a coin. The team winning the toss shall have the option of choice of ends or the kick-off.

The Referee, having given a signal, the game shall be started by a player taking a place-kick (i.e., a kick at the ball while it is stationary on the ground in the centre of the field of play) into his opponents half of the field of play. Every player shall be in his own half of the field and every player of the team opposing the kicker shall remain not less than 10 yards from the ball until it is kicked-off; it shall not be deemed in play until it has travelled the distance of its own circumference. The kicker shall not play the ball a second time until it has been played or touched by another player.

(b) After a goal has been scored the game shall be re-started in like manner by a player of the team losing the goal.

(c) After half-time. When restarting after half-time, ends shall be changed and the kick-off shall be taken by a player of the opposite team to that of the player who started the game.

**Punishment:** For any infringement of this Law the kick-off shall be retaken, except in the case of the kicker playing the ball again before it has been touched or played by another player; for this offence, an indirect free-kick shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred. A goal shall not be scored direct from a kick-off.

(d) After any other temporary suspension. When restating the game after a temporary suspension of play from any cause not mentioned elsewhere in these Laws, provided that immediately prior to the suspension the ball has not passed over the touch or goal-lines, the Referee shall drop the ball at

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the place where it was when play was suspended and it shall be deemed in play when it has touched the ground; if, however, it goes over the fouch or goal-lines after it has been dropped by the Referee, but before it is touched by a player, the Referee shall again drop it. A player shall not play the ball until it has touched the ground. If this section of the Law is not complied with the Referee shall again drop the ball.

#### LAW 9. - BALL IN AND OUT OF PLAY

The ball is out of play:-

- (a) When it has wholly crossed the goal-line or touch-line, whether on the ground or in the air.
  - (b) When the game has been stopped by the Referee.

The ball is in play at all other times from the start of the match to the finish, including:—

- (a) If it rebounds from a goal-post, cross-bar or corner-flag post into the field of play.
- (b) If it rebounds off either the Referee or linesmen when they are in the field of play.
- (c) In the event of a supposed infringement of the Laws, until a decision is given.

#### LAW 10 - METHOD OF SCORING

Except as otherwise provided by these Laws, a goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal-line, between the goal-posts and under the cross-bar; provided it has not been thrown, carried or propelled by hand or arm, by a player of the attacking side. Should the cross-bar become displaced for any reason during the game, and the ball cross the goal-line at a point which, in the opinion of the Referee, is below where the cross-bar should have been, he shall award a goal.

The team scoring the greater number of goals during the game shall be 'the winner, if no goals, or an equal number of goals are scored, the game shall be termed a "draw."

#### Decisions of the Board. Relative to Law 10.

- The Board has decided that Law 10 defines the only method according which a match is won or drawn; as a consequence no alteration whatsoever can be authorised.
- A goal cannot in any case be allowed if the ball has been stopped by some outside agency before passing over the goal-line. If this happens in the normal course of play, the game must be stopped and restarted by

the Referee dropping the ball at the place where the ball came into contact with the interference.

- 3. If the ball is going into goal, but before it passes wholly over the goal-line, a spectator enters the field and tries to prevent the goal but fails to make contact with the ball which then goes into goal, the Referee shall allow the goal.
- 4. If the Referee signals a goal before the ball has passed wholly over the goal-line, through inadvertence, and he immediately realises his error the goal is not valid and he shall restart the game by dropping the ball at the place where it was when he inadvertently stopped play.
- The word "thrown" does not apply to the goal-keeper when he is within his own penalty-area.

#### LAW 11. - OFF-SIDE

A player is off-side if he is nearer his opponents' goal-line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless:—

- (a) He is in his own half of the field of play.
- (b) There are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal-line than he is.
  - (c) The ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him.
- (d) He receives the ball direct from a goal-kick, corner-kick, a throw-in, or when it is dropped by the Referee.

**Punishment:** For an infringement of this Law, an indirect free-kick shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred.

A player in an off-side position shall not be penalised unless, in the opinion of the Referee, he is interfering with the play or with an opponent, or is seeking to gain an advantage by being in an off-side position.

#### LAW 12. - FOULS AND MISCONDUCTS

A player who intentionally commits any of the following nine offences:-

- (a) Kicks or attempts to kick an opponent;
- (b) Trips an opponent, i.e., throwing or attempting to throw by the use of the legs or by stopping in front of or behind him;
- (c) Jumps at an opponent;
- (d) Charges an opponent in a violent or dangerous manner;

- (e) Charges an opponent from behind unless the latter be obstructing;
- (f) Strikes or attempts to strike an opponent;
- (g) Holds an opponent with his hand or any part of his arm;
- (h) Pushes an opponent with his hand or any part of his arm;
- (i) Handles the ball, i.e., carries, strikes or propels the ball with his hand or arm (this does not apply to the goal-keeper within his own penaltyarea);

shall be penalised by the award of A DIRECT FREE KICK to be taken by the opposing side from the place where the offence occurred.

Should a player of the defending side intentionally commit one of the above nine offences, within the penalty area, he shall be penalised by a penalty kick.

A penalty kick can be awarded irrespective of the position of the ball, if in play, at the time an offence within the penalty-area is committed.

A player committing any of the five following offences:-

(1) Playing in a manner considered by the Referee to be dangerous, i.e., attempting to kick the ball while held by the goal-keeper;

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- (2) Charging fairly, i.e., with the shoulder, when the ball is not within playing distance of the players concerned, and they are definitely not thying to play it;
- (3) When not playing the ball, intentionally obstructing an opponent, i.e., running between the opponent and the ball, or interposing the body so as to form an obstacle to an opponent;
  - (4) Charging the goal-keeper except when he:-
  - (a) is holding the ball;
  - (b) is obstructing an opponent;
  - (c) has passed outside his goal area;
- (5) When playing as a goal-keeper, carry the ball, i.e., taking more than four steps while holding the ball without bouncing it on the ground; shall be penalised by the award of an INDIRECT FREE KICK to be taken by the opposing side from the place where the infringement occurred.

A player shall be CAUTIONED if:-

- (i) He joins his team after the game has commenced, or returns to the field while the game is in progress without reporting to the Referee or without waiting for a stoppage of the game. If the game has been stopped (to administer the caution) it shall be restarted by the Referee dropping the ball at the place where the infringement occurred, but if the player has committed a more important offence he shall be penalised according to that section of the law infringed;
  - (k) He persistently infringes the laws of the game;
- (1) He shows by word or action, dissent from any decision given by the Referee;
  - (m) He is guilty of ungentlemanly conduct.

For any of these last three offences, in addition to the caution, an INDIRECT FREE KICK shall also be awarded to the opposing side from the place where the offence occurred.

A player shall be SENT OFF the field of play:-

- (n) If he is guilty of violent conduct, i.e., using foul or abusive language, or if, in the opinion of the Referee, he is guilty of serious foul play;
  - (o) If he persists in this misconduct after having received a caution.

If play be stopped by reason of a player being ordered from the field for an offence without a separate breach of the law having been committed, the game shall be resumed by an INDIRECT FREE KICK awarded to the opposing side from the place where the infringement occurred.

#### LAW 13. - FREE-KICK

Free-kicks shall be classified under two heads: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored direct against the offending side), and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been played or touched by a player other than the kicker before passing through the goal).

When a direct or indirect free-kick is being taken, a player of the opposite side shall not approach within 10 yards of the ball until it is in play, unless he be standing on his goal-line, between the goal-posts. If a player of the opposing team approaches within 10 yards before the kick is taken the Referee shall delay the taking of the kick until the Law is complied with. The ball shall not be deemed in play until it has travelled the distance of its own circumference. The ball must be stationary when the kick is taken, and after taking the kick, the kicker shall not play the ball a second time unless it has been touched or played by another player. In the case of a free-kick being awarded to the defending side in the penalty area, the goal-keeper shall not receive the ball into his hands in order that he may thereafter kick the ball forward; he shall not play the ball a second time until it has area, and if this part of the Law is not complied with the kick shall be re-taken.

**Punishment:** If the kicker, after taking the free-kick, plays the ball a second time before it has been touched or played by another player an indirect free-kick shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the spot where the infringement occurred.

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A penalty-kick shall be taken from the penalty-mark and, when it is being taken, all players, with the exception of the player taking the kick, and the opposing goal-keeper, shall be within the field of play but outside the penalty-area and at least 10 yards from the penalty-mark. The opposing goal-keeper must stand (without moving his feet) on his own goal-line, between the goal-posts, until the ball is kicked. The player taking the kick must kick the ball forward, he shall not play the ball a second time until it has been touched or played by another player. The ball shall be deemed in play directly it is kicked, i.e., travelling the distance of its circumference, and a goal may be scored direct from such a penalty-kick. If the ball touches the goal-keeper before passing between the posts, when a penalty-kick is being taken at or after the expiration of time the play shall be extended at half-time or full-time to allow a penalty-kick to be taken.

#### Punishment:

- (a) For any infringement by the defending team the kick shall be retaken, if a goal has not resulted.
- (b) For any infringement by the attacking team, other than by the player taking the kick the kick shall be retaken, if a goal has resulted.
- (c) For any infringement by the player taking the penalty-kick, a player of the opposing team shall take an indirect free-kick from the spot where the infringement occurred.

#### LAW 15. - THROW-IN

When the whole of the ball passes over a touch-line, either on the ground or in the air, it shall be thrown in from the point where it crossed

the line, in any direction, by a player of the team opposite to that of the player who last fouched it. The thrower at the moment of delivering the ball must face the field of play and part of each foot shall be either on or outside the touch-line. The thrower shall use both hands and shall deliver the ball from over his head. The ball shall be in play immediately it is thrown, but the thrower shall not again play the ball until it has been touched or played by another player. A goal shall not be scored direct from a throw-in.

#### Punishment:

- (a) If the ball is improperly thrown in, the throw-in shall be taken by a player of the opposing team.
- (b) If the thrower plays the ball a second time before it has has been touched or played by another player, an indirect free-kick shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred.

#### LAW 16. - GOAL-KICK

When the whole of the ball passes over the goal-line excluding that portion between the goal-posts, either in the air or on the ground, having last been played by one of the attacking team, it shall be kicked direct into play

beyond the penalty-area, from a point within that half of the goal-area nearest to where it crossed the line by a player of the defending team. A goal-keeper shall not receive the ball into his hands from a goal-kick in order that he may thereafter kick it into play. If the ball is not kicked beyond the penalty-area, i.e., direct into play, the kick shall be re-taken. The kicker shall not play the ball a second time until it has touched or been played by another player. A goal shall not be scored direct from such a kick. Players of the team opposing that of the player taking the goal-kick shall remain outside the penalty-area whilst the kick is being taken.

**Punishment:** If a player taking a goal-kick plays the ball a second time after it has passed beyond the penalty-area, but before it has touched or been played by another player, an indirect free-kick shall be awarded to the opposing team to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred.

#### LAW 17. - CORNER-KICK

When the whole of the ball passes over the goal-line, excluding that portion between the goal posts, either in the air or on the ground, having last been played by one of the defending team, a member of the attacking team shall take a kick from within the quarter-circle at the nearest corner flagpost, which must not be removed, i.e., a corner-kick. A goal may be scored direct from such a kick. Players of the team opposing the player taking the corner-kick shall not approach within 10 yards of the ball until it is in play, i.e., it has travelled the distance of its own circumference, nor shall the kicker play the ball a second time until it has been touched or played by another player.

**Punishment:** For an infringement of this Law, an indirect free-kick shall be awarded to the opposing team, to be taken from the place where the infringement occurred.

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
